LOCAL RED CROSS SYSTEM WILL BE USED IN AREA

Mrs. Carl Wallace, cochairman of the Smith County Junior Red Cross activities, has devised a set of records on junior work so practical that it is to be adopted for the whole southwest area of the Red Cross, David Eliassof, Smith County chapter chairman, said Satur-

Mrs. Tess Potter, area supervisor from the southwest headquarters in St. Louis, Mo., saw Mrs. Wallace's plans on a recent visit to Tyler and said that they will be in use soon throughout the area.

Mrs. Wallace is Smith County rural school supervisor and, since much of the Junior Red Cross work is done in the county schools, is in a position to keep close check on the junior activities. The simplicity of her system is probably its chief asset. Sheets containing the records are marked off into seven divisions and are kept on a clip

Each sheet reads thus across the top: Quantity, Article, Pattern, Date Due, Teacher and School. As a quota is assigned to this county, Mrs. Wallace and her cochairman, Mrs. Pearl Robertson, apportion it to the different schools and the quantity given to each is entered in the first column. The other blanks are hen filled out and the whole system shows, at a glance, what each school is doing in regard to each article.

Pupils in both city and county schools are this year participating 100% in the Red Cross effort, Mrs. Wallace reported. The quotas for each school have been more than doubled. Just a few of the articles which are made by the junior work-




