BALTIMORE, Sept. 23 (AP)—Maxwell C. Byers, president of the Western Maryland Railway Company, was shot to death, and Dudley G. Gray, vice-president, was fatally wounded in the office of Byers at the railroad company's headquarters here today.

### Ex-Convict Is Guarded From Mob Violence

SOUTH BEND, Ind., Sept. 23 (AP)—George Sherman Myers, 40-year-old ex-convict, was held under close guard at Michigan City, Ind., today for the kidnapping and slaying August 27, of 8-year-old Marvaine Appel.

Authorities here said that Myers made two complete confessions of the assault and slaying, one to prosecutors who questioned him repeatedly following his arrest last Saturday, and another to Sheriff Thomas A. Goodrick. If convicted Myers will face the death penalty.

Because of fear of mob violence, authorities issued denials of the confessions when word of Myers' admissions first got abroad. Then Myers was rushed by automobile to the state prison, with shotgun squads preceding and following his car, as a precaution to insure his safety.

Later it was learned that Myers had been trapped in conflicting statements and officers said he had suddenly broken down and dictated the confessions.

Walking from his own home four blocks away, Myers admitted passing the Appel residence, officers said, making acquaintance of the girl. He stopped to talk to her on the night of August 27, officers said, and lured her to the barn where she was strangled with a piece of wire, because, his confession said, he feared exposure if she left the barn alive.

He decided the next day, according to his confession, that he would be safer if the body were discovered, at once so he returned to the barn. Then, according to his admissions, he carried the body down an alley and left it where the first passing motorist would discover it.

The brutality of the crime aroused South Bend and a frantic search for clues was conducted. Jack Stamper, formerly a roomer at the Appel home was arrested, but no evidence was produced against him. Several days after the slaying the authorities found the place where the little girl had been held captive and slain—in the loft of an unused barn. Constable Surup continued his hunt for the unidentified "George" until Myers was located. Myers, according to officers, was married once but divorced. His two children were adopted by an-

### GRIP ON STEERING WHEEL ALTARS MAN'S FINGERPRINTS

LYONS, France (AP)—The steering wheel mark has been added to the list of unusual finger prints.

A taxicab driver arrested after an accident showed a thumb print in which the letters B E S N stood out as if written in white ink. Nothing was visible on the thumb, but repeated prints showed the same mysterious letters.

The case for a while stumped the police laboratory of Lyons, one of the most noted in the world. The riddle was solved by a young Chinese, Leung Yui Fan, assistant to the director of the bureau, Dr. Lo-card.

Leung found on the driver's steering wheel raised letters of a trade mark, among them the letters B E S N combination. He found also that in gripping the wheel this driver's hands were usually in the same place, and that the balls of his thumbs had these raised letters pressed against them for long periods.

Interference with blood pressure accounted for the letters, leaving their impress in the thumb prints. Leung's study of criminology is part of a seemingly undying quest to crack down a forger. He was born in Canton, China, came to other family. He had been employed on odd jobs here recently.

### Col-Tex Plea Discussed At Oil Hearing

Commission Takes New Application Under Advisement

FORT WORTH, Sept. 23.—Request of the Col-Tex Refining Company of Colorado to purchase 2,500 barrels additional sweet oil from the Chalk pool in Howard and Glascock counties was taken under advisement by the state railroad commission yesterday after a hearing here.

Warner Clark, California company, Dallas, whose company owns a half interest in the Col-Tex Refinery, asked that the request be considered in light of an emergency. He said the refinery is not equipped to use more than 2,500 barrels daily of the "sour" oil and that wells in the Chalk pool to which its line is connected, have been unable to produce the available supply to 2,600 barrels daily. Contracts which Col-Tex is now attempting to fill require an additional 2,400 barrels daily of "sweet" oil.

Clark said arrangements will be made within approximately 90 days to either secure additional "sweet" oil from other sources or remodel the refinery to permit use of "sour" oil in larger quantities.

