THE ROPES PLAINSMAN

30,000 Bales of Cotton Roll from Gins This Fall

The Plainsman predicted some weeks ago that 30,000 bales of cotton would be gathered in the Ropes territory — that amount, counting bales destroyed by fire, has been exceeded by more than 300 bales.

The actual amount of cotton ginned and on the yards at this time runs to 29,102 bales. It is estimated that fire has destroyed better than 400 bales at the different gins.

However, it is thought now the harvest is over. It is felt that the heavy snow which fell during the weekend put a stop to further gathering. Charles Shannon told us, "We might get eight or ten bales more, but the snow has stopped the gathering and it is doubtful whether farmers will attempt to gather what is left in the fields."

This crop has been marked by unfavorable weather. The planting was delayed by rains, making the crop late.

An unseasonal freeze came on the 25th of October, and then, after a short time of fair weather, rains set in which stopped the harvest for at least two or three weeks and caused many of the harvest hands to depart. Following this, cotton strippers were put in the fields and have gathered most of the crop.

While an accurate estimate is impossible, it is thought that, due to unfavorable weather, the Ropes territory alone suffered losses which run into thousands of dollars. By the shortness of the fall, business places, not only in Ropes but in adjoining towns, have suffered losses that can hardly be estimated. As a rule there are from eight to twelve weeks of good business when harvest hands are working, and this fall there were no more than two good weeks. One merchant told us, "Business has come to a screeching halt."

15 Inches of Snow Covers the Ropes Territory Over Weekend

What was, perhaps, the heaviest snow fall in the Ropes trade territory since the late thirties fell Saturday and Sunday when more than fourteen inches of fluffy white flakes were deposited on a level in a matter of 24 hours.

The snow started on Saturday morning, with flakes almost as large as your hand and continued until Sunday afternoon, with the sky clearing around midnight Sunday night.

It was a wet snow, and

gave an underground season to farm land the like of which we have not had in several years.

In Ropes proper the residents were snowed in. It became next to an impossibility to move a car without chains. And, with chains so seldom needed in this section, there were few car owners who possessed a set. During the day Loyd Arant and others, with tractors, put in their time pulling cars from snowdrifts, and about 3 o'clock in the afternoon on

Sunday, Hulon Moreland, county commissioner, sent two maintainers into Ropes and made many of the streets passable. However, where driveways had ditches leading into the road it was next to an impossibility to get cars out, as the wheels would only spin. To meet this condition Howard Bradshaw put into service his jeep and Mansfield Thomas his pickup, pulling many cars to solid ground where they could be operated. Another thing, there was

a run on the Riojas Dept. Store for overshoes and rubber boots. Fortunately, they had just received a shipment. Ordinarily, a store in the smaller towns of this section will not sell a dozen pairs of overshoes a year — except for irrigation — and somehow or other Ralph Riojas had gotten wind of the fact that a large snow was in the offing and had laid in a large stock — one of the largest he has carried since he has been in business in Ropesville.

On Monday morning Old Sol was in business again. By noon the snow was melting, and is it going to be a mess when it is all melted. The entire town and community will be one large mud hole. But, even if it is disagreeable, everyone is happy. Farmers state, without reservation, it is worth a million dollars, and perhaps it has saved that much, alone, in the operation of irrigation wells, which in recent years have been used to get a bottom season — now the bottom season is there.

We might add, also, that the snow came as a complete surprise — it was not predicted by the weather bureau, or by weather prophets. It was one of those freaks of weather which occur so often in this country, and which makes it an almost impossibility to predict what the weather will be from day to day.

The snow brought transportation to a standstill all over the South Plains — it closed most of the schools and kept hundreds of people at home; kept them at home because they were unable to untract their automobiles. One man stated: "We are not prepared for this kind of weather." And, that is a fact. Most of the time we will go through an entire winter with little or no snow, and in recent years a snow of this kind in January is almost unheard of. Our big snows have been coming in March.

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WALLACE WHITE LOOKING AFTER BUSINESS SATURDAY

Vollie Hough was out wading around in the snow on Tuesday, and stated:

"Such snows as this were the usual thing during the winter when we first came to the Ropes community in the early twenties."

Vollie recalls very vividly the blizzard and snowstorm of 1924 which is considered one of the most severe to ever visit the South Plains.

