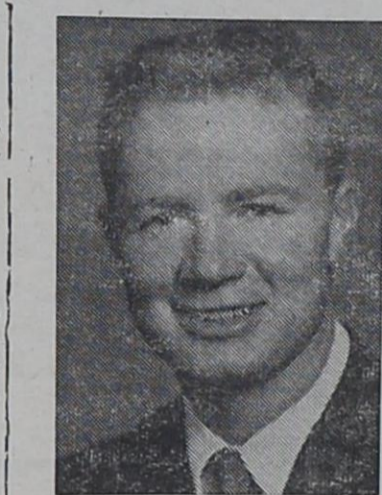
Mrs. Ulys Gregg and mother, Mrs. G. H. Edwards, left this week for Blue Ridge where they will spend several days.
