WACO - Some 425 high school students from all over Texas were in Waco July 28-31 for the enghth annual High School Students Citizenship Seminar sponsored by the Texas Farm Bureau.

The outstanding youths, selected to attend the seminar on the basis of scholarship and 'eadership, received three days of orientation on the American system and way of life. | Emphasis was placed on the economic, moral, and social aspects of the American society.

Four nationally-known lecturers conducted the courses.

They were: Dr. Clifton Ganus, president of Harding College, Searsy, Arkansas; Dr. C. L. Kay, assistant president of Lubbock Christian College; John Noble, Muncy, Pennsylvania, author of "I Was a Slave in Russia"; and W. Cleon Ekousen, Salt Lake City, author, lawyer, educator, and former FBI agent.

A group of four young convicts from Huntsville related their personal life experiences to the seminar students. This was sponsored by the Department of Corrections as a deterrent to crime. Never relocate plants from a shaded location into intese sunlight, as sunscald will likely result. Plants growing under poor, or improper light conditions will ecome pale in color, weak and spindly, and have small leaves.

Leaf drop will often occur when poor light conditions exist.

One of the most common causes of death in house plants is improper watering. When to water is ofter a perplexing problem. Here is where sound judgment is most needed. The only accurate guage to follow is to water when the soil becomes dry to the touch. In the summer this may mean daily, while during the winter with plants growing in a shaded room, weekly probably s sufficient. The type container, its size, the soil, the plant species and its vgor all affect the amount and frequency of watering.

Spasmodic watering is most injurious. Long intervals of wet and then dry soil result in a poorly formed roo tsystem. Too much water does no tallow sufficient oxygen in the soil, which excessive dryness causes the plant to wilt. The soil for most house plants should be slightly on the dry side rather than wet.

The top several inches may be moist, while the lower area still lacks moisture. Use a watering can or other device which gives a sprinkling action that will not pack the sol or wash it away from the roots. At each watering, the entire soil call should be maistened. To provide for cases of overwatering, all containers should have open drain holes. Many ornamental containers such as glazed vases and jardenieres do not have these holes and over watering is often the cause of death, Watering house plants from the


