One boy from each of the seven districts was chosen as the Star District Farmer. R. C. Lewis, Jr. was the representative from the Levelland District. He was rated as No. 2 in the Area. Mr. Herbert Davis, teacher at Amarillo High School, made the announcement that R. C. had won this honor. Mr. Davis said that you might consider R. C. as his grandson, since one of the first boys he ever taught was R. C. (Dub) Lewis, Sr. (Mr. Davis was teacher at Ropes from 1935 to 1939). He also said that R. R. C. is a Junior in Ropes High School. He is active in the FFA, Band, and played basketball. He was selected as "Who's Who" in agriculture in Ropes High School in 1960. At the Wilson Campbell

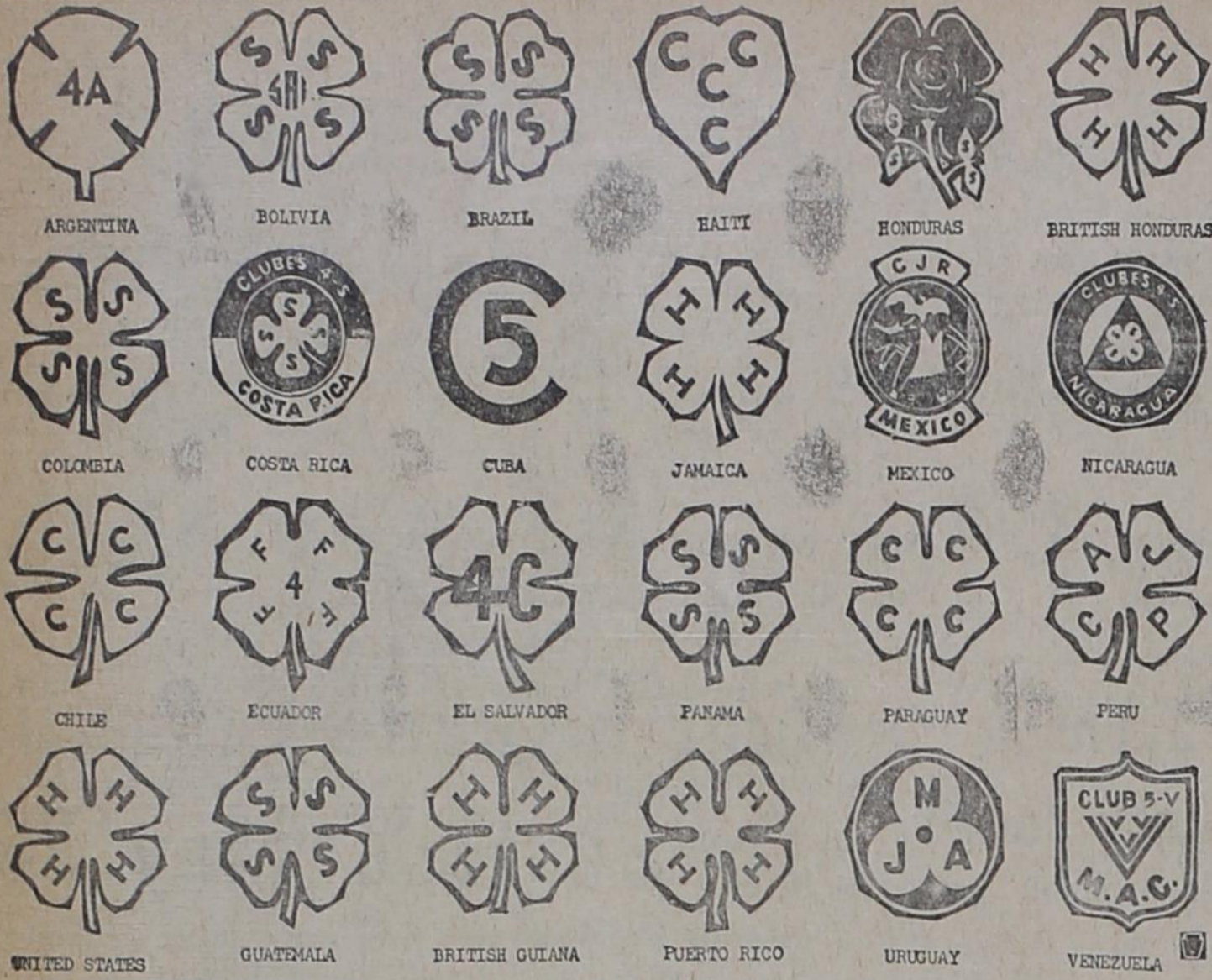

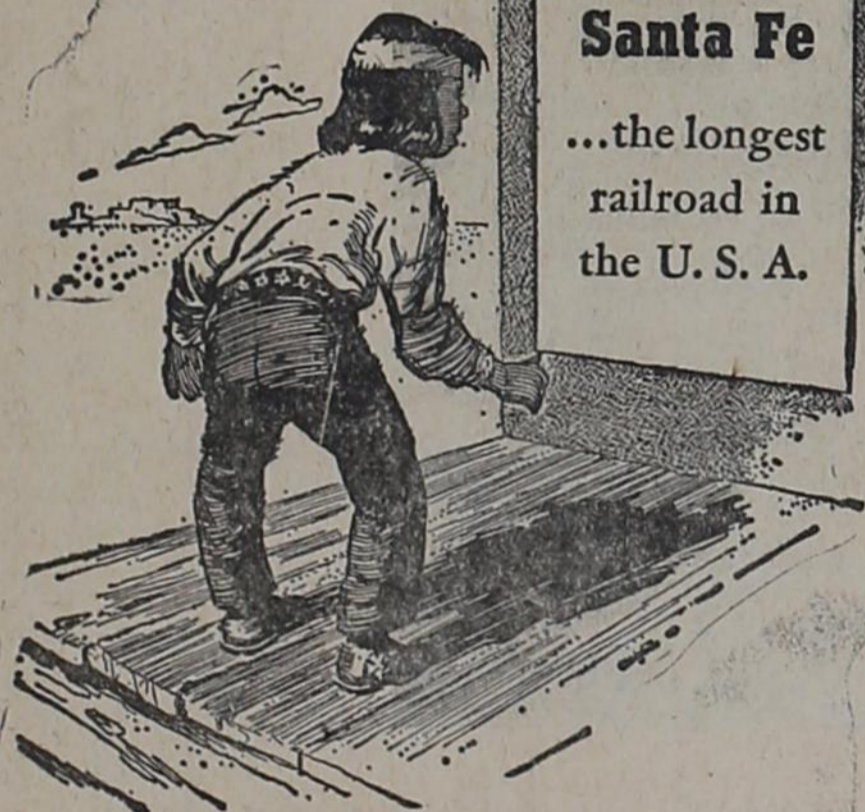
