### POULTRY FLOCKS SHOULD BE CHECKED BEFORE FALL SEASON

If the poultry flock was neglected during the busy harvest season the fall should not be allowed to pass without a complete check upon the health and sanitation of the

A thorough cleaning and sprayhealth precautions for young birds. Worming should be done before the houses are cleaned. After cleaning, the houses should be sprayed with substance containing anthracen il, such as carbolineum one part, and kerosene four to five parts. This will control blue bugs, fleas, ice and mites, and even help repel flies and mosquitoes. A mixture of sulphur, ten parts, and rotenone of derris, one part, dusted on the birds will help repel lice, blue bugs, fleas, mosquitoes, red bugs and mites.

Under most conditions, young birds approaching production should be vaccinated for fowl pox. Better results will be hed by using the feather-follicle method, which is done by plucking two or three feathers on the thigh and swabbing the spot with vaccine. Meanwhile, cull birds light in weight and those having gray eyes. They probably are affected with range paralysis Green feed which furnishes vitamin A and other essential foods, should be plentifully supplide, along with some good granite grit and oyster shell. The latter helps make egg shells thicker.



Present indications are that the cotton belt will produce 10 percent less cottonseed meal and cake than last year, and no increase in the amount of peanut meal and cake is promised. An adequate supply of wheat, oats or barley pasture which during the fall and winter will analyze about 20 percent protein, dry basis, will relieve the shortage of protein and roughage. When grazing small grain pasture the required protein content of the grain mixture fed to dairy cows at milking time would be 12 percent. Such mixture can be made with little cottonseed meal or other high protein feed. For example, 100 lbs. of ground ear corn or 100 lbs. of grain sorghum heads, 100 lbs. of ground oats or barley, and 20 lbs. of cottonseed mea would give a mixture containing 12 percent protein. With small grain pasture or league hay, this
