CISCO HONORED GOVERNOR ALLRED

Governor James V. Allred, candidate for second term reelection, was honored by a large group of Cisco's leading citizens and others of nearby towns with a luncheon at the Laguna Hotel Tuesday. With Governor Allred present, the group sang "America," followed by the invocation by Mr. McKissick, prosident of Randolph College. B. A. Butler, publisher of the Cisco Laily Press, was tosatmaster. Selections were furnished by the German section of the Lobo Band of Cisco hibh school, directed by R. L. Maddux. Julian Ely played "A Perfect Day" on the xylophone.

Mr.Butler introduced Frank Sparks of Eastland, who then introduced others from Eastland; Bill Tyler introduced those from Rising Star; J. C. Walker inroduced those from Gomman; Fred Cook those from Putnam; Witt Galloway of Ranger was introduced. Gloria Graham of Cisco gave a violin solo, accompanied by Miss Wilda Dragoo of Eastland.

Governor Allred was introduced by Mr. Butler amid much applause as the crowd was standing and the band playing "The Eyes of Texas.'. He expressed his appreciation of the Cisco folk and the nice luncheon tendered him. He spoke eloquent words upon the subject of The Texas Centennial. He said, "We are in need today of the type of men who built Texas 100 years ago." He immortalized the lives of San Houstor and Stephen F. Austin, our great Texas history characters. He said their courage should be an example to us, and that we should be proud we are Texans. He spoke of considering the office of Centennial governer of Texas as second only to the actors on the stage of Texas 100 years ago.

The governor spoke of being surprised upon some of his trips out of our immense state to find that the eyes of the world are on Texas, because of her glorious celebration of 100 years of independence.

COTTON OUTLOOK AND REVIEW

On last Wednesday the government gave out its first acreage report on cotton for the season and placed the acreage at 31,621,000 acres in cultivation as of July 1st. This was smaller than the trade had expected as the average of the private reports was about thirty-one million two hundred and fifty thousand acres. Immediately after the report a buy-, ing wave set in which carried prices/ about three dollars a bale higher, and to the highest point for more than two years. The market will be weather affair more or less from now on as we will get the first estimate on the size of the crop on August 8th. Allowing for an average abandonment during the past ten years amounting to 2.3 percent it would leave an acreage of 29,917,000 acres to be gathered. There is every reason to believe that the acreage adandomnent will equal if not be more than the ten year average, since the eastern states have had the most severe drought in recent years and again the western states and especially Texas nave had floods which have done great damage to the crop and it would seem from the present outlook that we would have a crop of about 12,000,-000 bales. 




