The Ropes Food Store suf-fered a breakin this past Sun day evening or night. Entrance was gained through a small window in the rear of the store, measuirng about 12 inches square. Outside the window crates were in view that were supposedly used to stand on, and a small tree pro vided shelter to protect the theives from sight.

The small glass was one of many panes making up a big window and the only one with out a bar over it.

It is believed that someone small was helped through the window, and he in turn opened the back door for the others to enter.

The inside of the store was in a general mess, with things scattered about. It appeared the looters were in somewhat of a hurry, as socks and mens underwear stored in plastic bags on metal hooks were jerked off with enough force to break the hooks and scatter them on tloor.

One cash register was picked up and taken to the meat market where it was forced open, but contained no money. In their hurry, it appeared a card of razor blades was knocked off and scattered by the checking stand.

Several items were taken, the majority being menthol cigarettes and men's socks and underclothes.

It is not known whether the theives were attempting to turn on lights, or turn them off, but they pulled the switch es in the main switch box, and disconnected the deep freeze and meat counter, and some loss occured.

It is thought that the burglars used paper bags from the store to tote their loot out.







Section 1. That Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a new Section 52a to read as

The Legisla-ture shall have the power to authorize counties, cities, and towns to issue revenue bonds for industrial development purposes, or in aid thereof; provided, that property acquired from proceeds of the bonds shall be subject to ad valorem taxes.
