BOY SCOUT WEEK

Nearly 2,000,000 Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts and Senior Scouts will observe the 37th anniversary of the Boy Scouts of America during Boy Scout Week, Feb. 7th to 13th. Through their World Friendship Fund of voluntary gifts the Boy Scouts of America have given \$110,464.36 to help Boy Scouts overseas rebuild their organizations. During the first year of their "Shirts-Off-Our-Backs" project more than 400 cases—or twenty tons—of Scout Uniforms and equipment collected from Scouts were contributed to Scouts in 13 nations. Scouting has always been an active force in promoting better understanding and mutual goodwill among the nations. Above is the official poster marking the event.

Dr. Cox said, "but despite having been reduced to fifth place in Texas, it still is responsible for more deaths between the ages of fifteen and forty-five than any other disease. And this fact exists even though the majority of tuberculosis patients could have their condition arrested if it were recognized early and proper treatment applied.

"Treatment of the early recognized case is essential. It is of equal importance, from a public health viewpoint, that the spread of this fact would result in the saving of thousands of lives.

"When a diagnosis of active tuberculosis has been made, examinations of all of the other members of the immediate family should follow as a matter of course. Tuberculosis runs in families, not because of any special susceptibility to the disease, but because it is communicable, being usually transmitted through close and prolonged contact with the active case."

To reduce the number of deaths by tuberculosis, Dr. Cox suggests periodic examination of all adults, a check-up by physicians of the known active cases and contacts, regular examinations of high school children, isolation or hospitalization of the active tuberculosis case, and a more intelligent application of hygienic living principles.

Governor or O. M. Roberts (the Old Alcalde) uttered two of the most striking statements ever made in the history of Texas. The first was, "Civilization begins and ends with the plow." The other was, "Texas may go to hell but if she does, she will go according to law."

A frequently quoted declaration is that of Mirabeau B. Lamar. The statement is usually given as, "Cultivated mind is the guardian genius of democracy. . . . It is the only dictate that freedom acknowledges and the only security which free men desire." The omitted part is, however, highly important for it qualifies the statement. Here the first part of the quotation is, including the part usually left out:

"Cultivated mind is the guardian genius of democracy and, while guided and controlled by virtue, the noblest attribute of man."

Napoleon had a cultivated mind—plunged the world into war and untold suffering. Education without the ennobling influences of character, without the recognition of the duty we owe to others—in short, education without Christianity is only a training of the mind and not of the heart. "Cultivated mind" should be "guided and controlled by virtue."

## FARM PROGRAM NEWS

### Locker Plant Versus Farm Freezer

Whether to buy a home freezer or rent space in a community food locker—that's a question that many frozen food conscious farm families are trying to decide now.

A good answer to that riddle for an average family of four is a combination of both sides of the question. Food preservation specialist of Texas A & M College Extension Service recommended combining rented locker space with a small home freezer of about six cubic feet—a solution that appears to strike a good balance between cost and convenience.

Here's how it figures, a six foot home cabinet with separate freezing compartment will provide enough space for freezing and storing those fruits and vegetables that are brought in each day until they are ready to be taken to the locker. And when the growing season is over, the cabinet furnishes plenty of storage space for a number of packages of each type of frozen food, as well as space for left over and cooked foods. Assuming that such a home freezer would last 10 years, and figuring in the purchase price and operating costs, a six cubic foot box will cost the family about \$73 a year to own and operate.

Then renting three food lockers, at \$12.50 each, and using locker plant facilities for handling meat, the total cost per year of both the lockers and the home freezer amounts to about \$155. This plan costs a family only a little over \$86 a week more than if they depend entirely upon the community food locker. And in return they have a good supply of frozen foods at home and higher quality fruits and vegetables.

### Training School Scheduled

A training school to qualify individuals as technicians in the artificial insemination of dairy cattle will be held at Texas A. & M. College February 4-14.

Richard E. Burleson, assistant dairy husbandman of the A. & M. College Extension Service, states that the school will be open only to those who will become available as technicians in Texas artificial breeding associations. Enrollment will be limited to ten students.

Qualifications for a technician's position include dairy or farm experience and interest in dairying, and a high school education.

Burleson announces that prospective artificial breeding technicians who wish to take the training course should send an enrollment application along with their qualifications, to the Dairy Husbandry Department, Texas A. & M. College, College Station, Texas.

Individuals accepted for enrollment will be notified.