W. L. Todd, Nims Oil Company, Dallas, voiced the most determined opposition to permitting Col-Tex to increase its runs from the shallow "sweet" oil area saying that to discontinue production in the Chalk pool will curtail purchases of the deep "sour" oil by pipe line companies who are buying in both district E. E. Andrews, proration umpire of

Howard and Glascock counties, disagreed with Todd saying there will be little, if any difference noted through granting the permit.

The anticipated charges of discrimination in purchases in the area, failed to materialize. Representatives of the Pure Oil Company stated that proration of production in the Chalk pool is forcing its leases containing twelve wells to lose money. However, they claimed operating expenses and income will show a small profit if the wells are permitted to produce their maximum.

R. D. Parker, chief supervisor of the oil and gas division of the railroad commission and C. V. Terrell, railroad commissioner, were in charge of the hearing.

### Baptist Church To Be Organized

Organization of a Baptist church at the West Side Baptist Mission before the close of the revival meeting now being conducted by Rev. George G. Hamilton, missionary of the Big Spring Baptist Association was announced at the services last night.

Revival services are being held each night at 7:45. Greater interest is being manifested at each succeeding service.

The mission was begun in June and has operated as an afternoon Sunday School for the past three months. Although no church organization existed preaching services usually followed the Sunday School which has been superintended by Rev. E. L. Whitaker.

The mission was established with the organization of a church as the end in view and those responsible for the mission think that now is the opportune time for the organization. A nucleus is being found.

Last night Rev. Hamilton pointed out the need of another church by stating that a survey disclosed fifteen hundred Baptist in Big Spring without local church affiliation.

### Jack Diamond Back Following Ousting

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 23 (AP)—Jack (Legs) Diamond, New York gangster, who was deported from Germany and arrived here yesterday on the steamer Hannover, was today ordered to leave the city.

Diamond was arrested yesterday as a suspicious character and given a hearing today before a police magistrate, who gave him an hour to leave town.

As he left the court room flanked by two New York lawyers, Diamond announced that he was leaving for New York as soon as he could make arrangements.

### Scout Leaders Set Dates For Second School

Fifteen members of troop committees, scoutmasters, assistants and local councilmen met at the First Christian church Monday evening with A. C. Williamson, area executive, and Marcus Williamson, assistant area executive, Buffalo Trail council, Boy Scouts of America, and decided to conduct a second scout leader's training school here, beginning Thursday evening, Oct. 16, with weekly sessions to Nov. 20.

Considerable attention was given to plans for financing the area and the local work in 1931. Total subscriptions to scouting here this year were \$1,984.80 of which \$1,674.84 has been paid. Sweetwater is the highest contributor in the area, having subscribed \$2,354, all of it having been paid except about \$50.

A. C. Williamson explained a system of troop rating to be put into operation Oct. 1. Troops will be rated on regularity of meetings, regularity of attendance, advancement of members and amount of camping and hiking.

### Nurse Passes Second Week In Glass "Lung"

CHICAGO, Sept. 23 (AP)—The thirteenth day may augur hard luck for some folk, but it dawned with bright prospects for Frances McGann, 25-year-old student nurse, who is living with the aid of a respirator at a Chicago hospital.

Tomorrow Miss McGann will complete two weeks in the glass and aluminum "lung" which has kept her alive since Sept. 11 when infantile paralysis impaired the functions of her chest muscles.

"Miss McGann has gained considerable strength in the last 24 hours," hospital officials said today. "She had seven hours of normal sleep last night, is eating substantial food in good quantities, and responding to treatment most satisfactorily.

"It will be some time before she will have enough strength, however, to breathe without aid. Attendants remove her only for a few minutes at a time, to make her more comfortable in the respirator, and at these times she has great difficulty in breathing."

### Abilene Business Men Underwrite Tickets

ABILENE, Texas, Sept. 23 (AP)—More than 100 Abilene business men today underwrote the sale of 7,000 50-cent tickets to the West Texas fair, opening here next Monday, to be used Wednesday, Oct. 1, officially designated as "Abilene Loyalty Day." Committees will attempt to sell 10,000 of the tickets.

