2. 2:00 P.M. — Dick Lawson farm, 5 miles west, 4 miles north, and 1 mile west of Levelland. At this farm we will observe a cotton disease, and nematode control demonstration and discuss insect and disease identification and control.

3. 3:30 P.M. — Ed Phillips farm, 3 1-2 miles north and 1 1-2 east of Kaufman Addition. Discuss cotton insects and disease identification and control.

News State FFA Convention Held Fort Worth July 18-20

Three members of the Ropes Capter Future Farmers of America Chapter, will attend the State FFA Convention in Fort Worth, July 18-20, according to Gerald Smith, President of the chapter. The three day meeting

of representatives of over 900 FFA chapters throughout the state will include te awarding of advanced degrees, scholarships and awards to outstanding members of the organization.

R. C. Lewis has been elected by chapter members as delegate of the Ropes FFA chapter to the state convention. Danny Rosser will serve as alternate delegate. Michael Cato will also attend.

Among the important business to be transacted at the convention will be the election of a state president from the ten state officer nominees, who have been elected by members in the ten areas of the state. Voting delegates to the National FFA Convention in Kansas City in October will be elected. In addition, delegates will elect a sweetheart from the ten candidates elected by the areas and will select the top talent team in the state.

Nearly 800 members from the 38,000 membership of the organization will receive the state's highest award, the Lone Star Farmer Degree. The membership will confer Honorary Degrees on adults who have contributed in an outstanding way to the accomplishments of the organization. A Vesper Service will be conducted on Tuesday evening, preceding the convention sessions. Lyle Carpenter, Uma, Colorado, immediate past president of Future Farmers of America and Bob Murphy of Nacogdoches are among the speakers to address the 3000 farm youth convened in the Hotel Texas Grand Ballroom in Fort Worth, July 18-20.

C. T. McCormick, Vocational Agriculture Teacher, will accompany FFA members to the Fort Worth convention.

BOY SCOUTS RECEIVE AWARDS

The Boy Scouts of Troop 636 who had passed swimming but did not have the lifesaving merit badge returned to Camp Post last week to earn this award. They went down on Thursday, July 5, and returned the next day.

Tests were given by Mr. Jerry Reese, District Scouter of Brownfield. A boy must know all the approved methods of approaching a drowning person in the water and bringing him to safety. They have to know how to use various methods of assisting one in distress, as well as demonstrate their ability to remove their own clothing in

the water and swim considerable distances.

Those who passed the test and qualified for the Lifesaving Merit Badge were Bill McCormick, Danny Rosser, and Mike Timmons.

Mike Timmons also earned the award for doing the mile swim immediately after the lifesaving test. To qualify for this award a boy must swim one mile without stopping, resting, or touching bottom. This is a test of swimming ability and endurance.

In addition to those who earned badges, they were accompanied by Dwight Hardin and C. T. McCormick.
