As soon as right of way for the widening of the Cross Plains to Putnam road is secured the statehighway department is expected to approve a project for the building of a hard surfaced, farm to market, road along the route. This information was given by S. J. Treadway, district engineer for the state highway depart-

ment. The farm to market road will follow the same route as is now being used, Mr. Treadway informed. He pointed out that the purpose of a farm to market read was not to necessarily shorten the distance between two points but to serve as many people as possible and that this can best be accomplished by taking the road by as many homes as pos-

Industry itself which has suffered an erea of political persicution can now prove to labors staunchest ally. Industry knows the havoc that punitive legislative attacks can wreck. It is extremely encouraging that both industrial and labor leadership seem opposed to taking the easy way out, which is to have the government to make all decisions. Once that philosophy became entrenched, both labor and industry would find themselves facing what amounted to a dicta-

torship. We see the bitter harvest of these experiments in the vindicative anti union legislation which is now being carried on in the new Congress.

There are a lot of different ways to feed baby chicks, but every one of the means you really have to be on the job. The outlook for profits in the poultry business is good this year for the man who wants to do a good job of feeding chicks.

Farmers Build Stock In Co-Op Texas farmers doubled their capital investment in cooperative enterprises during the five-year period ending with 1946, reports M. C. Jaynes, specialist in organization and cooperative marketing of the Texas A. & M. College Extension Service.

Figures released by the Houston Bank for Cooperatives show that farmers co-ops have taken good advantage of favorable, business conditions to reduce their debt and build capital. Javnes says

operatives was organized in 1933, 380 Texas farmers' cooperatives have borrowed more than \$171,000,000 and a credit loss of less than five cents on each \$1000 loaned has been sustained by the bank. During 1946, more than \$24,000,000 was loaned by the bank to business organizations of Texas

The 2125 cooperatives now doing business with the bank have about 91,300 individual farm families within their membership, and carry on a wide variety of activities to supplement the actual production of crops and livestock, Large percent of the co-ops are associations of cotton seed. Other cooperatives pack and market fruits and vegetables: store and market wheat, rice and other grains; purchasse feed, seed, fertilizer, gasoline and other suplies necessary for modern farming; and process and market dairy and livestock products.

Every important agricultural product of Texas farms and lanches is handled to some extent by farmers' cooperatives, Janes says. Blackeyed Peas Bring In Cash

Blackeyed peas have developed into a big cash crop in West Texas.

In Dawson and surrounding counties, the 1946 crop of green field peas brought farmers an averports Dawson County Agricultural Agent T. A. Barfield. The blackeled pea acreage in Dawson County alone last year was between 20,000 and 25,000 acres, Bardfield says. Yields were reported to range from

400to 2000 pounds per acre. Commenting on the value of the peas as a cash crop, the county agent states, "Our minumum price at Lamesa was \$80 per ton, and competive buying boosted the top price paid to \$130 per ton. I judge that the average price paid at Lamesa in 1946 was \$100 or\$110 per

son County farmers to restore some "much needed nitrogen" to the soil, Barfield says, as well as bring in cash during the last two dry years that the county has had.

Large acreages were also planted to the peas in Lubbock, Lynn Terry, Bailey, and Hale Counties, says Parfield, and "some fabulous yields" were reported on land under irrigation.

Buyers seem to like the superior quality of the West Texas blackeyed peas the county agent ontinues, "and they tell me that the peas have fuller pool, which make them yield more cans of peas per ton."

He adds that many Dawson County farmers will be planting blackeyed peas as long as there is a market for them.

There are acres in Calaban County that would produce peas abundantly; there's a market for blackeyed ;peas at Brownwood they make a very good summer cover crop or green manure crop and like other loguminous plants enrich the soil by ading nitrogen and organic matter. If the production is here, buyers will come in to buy the produce.




