When the time came for the settlers to fence their farms with barbed wire, roads became a necessity. But when the road proposition came up, like most all other public projects, there was some opposition, and it required a prayer meeting to get the road. I was an attendant at that meeting, which were also 10 or 12 letermined men, some of whom were as good pioneers as ever carved a civilization out of the wilderness. There were two doctors and one preacher in the assembly, which gathered in the narrow road in Front of our home, where the corners of four sections abutted. 



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

Finally, the Lord's Supper is communion, or fellowship, a testimony to the unity of God's people for almost all Christians observe this gracious rite. It is their supreme act of worship. The 231 millions of Roman Catholics, the 144 millions of Greek Orthodox adherents, and the 207 millions associated with the Pro testant bodies hold this sacrament in the nighest esteem.