Another such snow as we had this past week occurred either in 1938 or 1939. However, it was brought in by a driving north wind and drifts in places were twelve to twenty feet high. All highways were blocked and hundreds of people stranded on the highways. That night Ropes residents took in the stranded. The cafe and other places stayed open all night so folks caught out in the storm would have a place to stay.

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CHARLES SHANNON SAYS ITS MUDDY

Charles Shannon, manager of the Weaks Gin 4 miles west of Ropes, was among those in Ropes Monday.

He stated there was plenty of snow around his place, and that he had plenty of trouble getting out. "I'm glad," he said, "that we do not have any cotton on the yard as, with the snow covering it and melting and water soaking it, it would be a problem to gin."

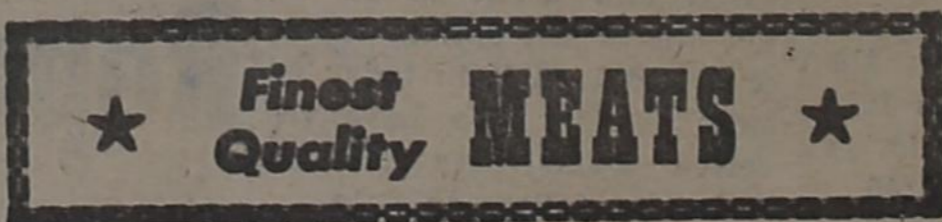

AUSTIN — Even though \$12.5 million in Veterans' Land Bonds were sold in December, the quickest way for ex-servicemen to participate in the Veterans' Land Program is to buy forfeited land, Land Commissioner Earl Rudder said recently.

The next sale of forfeited land is scheduled for January 21.

Fifty-eight tracts in 21 Texas counties will be offered for sale then.

WHAT IS REAL LOVE FOR A CHILD AND WHAT IS ITS PLACE IN COMBATING JUVENILE DELINQUENCY?

Real love in the life of a child, so necessary in combating juvenile delinquency, is not trying to 'possess' him or not just giving him material things. It is giving him a sense of his own significance in his home and among his friends.

Real love does not over-indulge him, give him too much in the way of material possessions or passing pleasures, excitements, stimulations. Instead, it provides understanding and emotional security as he runs up against the hard knocks life hands up all from time to time.

No Sense of Belonging
A little girl 4 years old was in my court a number of years ago, the subject of a custody suit. At the end of the day I took her in my office and told her she would stay with her mother that weekend.

She looked up at me and asked, "Which mother, my old mother or my new one?" You see, Patsy had two mothers and two fathers. She had been shifted from one to the other, been involved in several custody cases and consequently had no sense of security, of belonging, such a necessary part of love in the life of a child.

They Would Be There
On the other hand, a young soldier taken prisoner in Germany kept his sanity by remembering his room at home, mentally counting the things in each drawer of his chest.

He knew the accustomed place of each and felt a security in the certainty that they would be there when he returned home.

And of equal importance is the need for love to include guidance for future living as an adult. The child should learn at an early age that there are rules to be obeyed and limits beyond which he cannot go.

Hold To Limits
A little girl I saw in a grocery store was amusing herself by taking things off the lower shelves. Her mother threatened her with a spanking, bed, and several other things, but the child paid not the slightest attention.

Evidently she was sure her mother did not mean what she was saying. She had not yet learned of any limits beyond which she could not go.

They Want Guide-Posts
Children really want to be made to observe rules. They may act like they don't, and undoubtedly they will see how far they can go, but in a recent youth forum discussion it was the consensus of opinion that boys and girls want their parents to set up rules for them to follow, to provide them with guide-posts.

To put it another way, we should keep actively helping the child to learn to swim, or standing by to give help if he flounders, until it is plain that he can now swim as well or better than we can. We should never do

what some of us do, in our role as parents or simply as members of the community: We should never throw a child into deep water before he has learned.

Bad Examples Confuse Youth
Modern living conditions, with cars, taverns, easy money, and a multitude of bad examples to confuse the child on every hand, are indeed "deep water"; it takes real swimming to keep from going under. What many people have misunderstood as "progressive education"—allowing the child to do as he pleases in order to "express himself", so as not to "warp his personality", is throwing him into deep water before he can swim.

He may fight against guidance, but subconsciously he counts on it to stop him whenever he is not strong enough.

Responsibility Of All
While guiding young people is principally the job of parents, those who have no children likewise have a responsibility. We all come in contact with children in situations which put in varying degrees of responsibility towards young people not our own.

