PROPOSAL PLAN FOR CHANGING FROM A RE-QUIREMENT OF 16 UNITS FOR GRADUATION TO A REQUIREMENT OF 20 U-NITS FOR GRADUATION

Beginning with the 1958-

59 session all pupils will be required to take five courses plus an activity thus eliminating study halls. (Study halls are seldom used for study but create discipline problems.) Part of each class period will be used for supervised study. He stated that there were farms in that section, as around Ropes, that had not made a crop in seven years, and if the weather did not continue so they couldn't plant, that a bumper crop is due this year.

The farms around Whitharral are much the same as those around Ropes there are those who do not have irrigation wells, and they are the ones who have suffered. The farmer we were talking to stated: "We who have irrigation wells have not made money, but irrigation has allowed us to break even and keep our heads above water. In 1956 I started irrigating in February and continued all through the year." He does thinks no irrigation will be necessary this year.

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