Five minutes after the city wide sale opened the police department, numbering 30, reported itself 100 per cent sold.

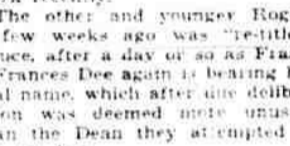

Dr. Butte Out As G. O. P. Nominee For Governor

DALLAS, Sept. 23. (AP)—Dr. George C. Butte of Austin, Republican nominee for governor, today withdrew as a candidate in a letter to the state executive committee, meeting in special session here.

Dr. Butte, now in Washington, where he is serving as a special assistant to the solicitor general of the United States in a letter to the committee, revealed that he had tendered his resignation as the party nominee prior to the Republican state convention in San Angelo, but that it was not accepted. He said he was "thoroughly convinced" that I am not now the logical candidate.

Immediately after Dr. Butte's telegram of withdrawal had been read, the G. O. P. leaders went into executive session to choose a successor. They also had to select nominees for attorney general, railroad commissioner, lieutenant governor and controller as the primary nominees for those offices had declined to make the races.

Dr. Butte was the Republican nominee for governor in 1924 when Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson the Democratic nominee, was elected in spite of a sizeable revolt within the Democratic party. He was nominated in the Republican primary last July when the Democrats reduced their 11-man field to a choice between Mrs. Ferguson and Ross S. Sterling of Houston, Sterling winning the nomination in the August run-off.

Dr. Butte said in his letter that he resigned the nomination "with the sincere conviction that a more effective candidate is available."

JONES, AFTER FOURTH TITLE, RETURNS TO COURSE WHERE 14 YEARS AGO HE BURST INTO GOLF FAME

Jimmy Johnston, present title-holder, and Johnny Goodman, who upset Jones last year, are among the crack amateurs who seeking to halt his march.

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Will Bobby Jones reach the apex of golf career on the links that first gave him national fame—the Merion course?

Holder of the British Open and Amateur titles and the American Open crown, he has only to win the American Amateur event beginning September 22 at the Merion Cricket club to be the monarch of all he surveys in golf, a position never before attained.

Bobby was only 14 years old when he entered the national amateur championship at Merion in 1916.

Before the second round was over, Jones became the dramatic

figure of the tournament and golf writers of those days were referring to Bobby as the "infant prodigy" the "wonder boy from Atlanta."

Bobby qualified in the medal play with a score of 163, against the 153 of W. C. Fownes, Jr., of Pittsburgh, the medalist.

In the first round E. M. Byers, of Pittsburgh, a former national champion, expected an easy time of it but Bobby eliminated him, 3 and 1. In the second round he met and defeated 4 and 2, Frank Dyer, of Montclair, N. J., the Pennsylvania state champion.

By this time, Jones had the gallery, but the sterling play of Robert A. Gardner, his next opponent, and the limelight was too much for the 14-year-old boy and the national champion with his experience defeated the youngster, 5 and 3. In the final round Gardner was beaten by Chick Evans.

Bobby came back to the Merion course eight years later—1924—to win further fame by capturing his first national amateur title in defeating George Von Elm, 9 and 8.

