



Sources of Pollution

In the countles of Brown. Coleman, Comanche, Callahan, Eastland and Erath there are approximately 3,000 off wells producing about 8,000 barrels of oil daily. Many of these wells will produce as much as 15.1 ratio between salt water to oil. Much of this water will be three times as salty as the ocean water, believe it or not. Now, for example let me show you by citing an actual case of an oil well operation and try to show the reader the extreme importance of pollution from our Texas oil fields. One well produces eleven barrels of oil daily and is making 8 barrels of salt water per barrel of oil. This makes 88 barrels of salt water daily, 2,640 barrels monthly and 31,680 barrels yearly. This lease has other wells that are making about the same amount of oil and water. From this, one can see that it would be a problem for the oil operators to control this volume of water in reservoirs as required by law, but it is being done. When the salt water does leave a lease the salinity of the receiving body of water is continuously increasen till no fish or vegetation can exist in the stream.

Wastes from cities produce another major pollution problem. It world be surprising to the average ritizen, if he knew the amount of oil, carbide, salt water and other pollution substances that go down the storm sewers of our cities. All this goes down the streams and here it is to be used for drinking water and for the use of livestock. Factories, manufacturing plants and refineries contribute much to the pollution of our streams.



Cotton Improvement,

College Station, Texas Only 8.5 percent of the 1938 Texas cotton crop (up to December 1) was under 7-8 inch in staple length as compared with 16.7 percent in 1937: 65 percent of the crop graded white middling or better in 1938 and 53 percent in 1937; and the average staple length increased by 1-32 in h.

Progress in the move to improve the quarty of Texas cotton was seen in these USDA Bureau of Agricultural Economics figures by F. E. Lichte, cotton gin specialist of the Texas A. and M. College

Lichte has long contended that improvements in gin equipment cannot take care of sloven harvesting practices, and his annual report shows that there was a 10 percent increase in the amount of cotton picked and a corresponding drop in the percentages snapped, sledded and gathered as bollies.

His figures show 71.7 percent picked, 24.4 snapped, .3 percent sledded, and 3.6 gathered as bollies in 1988 as contrasted with 61.5 pickled, 30.5 snapped, .5 percent as bollies in the preceeding year.

Plans for Spring Fat Stock Announced

The Spring F.F.A. and 4-H club fat stock show sponsored by the Callahan County Club will be held Saturday, February 25, in Baird. The show will start at 9:00 a.m. and it is expected, that a large group of fat calves, sheep, hogs and capons will be shown to compete be offered.

F.F.A. and club boys are asked to notify E. E. Jones, vocational agriculture instructor at Baird or Ross Brison, county agent, of the number and kind of live stock they will exhibit, not later than February 20, in order that arrangements may be completed for properly caring for the animals at the show.

Premiums will be offered for the best calves weighing over 800 pounds and for the best calves weighing usder 800 pounds. For hog premiums will be offered for the best hogs weighing over 180 pounds, and for the best hogs weighing under 180 pounds.

In the fine wooled fat lambs or mutton sheep division, all animals will be exhibited in one class. The same applies to capons.

All worthy animals shown will receive a cash premium.

The number of hogs, sheep, or capons that may be exhibited by one boy is limited to 2 head. All entries for premiums must be by Baird F.F.A. or 4-H boys.

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
