## To Be Hatching In Lew, Grassy Spots

In spite of estimates to the contrary a few farmers and ranchmen over the county report an alarming Leslie Bryant of Baird was in number of grasshoppers hatching out in low grass land.

"This is unfortunate but we have on hand 90 sacks of bran and an ample supply of sedium arsenite that can be used this year as in. the past to poison them," announces Ross Brison, county agent.

A county grasshopper committee composed of Quincy Loven, Jim W. Plowman has been appointed to help carry on this work.

This year as in the past 100 pounds of bran and sodium arsenite will be furnished by the government. The farmer or ranchman is expected to furnish 100 pounds of bran, cottonseed hulls, or some other acceptable substitute. All materials must be thoroughly mixed with water before leaving the mixing station. Due to the small numbers of grasshoppers there will be only one mixing station this year, at Baird. This station will be open only three days per week, namely Monday, Wednesday, and Saturday. If the county agent is not in the office arangements have been made for some other authority to be present and assist in the mix-