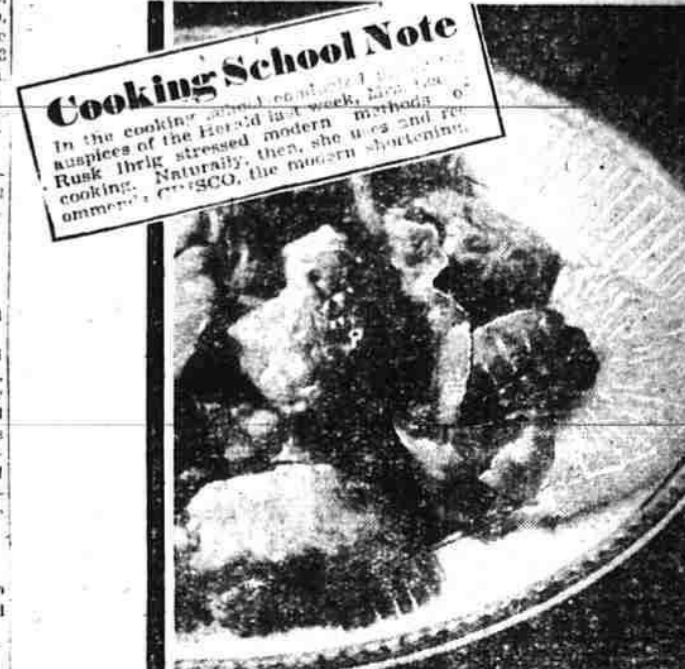

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CONNIE MACK HIS 50 YEARS IN BASEBALL by ALAN GOULD

No. 8—A Question of Brains The super-team that won four American League pennants and three world's championships in five years under Connie Mack's leadership, 1910 to 1914, always has represented the peak of the old master's achievements.

It was Mack's greatest pride, though he enjoyed more personal satisfaction in piloting another world's championship club 15 years later. It was the foremost example of his organizing genius, though its break-up in 1914 was a bitter blow to him.

"When the team was broken up it could have gone along winning pennants for about five more years had not a combination of circumstances compelled me to tear apart a team that it took much effort to put together."

"He was the greatest 'one-gam' pitcher I ever knew. I used to tell the Chief to get ready to pitch on a certain date. He granted assent. I might not see him for days, but on the appointed date he would appear, ready and fit, usually unbeatable."

For catchers he (Mack) had only material that other managers had turned down. Death robbed him of his star backstop, Doc Powers, at the opening of the struggle, and he had to depend on Ira Thomas, whom Hugh Jennings (manager of Detroit) had discarded. His infield consisted of one veteran, Harry Davis at first, Baker at third, Nichols at short and Collins at second all were practically novices. In the outfield his two veterans, Hartel and Danny Murphy, were reputed to be going back.

Rayburn Brown won the tennis championship of the Big Spring tournament Monday afternoon by defeating Curt Bishop in the finals 3-7, 6-2, 9-7.

Playing in a small tennis tournament made really good tennis impossible. Bishop adopted a new tactic, Bishop, unable to volley against the tall former Southwestern star, drove everything hit his way with all of his force while Brown played consistent tennis, forcing Bishop's backhand continuously. The first set was a long drawn out affair, Bishop coming from behind to tie the games after trailing at 3-5 and Brown breaking through his opponent's service to take the set.

The rally seemed to break the spell under which Bishop was playing, for the champion won five straight games before his opponent could win his service to duce the games. Brown was trailing again as he dropped his service, but playing against the wind he drove his opponent's service to tie the set at 6 all.

With the wind at his back Brown swept out the match. Bishop's backhand was weak indeed in the last two games as he wilted under the savage chopping attack, but he fought off defeat long enough to tie the games at 7-all before succumbing for the second time to the blonde-haired Southwestern star.

Brown's victory brought him his second title of the tournament as he paired with Tom Hutto to defeat H. B. Dunagan and Bishop in the doubles final Sunday afternoon 6-4, 7-5, 7-3.

(AP)—The spoils that Texas League champions have cast over the Southern Association's standard bearer for eleven years held again yesterday as the Fort Worth Panthers defeated the Memphis Chickadees in the fifth game of the Dixie Series and brought the championship back to Texas.

By taking four out of five from the slugging Chickadees, the Cats gave the Texas League its ninth victory since the club was inaugurated in 1929. It was Fort Worth's sixth triumph in the seven years the Cats have represented the Texas League. Likewise it marked the third time that a Memphis team had tried and failed.

The Chickadees today were bound for home, dejected and ready to disband. The victorious Cats, still feeling a lot of baseball in their systems after two hard-fought series, prepared to start on their annual barnstorming tour through West Texas.

In humbling the Southern Association champions, the Cats completely upset the dope. They did it, furthermore, without any assistance from Ed Stoner, ace of their mound staff, who was injured in the Texas League playoff against Wichita Falls.

