ACTING

If there is one thing true about people, it is that they usually know what it is that they should be doing. Men and women know that they should be in church. Men and women know they should set a good example. Men and women know that they should not commit adultery. Men and women know that they should not be drunkards. Men and women know that envy, jealousy, anger, selfishness, carousing and the like do not bring the full and complete happiness. In fact, after these things have happened, one can almost see the remorse which hangs about their head and which penetrates to the very core of their life.

Thanks be to God that we have facility of reason which helps us to figure out what it is that we should do. Thanks be to God that we have a conscience which keeps us in bounds. Thanks be to God for faith which allows us to live as forgiven men in spite of what we have done. And, thanks be to God that we all have the ability to change what we are, if we will choose to change.

How many times have I heard words like these, "I want to do right. I want to live life as I should, but all these other things — envy, jealousy, drunkenness, anger, selfishness, carousing — call out to me and I cannot resist them." We know what is right and we do what is wrong. This is man's dilemma.

With great clarity and insight into the New Testament especially Paul, I think a modern psychologist offers us an answer to this dilemma when he says, "It is easier to act your way into a new way of thinking than it is to think your way into a new way of acting." (O. Hobart Mowrer)

We all establish habit patterns. Certain actions or habits give us a certain amount of pleasure and so we repeat them again and again. Alcohol, for example, gives a certain amount of pleasure. It allows the man or woman who is afraid to be himself or herself to open up, to relax. This is pleasure when you can be yourself and not be afraid that other people will reject or condemn you. But, alcohol is only a temporary solution—it is not lasting. This kind of habit brings a small amount of pleasure, but the bad effects are greater than the pleasure. (Compare, for instance, the length of pleasure time with the length of hangover time and remorse time after drunkenness.)

Mowrer offers a solution to less than satisfying habit patterns by indicating that we must work to establish new habit patterns which are more pleasing. We may think to ourselves that such and so new habit pattern would bring us more happiness than an old habit pattern, but thinking about it won't get the job done. Just thinking about it does not give the experience necessary to help us completely understand it. To find new and long lasting habit patterns which bring more satisfaction, we must actively engage in them, we must work at it.

As a Christian I think the finest and most rewarding habit patterns are to be found in the Christian Church. It is here that the habit of loving one another brings out the finest qualities of the personhood which God Turn to Page 3

COLLEGE STATION

Billy Rufe Taylor, Hockley County agricultural agent since June 1952, was one of six Texans named today to receive the National County Agricultural Agents Association's highest honor, their Distinguished Service award for 1964. Taylor was on military leave from June '53 to June '55.

The Award winner was nominated for the award by the Texas Association and confirmation from the national organization was announced by Todd W. Berry, Van Zandt County agent and chairman of the Texas Awards Committee.

The Hockley County agent was cited "For outstanding leadership and supervision of the county's strong crop demonstration program. The adoption of practices proved by the demonstrations has added materially to the agricultural income and the total economy of the county."

Through the Hockley County Program Building Committee and its sub-committees, the highly efficient crop demonstration programs have included about 100 demonstrations annually ranging from cultural practices to the most effective use of agricultural chemicals.

Taylor is a native of Quanah a graduate of Arlington State and Texas Technological Colleges with an A. S. degree from ASC and a B.S. in animal husbandry from Tech.

The Award winner also supervises a strong county 4-H Club program as well as many others dealing with agriculture and rural living.

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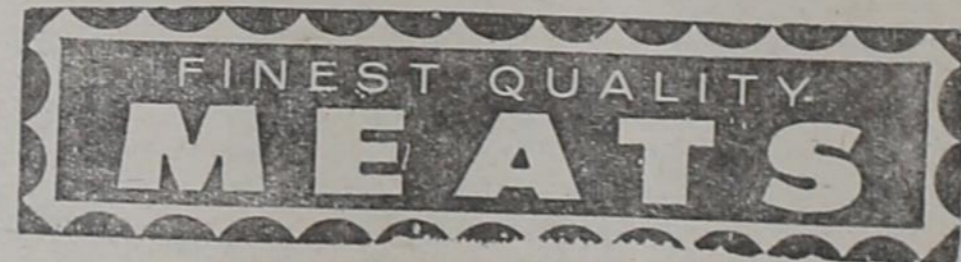
