"The upward trend in general bus-iness activity which began in July has nob yet been reversed, but during the past three weeks the rate of increase has slackened considerably, and there are indications that a temporary recession in industrial activity may occur early in the new year," Dr. Buechel pointed out. "Nothwithstanding this possibility, the outlook for next spring and the entire year 1936 is distinctly promising. 