Doc Whitworth proved the individual hero of the series, pitching and winning two games, including the decisive fray yesterday. He was credited with one victory, the opener at Memphis and Herb Thompson got credit for the triumph by pitching one inning of the third game. Walt Beck gave the Chickadees their triumph when he pitched one and two-thirds innings in the final game Sunday.

The smallest crowd of the series, less than 2,500 witnessed the closing round. Local fandom cooled perceptibly when Stoner failed to start Sunday's game after it had been announced he would pitch. However, physicians who examined the star's injured wrist yesterday declared it would have been impossible for him to work.

After being all but helpless before Beck's curves the previous day, the Panthers put on their slugging clothes and hammered three opposing pitchers unmercifully to sweep the championship yesterday. Kelly, who started, and Walker and Shepherd, his successors, looked alike to the aroused fans as they bunched 16 hits over La Grava Field.

When a person has actually died you are justified in saying that that was how and when he was to die. That while any man is still living the how and when of his death are uncertainties. Not to dodge an approaching automobile or not to label the poisons in the medicine cabinet, on the ground that "what is going to be will be" is simply to determine the "will be" for yourself. Every man who avoids a threatening danger shows that he believes he has some control over the events of his own life.

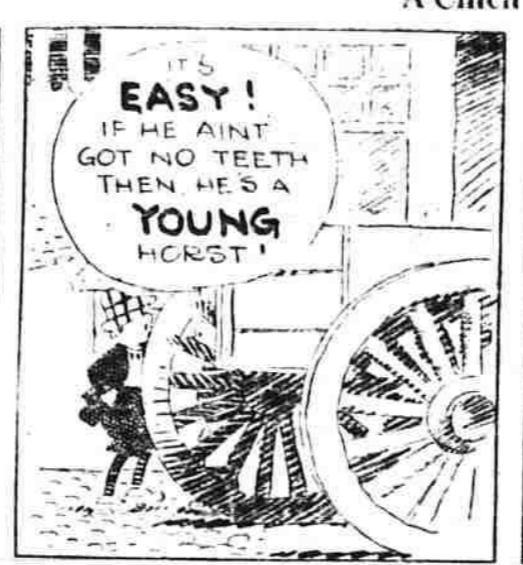

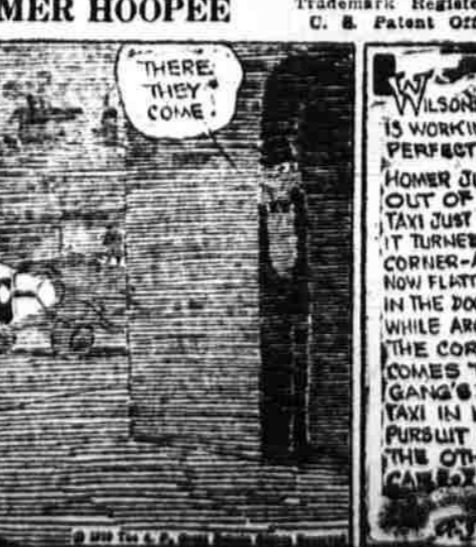

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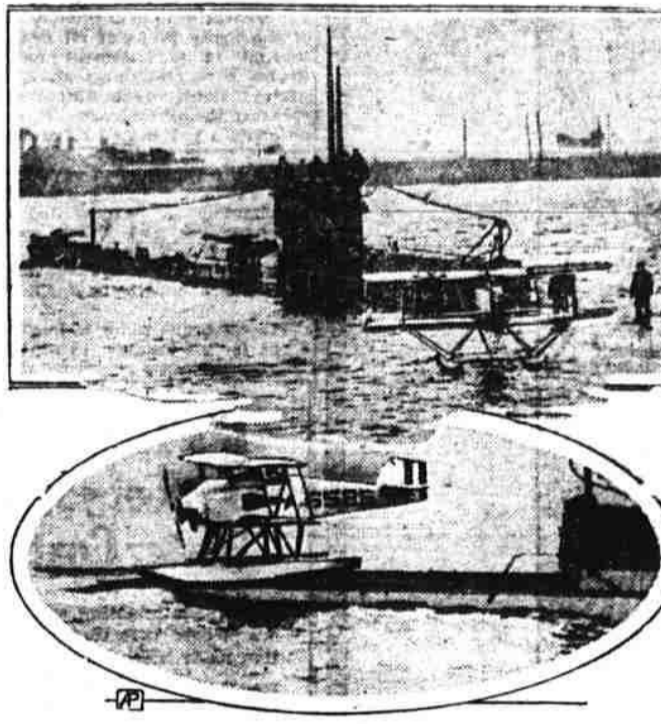
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Vestpocket Plane Will Be Carried By Sub. WASHINGTON (AP)—A vestpocket seaplane to be tucked away in a submarine is being developed by the navy to supply an "aerial eye" for undersea fighters. It will have folding wings and be stowed in a watertight compartment flush with the submarine deck. The plane will be a scout, a fast ship carrying only a pilot and to be used for extending the range of vision of the undersea boats for collecting information. Though no submarine has been designed for the experiments, it is planned to start tests with the tiny flier as soon as it is completed. Modern types of undersea craft available for the construction of a special carrying compartment include the V-1, 2 and 3, of 1,900 tons each, and the V-4, 4 and 6, of 2,800 tons each. Their width varies from 17 1/2 to 33 1/2 feet. In the new development, which has been undertaken to place at last one airplane on every ship in the battle line, the navy will draw on experiences of seven years ago when a submarine plane was built and tested. A large cylinder was built on the deck of the S-1, a smaller submarine than later types, for carrying the dismantled plane which was assembled for each flight. The scheme was abandoned as unsatisfactory. Instead of the cylinder, which cut down the submarine's underwater speed, it is planned in the new experiment to have a compartment under the deck with its top part of the deck. For launching, the submarine would come to the surface, the compartment "lid" opened, and the plane unfolded and floated on its pontoons when it another ship submerged. On the return, the submarine would be partially submerged and the plane taxied over its compartment and carried free of the water when the boat rose to the surface.

