**TEXAS DEPARTMENT  
OF PUBLIC SAFETY**

There are seven tomb-  
stones in Hockley County  
that were erected ahead of  
schedule in 1964. The stones  
mark the graves of persons  
who died in traffic accidents  
on rural highways in the  
county during the year.

But the suffering wasn't  
confined to those who were  
killed. The Department of  
Public Safety recorded 112  
mishaps on rural highways  
in the county during 1964.  
Those accidents injured 88  
persons and they spent  
countless days in the hospi-  
tals. Property damage from  
these accidents amounted to  
\$132,365.00.

During December there  
were eight accidents on ru-  
ral highways in the county,  
according to Sergeant A. E.  
Roberts, Highway Patrol su-  
pervisor in this area.

These crashes resulted in  
two deaths, 11 persons injur-  
ed and an estimated prop-  
erty damage loss of \$15,050.00.  
Texas drivers have killed  
more people during '64  
than any other year in the  
state. Unofficial  
figures indicate the Texas

death toll may have reached  
3,000 during 1964, but the  
final tabulation will not be  
completed until March 15.

Meanwhile, officials are  
hopeful that motorists will  
heed warnings and drive  
with greater care during 19-  
65 and give special consid-  
eration to the hazards of driv-  
ing during the winter  
months ahead.

**WATER LEVEL  
MEASUREMENTS WILL BE  
TAKEN THIS MONTH**

The annual water level  
measurements of more than  
800 observation wells in the  
High Plains Water District  
will be taken this month.  
The wells in the High Plains  
District are a portion of over  
1,700 observation wells to  
be measured in a 39-county  
area by personnel of the Tex-  
as Water Commission, High  
Plains Underground Water  
Conservation District and  
the North Plains Water Dis-  
trict. Hockley County has  
76 observation wells on  
which records are now being  
kept by the High Plains  
Water District and the Tex-  
as Water Commission. The  
observation wells are mea-  
sured annually during the  
month of January.

Any person who is inter-  
ested in the well measur-  
ments can obtain a record  
through the local County  
Water District Office or  
from the High Plains Water  
District office.

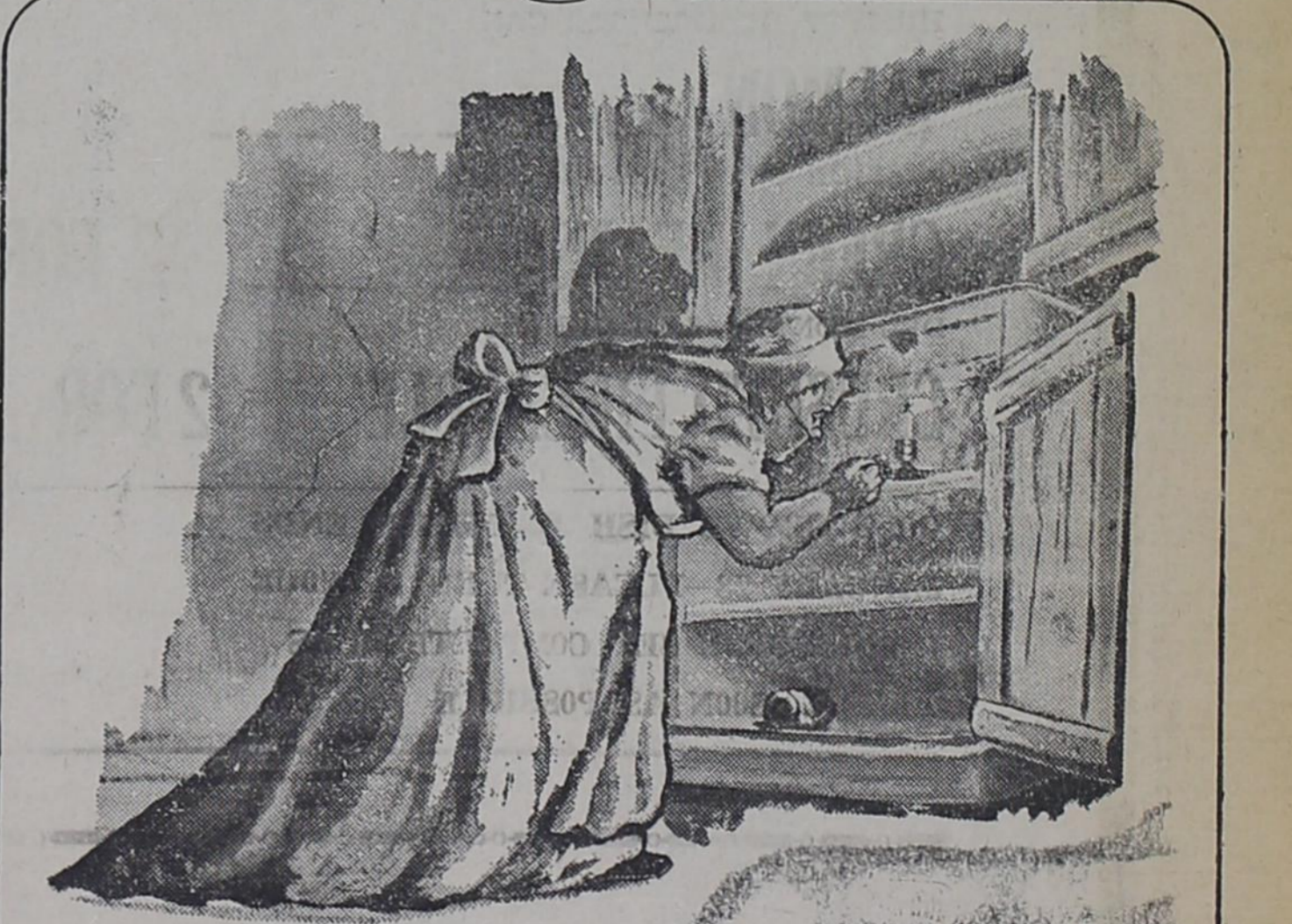
