# Your Trash?

How about your trash? Ours is scattered from here to youder this week because it was not emptied last month.

For the past two years we have received complaints, as has City Hall, from one to sev en a month, that people's trash cans around town have not been emptied, as they are supposed to be.

Each family in Ropes pays a complusary fee every month for this service. Since it is automatically added on to the water bills each month, every trash can in town should receive the same service.

There have also been several complaints that trash barrels have been hauled off because they have holes in them, with the promise of bringing the family another barrel.

We feel sure no one would complain about this if the trash barrels were replaced, and also each one would be happy to pay for the new barrel.

But if another barrel is not available to replace the old one, it should not be pick-

In our part of the country it is impossible to burn trash without a container because of the high winds.

We make no suggestions as how to straighten this situation out, but we do say that if the job is going to be done, and people are going to have to pay for it, then it should be done right.