The program included the Pioneer's Jubilee roping contests, a rodeo, the West Texas band contest and the horse show. One hundred horses were entered in the four daily races starting Tuesday, when the Midland and Texon teams planned to open a polo series. Other features during the week included a merchant's style show Thursday night, coronation of the Queen of West Texas Friday night, a football game Saturday between Sul Ross State Teachers College of Alpine and the Schreiner Institute of Kerrville and finals in the terrapin derby. A principal feature of the exposition was the showing of high grade live stock, including official exhibits of the sheep and goat raisers association of Texas, with judging by Texas A. and M. College instructors.

(Continued from Page 1) — meetings, fuel conservation meetings and instruction schools for apprentices.

Downstairs is the division storekeeper's offices and the storeroom in it are hundreds of bins, each containing a certain article in various quantities arranged in order according to the company's official catalog of parts for locomotives, cars and, in fact, every thing from the smallest bolt to the largest bearing and wheels.

In connection with the division storekeeper's department is an oil house, 40 by 40 feet, equipped with the Bowser system of pumps. Tanks of the many kinds of oil used are located in a basement and oil drawn through pumps above the ground floor which automatically measure the various oils. Tanks also contain paints and other liquids needed in the shops.

The car repair shed is 40 by 60 feet, capable of taking care of approximately 125 cars at any time. Air hammers, and other modern equipment are located adjacent to the shed. Nearby is the lumber shed, 28 by 40 feet, where lumber is finished for cars.

The air brake room, 18 by 40 feet, cares for all repairs to air brake

equipment of freight and passenger cars.

The waste reclaiming plant, in a 15 by 36-foot brick building contains equipment used in reclaiming journal box packing.

The car foreman's office, wash and locker rooms for car department employees are in a 32 by 54-foot brick building.

The blacksmith and boiler shop building, 42 by 123 feet, not yet completed, is located immediately east of the round house and machine shop. It will be a steel building.

The machine shop, 60 by 180 feet, also housing the tool room and switchboard for all electrical appliances of the shops, is one of the most interesting places on the grounds. Many huge pieces of machinery, tools used in rearing and reconditioning the hundreds of locomotive parts. The switchboard is one of the finest manufactured. All machines are electrically driven.

