PLANS BEING MADE FOR FALL BARROW SALE

The swine breeders of Hockley County have formulated plans for a fall barrow sale for the benefit of the FFA and 4-H members of the county. There will be a meeting on Tuesday, September 16, 1958, in the District Court Room in Levelland. Any breeder who is interested in selling at the sale is asked to either be present, or to notify Bill Taylor, County Agent, of the number and breed he wishes to sell. Rules and procedure for the sale will be worked out at this time, also.

Only barrows will be sold, and they must have been farrowed by September 20. They will be sold at auction. They do not have to be registered or from registered stock.

It is felt that this sale will give the boys a chance to buy quality pigs on a highest bidder basis. It will allow breeders to bring in barrows and get a good price. In the past, some hard feelings have developed from some breeder promising to boys and then not being able to fill the demand when his pig crop came up shorter than expected. Also, the argument developed as to who should have first choice from the breeder's pigs. The sale should do much to eliminate this situation. It will allow a boy to buy the kind of pigs he wants, without having to hunt all over the State for them.

The auction sale will be held probably some time in November. This will be settled at the September 16 meeting.

Sales have been held in other communities along this line, and have been very satisfactory. The breeder usually gets a premium price for high quality barrows. This is usually not the case when he sells to the individual. This is usually done by pricing the lot at so much a head, and no difference made between the best and the poorer quality. The sale will allow the breeder a chance to sell each barrow on quality as an individual.

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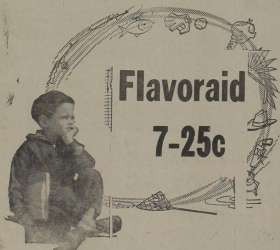