Too often we fail to speak the kindly but firm word that will stop a youngster in a group under us as teacher, Scout leader, etc., or even a neighbor child. Too often we fail to provide a good example.

Take Time To Listen
And too often we simply don't take the time to listen to a child's talk. The feeling of being able to tell a sympathetic grown person what he is thinking and doing is important in helping to give a child a sense of significance. Opportunities to help by being a "listening post" come most often to a parent, of course, but often also to the really receptive non-parent.

ROPES, MEADOW TEAMS CHAMPS
Ropesville's Eagles and the

Meadow girls captured championships of the annual Ropes Invitational basketball tournament at Ropesville on Saturday night of last week.

The host Eagles upended the Levelland B-team, 47-34 for the championship, while the Meadow girls downed Ropes, 39-34, for the title.

Tahoka won both the boys' and girls' consolation crowns. The Bulldogs defeated Spade, 56-27, and the girls downed Smyer, 42-36. In semifinals games Saturday morning, Tahoka's girls beat Grandfalls, 28-18, and the Tahoka boys dumped Smyer, 36-21.

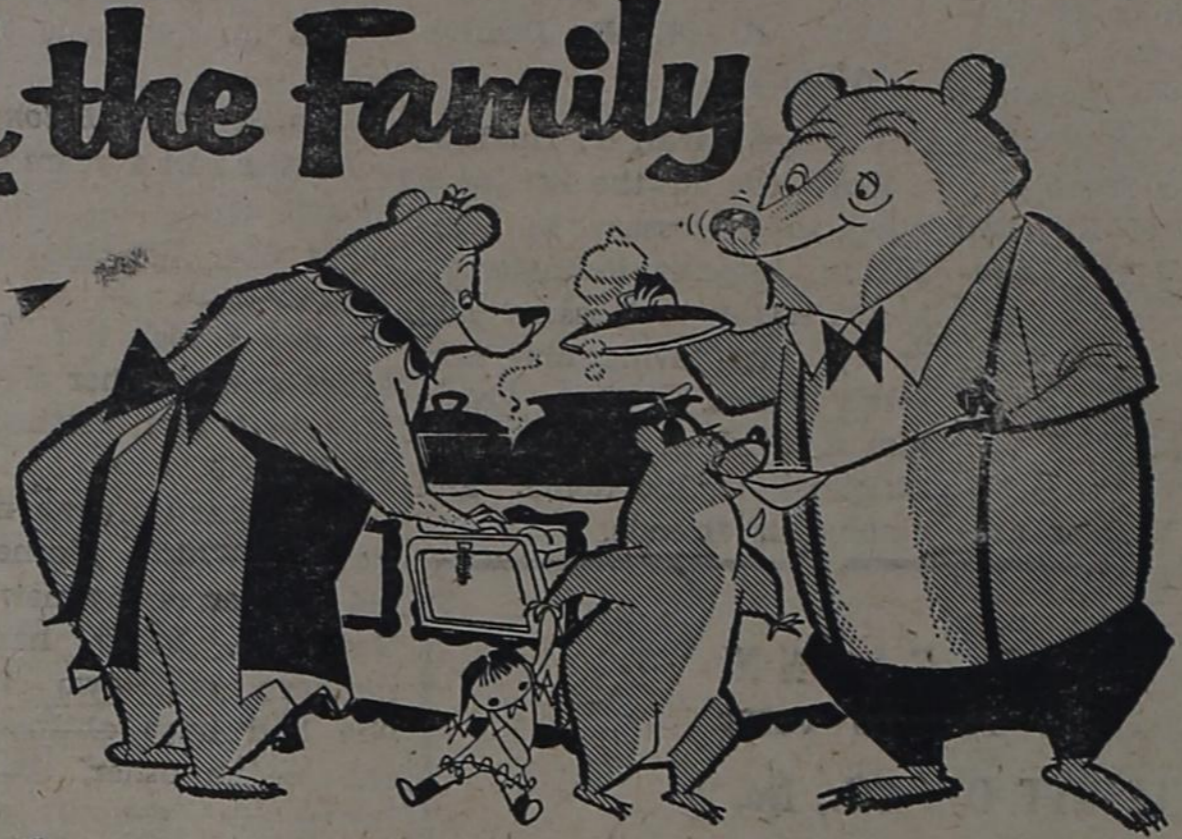