The coppermith's shop and brass foundry, of brick, is 30 by 30 feet.

A 30 by 70-foot brick building houses wash and locker rooms for locomotive department employees. There are steel lockers, showers hot and cold running water. The building is in three compartments, one for white men, Mexicans and negroes.

The round house, containing 23 stalls each 120 feet measure 300 feet around the inner circle from end to end.

The Texas & Pacific's largest engine is the 'Texas Type' which is 43.4 inches long. The round house stalls are 121 feet long and the huge turntable 100 feet long. The turn table is equipped with three-point bearing so that engines can be turned at any point placed on the table without the necessity of balancing required in the old pivot-center bearing type.

A building housing the assistant master mechanic's office, with wash and locker rooms covers ground space measuring 30 by 85 feet. Lockers, wash room and toilet facilities of the most modern type are provided for engineers and firemen and all shop and round house men.

The power house, a tall brick structure, is 48 by 100 feet. Its two 600-horsepower water tube boilers are of the latest design. The process used in steaming locomotives already has been explained.

The sand house, with sand towers, is 18 by 50 feet. It is built of corrugated asbestos and concrete and is for the purpose of drying and storing sand.

Locomotive tool and die house, 20 by 25 feet.

The engine shop and car in section, already far different from the 'Big Frame' smokehouse structure of 1915, now is a brick structure, 30 by 60 feet, appropriate for the work. It contains showers, lockers and other accommodations.

The D. & M. cleaning system has been installed for washing locomotives on the round house. Oil water and air are used to give each engine a 'bath' when it arrives. After this it is driven over the inspected for defects.

All buildings are equipped for steam heat. Radiators are of vertical type placed along walls and

moved from the floors, and located between openings, such as windows and doors.

Mr. Gray, 61, came to Baltimore in 1914, one year after he became connected with the railroad. Previously, he had started his railroad career with the Baltimore & Ohio after attending public schools in his native state, Ohio, and attending Ohio State University.

When he resigned from the service of the Baltimore & Ohio in 1913, Mr. Gray was general freight agent of the company at Pittsburgh.

Mr. Evers, who was 52, was elected president of the Western Maryland on March 1, 1920, and in 1926 he became also chairman of the board of directors.

He succeeded to the presidency when Carl R. Gray was elected president of the Union Pacific. He was then Gray's assistant.

Police said a clerk in the railroad company offices, the first to seek entry into the executive office, had been seriously cut by broken glass when he sought to force the door, and was taken to a hospital. They hoped later to obtain some information from him as to the events before the shooting.

Officials also said they had learned that there had been differences between the president and vice-president over certain litigation in which the railroad was involved.

## Oil Production Shows Increase

TULSA, Okla., Sept. 23. (AP)—The daily average production of crude oil in the United States, for the week ended September 20 was 2,410,744 barrels, in increase of 2,737 over that for the preceding week, the Oil and Gas Journal estimates. The output of light gravity oil declined 1,481 barrels, but an increase in the heavy oil yield more than offset the drop.

Increased production in the Oklahoma City and Seminole fields caused Oklahoma's output to jump from 548,705 to 662,810 barrels.

The total for the Mid-continent area, including both light and heavy gravity oils, was 1,272,643 barrels, or 7,325 under the preceding week's figure. Declines in West

Texas, North Central Texas, and the Texas Panhandle accounted largely for the decrease. West Texas production was down 5,893 barrels at 272,117; North Central Texas showed a loss of 12,897 with an output of 103,250 barrels; and the Texas Panhandle had a decline of 2,633 barrels at 81,761. Kansas production was 116,920 barrels, a drop of 1,265.

Eastern production remained unchanged at 120,000 barrels. The Rocky Mountain area registered an increase of 3,559 with a yield of 13,418 barrels.

California light oil production was 322,500 barrels, an increase of 2,500. Heavy oil production in that state held unchanged at 89,000 barrels.
