Air must circulate between the wall and box to carry away the heat generated by the unit, so there should be at least two and a half inches of space between the box and wall, she explains.



#### January 31 To Be Deadline For AAA All Crop Insurance

January 31, 1947, is the final date for Callahan County farmers to sign an application for All-Risk Federal Crop Insurance on the 1947

The 1947 cotton insurance contract offers protection to cotton growers from all unavoidable causes and in addition, the farmer has a wider choice of the insurance coverage desired since insurance is offered on three levels.

All Callahan County farmers planning to plant cotton in 1947 are invited to call at the AAA office for a detailed explanation of cotton insurance program before the closing date, January 31, 1947.

#### COOK PORK PRODUCTS WELL, SAYS DR. COX TO PREVENT DISEASE

Now that winter season is here and pork and pork products are more freely used, warning agains insufficient cooking of pork is given by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. Trichinosis is caused by a parasite in the muscles of pigs. This parasite may occur

in large numbers in infested meat. Dr. Cox explained that a disease condition known as trichinosis is caused by a microscopic organism call the trichina or muscle worm. The young worms, or larvae, are found in the muscles of infected pigs. When this meat is eaten raw or is undercooked, the unharmed larvae grow in the human intestines into adult worms which are carried by the lymphatic tissue and blood stream to the muscles where they become encysted. This period of invasion gives rise to the symptoms of the disease. The severity of the illness is dependent upon the number of trichinae con-

"While the adult parasites are in the human intestines they may cause acute diarrhea," Dr. Cox said, "which at first can be mistaken for typhoid fever or dysentery. This may start anywhere from the first to the fourth day after eating the infested pork and may last one to several days. Later a puffiness of the eyes may appear together with various degrees of pain in the muscles, particularly those of the calf of the leg, the upper arm, the shoulders and the

Dr. Cox declared that since no vention is very important. The worms cannot be seen by the unaided eye, so inspection of pork cannot be depended upon to protect from this type of infection. The only safe guard is to be cer tain that all pork and pork products are thoroughly cooked, whether processed at home or purchased. Many of the more serious and fatal cases have been traced to eating raw smoked sausage or raw pork pudding.

Since it has been estimated that approximately five per cent of allswine are infested with trichinae, it is being emphasized that the invariable rule before consuming any pork or pork product is to see that it is cooked until all natural color is gore and no evidence of blood can be detected. This is the only safe rule to follow, according to the State Health Officer.

#### JOHN PURVIS REPORTS FERTILIZER PAID OFF HANDSOMELY FOR HIM

An advocatee of the fact that fertilizer pays handsome dividends when peanuts are planted in depleated soil is John Purvis, who farms eight miles North of Cross Plains. One of the largest yields of the past season was produced by Mr. Purvis. It netted 60 bushels to the acre and was raised on a poorer portion of his place.

Mr. Purvis had only a small tract of depleated land but with fertilizer it paid off just as well as did the better land, which was also fertilized. 'Fertilizer is worth twice it's

cost on poor land but is of doubtful value on new, strong land", Mr. Pervis says.




