Dr. Cox said, "but despite having been reduced to fifth place in Texas, it still is responsible for more deaths between the ages of fifteen and forty-five than any other disease. Tuberulosis runs in families, not because of any especial susceptibility to the disease, but because it is communicable, being usually transmitted in the cemetery there. She died in
