HIGH-DENSITY PLYWOOD Of great importance to Texas timber owners are the new discoveries in the use of plywood in increasing quantity by various industries. Airplane bodies and wings are successfully fashioned and pressed into a tough light structure replacing steel and aluminum needed for other defense uses. Popular birch, redwood, beech and other veneers, cemented with soybean and other glues, are giving utmost satisfaction. There is no inherent eason why Texas airplane manufacturers should not be considering using Texas gum, hickory, cottonwood and probably post oak and blackjack oaks in shaping airplane bodies and wings. The wood is imregnated with a liquid synthetic esin, which may be made from casein of soybeans, casein of milk or phenol-formaldehyde resin. Latest experiments are in the direction of impregnating wood with weak acids under pressure and shaping the semifluid mass into desired paterns which on cooling retain their shape. 
