Alabama has produced 284 pounds of lint cotton, while Mississippi farmers produce 368 pounds of lint per acre and Texas only produced 191 pounds, with Oklahoma only producing 160 pounds per acre. If analyzed it will readily be seen that the Texas farmer can't compete with the Mississippi farmer as 368 pounds at the present price of 8 cents would produce an annual income per acre of \$29.44 while the 191 pounds produced by the Texas farmer would only produce an income of \$15.28. In this immediate territory the yield was even less than the average for the state. We have in mind one farmer who had in 35 acres near here and gathered only seven bales and this is about an average of the Putnam territory which was about 116 pounds per acre, or an income of \$9.28 per acre. No farm legislation of paying subsidies or benefit payments will adjust this disparity between farmers. This farmer with the 116 pounds production would get as a subsidy only \$3.48 while the Mississippi farmer with the 368 pounds will get \$11.04 per acre at three cents per

In 1937 the payments were based on the number of animal units and paid \$1.50 for each, but for 1938 a payment of 3 cents per acre will be allowed for all mal unit. Looking through some of the applications on file it seems that this will be about 80 per cent of the amount allowed for the 1937 program. In Callahan it was estimated that the land would average around 10 cents per acre. The same calculation for 1937 would indicate about 8 cents allowance per scre. 4-H Plans for 1938-
