LISTENING

—Ted Dotts

Perhaps our worst sin as human beings is our failure to listen to our neighbors. This is because listening has to do with more than just hearing words. Listening has to do with getting hold of the feeling that is behind the words. And, with all of us, feeling is born before we push words out of our mouths which describe our feelings. For instance, a man is feeling angry before he says, "I am angry." Or, a young couple is in love before they say, "We are in love."

If all people could say or would say exactly what they feel, then listening would be made easier. But this is not the case. Very often we say one thing but really down in our hearts we mean another. And the good Christian, the man alert to the needs of his neighbor, must listen for this. It is only when we really "hear", when we really feel, the depth of emotion that comes before words, that we can help to heal.

The best example of this is found in the ritual of our churches. There is nothing sacred about the ritual itself—mere words. But the ritual's words seek to do one thing and that is to reveal that which is sacred. It is what is behind the words of the ritual that counts, not the ritual itself. Ritual seeks to reveal God, to bring Him nearer to us. Then, once God is near to us and we understand His will for our lives healing occurs. If we really hear what is behind the ritual, if we begin to understand this Almighty God to which the ritual points, then we can experience healing for our broken lives.

As Christians we must listen to our neighbors. And we dare not listen to just the words that issue forth from their mouths. We must hear the feelings behind the words.

The worst thing we can do is to hear only the words people say and not the real feelings behind the words AND THEN OFFER ADVICE. Advice is easy to give and comes from any living human being you come into contact with. All of us have plenty of advice to give to everybody else. But as people we do not usually need advice near so much as we need someone who will really listen to us and hear us talk from the depths of our being.

There are four words in I John 4:6 which, when lifted out of context, call us all to listen:
"...whoever knows God listens..."

The Ropes FFA Chapter placed a good number of animals in the show ring and the sale. Top winner for the Ropes Chapter was John Bain who showed a first place Duroc barrow and was Reserve Champion Duroc of the show. Bill McCormick showed a second place Hampshire-Yorkshire crossbred barrow to Reserve Champion of the "All Others" breed. This is any hog that does not fall under the six principal pure breeds: Berkshire, Duroc, Poland China, Chester White, Hampshire or Spotted Poland China. Although Bill was second in his class with his medium barrow, he had to win over the lightweight and the heavyweight to become Reserve Champion of this breed.

Several other members placed in the money and received a good price in the sale that was conducted on Saturday afternoon by Auctioneer Hank Matthews. The prices were slightly higher this year than in 1964 at the sale.

Gene Richardson of the Ropes 4-H Club was first in the mediumweight class with his Berkshire barrow. He went on to become Reserve Champion of the Berkshire breed. Paula McCormick was also second and third with her medium and heavy Yorkshire barrows.

The visit is more or less an annual inspection trip to the club by the district official who reports his findings to the Lions International headquarters in Chicago.

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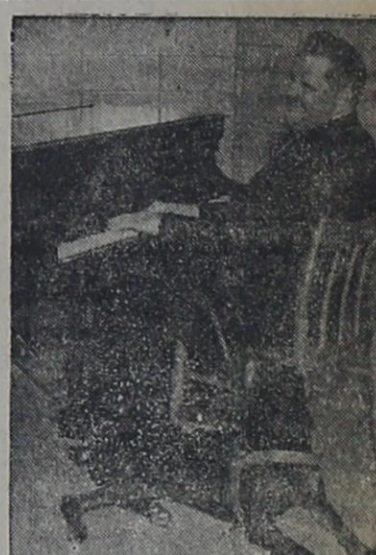
