BROWNFIELD BANK ON TOP

The Brownfield State Bank and Trust Company, which reported deposits of \$13,396,430 on December 31st, gained 481 places in its standing among the 1800 largest banks in the United States during 1958 and now ranks as 1797th largest in size compared with 2278th place at the end of 1957. This is revealed in the 1959 Annual Roll Call of Largest Banks in the United States published today by the daily AMERICAN BANKER of New York, which is the trade newspaper of the banking business. There are 14,000 banks in the United States.

FARM BUREAU HEAD TO SPEAK

Hockley County Farm Bureau officials are preparing for one of the greatest turnouts in history Thursday (tonight) when Texas Farm Bureau President J. H. West pays his first visit to this county.

West will address area farmers and their families at a meeting at 7:30 p.m. at the Womens Building at the Fair Grounds in Levelland.

His appearance will precede the opening of a Bureau membership drive Mar. 9 - 11, in which the county's biggest farm organization hopes to boost its membership past the 1,000 mark for the first time.

West is expected to speak on farm problems which are of vital interest to every individual associated with Agriculture, according to Bureau President Thomas R. Harrison.

West has only recently taken a strong stand on the federal grain sorghum program.

A veteran of 27 years in the Farm Bureau, he wired Secretary Benson a protest against the reduction in grain price supports.

"Cut in price support on grain sorghum to 75 percent of price support of corn came as a shock and surprise to growers of Texas," West told Benson. "Sorghum growers realize that milo must be competitive with corn and that adjustments have to be made when prices are out of line. However, this drastic cut in one year makes adjustments difficult for producers and will impose severe hardships on them."

He also criticized the action as failing to take into account past USDA policies, and warned that it will encourage production of corn in uneconomic areas, which he suggested is contrary to Benson's own philosophy.

West has served as president of the Texas Farm Bureau for the past two years. A graduate of Baylor University, he has taught school and served as president of the school board in his own district.

He has been active in church affairs and served on the agricultural committee which last year went to Europe to study farm problems.

Harrison stressed that West is in a position to discuss agricultural problems not only from a state and national
