The drilling rig arrived in Ropes in Tuesday morning and drilling was started at once. It is thought that by the end of the week the well will be ready to test The drilling of the new well was brought about by the shortage of water whic has developed this summer.

Operator's No. 1 Clyde Grissom, a proposed $10,500-$ foot Pennsylvanian test, was cored from 5,180-200 feet after developing slight show on a previous drillstem test. One gallon of free oil and 120 feet of oil and gas-cut mud were recovered from between $5,136-80$ feet.
