

Gotcher and Fewell Will Draw for Second Place

# Cook Elected Treasurer; Clingan Clerk; Pounds School Superintendent; Williams-Owens for County Judge

There were several surprises in the county election — and there were several disappointed voters, as well as candidates.

In the race for Justice of the Peace of Precinct 1, it was almost neck and neck, with Jim Gotcher, the present incumbent, being edged out by only three votes.

## FEWELL, GOTCHER TO DRAW FOR PLACE

The Justice of Peace race in Precinct one has wound up in a tie for second place between Mrs. Minnie Fewell and Jim Gotcher — each having a total of 120 votes.

When the election re-

turns were given Saturday night the vote from South Smyer gave Mrs. Fewell 120 and Gotcher 117. This vote was correct insofar as it went, but in some mix up in Levelland the absentee ballots were not added to the vote, and in the absentee box there were three votes for Gotcher, giving him 120 votes.

When the election returns were canvassed the mistake was discovered.

To untie the tie the two candidates will be required to draw lots. The drawing, under the supervision of Bill Boedeker will take place in the Court House at Levelland Thursday (today) at 10 o'clock.

This places Fewell and Roberts in the run-off. In the county races Louis Owens polled 2,209; Paul A. Williams, 1,297; and Frank Lawlis 1,050, leaving Williams and Owens in the run-off.

In the race for county treasurer Dick Cooke polled 3,237 votes, while the incumbent, Mary Meek, scored 1,313.

Grace Clingan remained as county clerk by defeating R. O. Dennis. The vote was: Clingan 2,155, and Dennis, 2,343.

Davis Pounds will be the new county school superintendent, defeating Chester Borders. The vote: Pounds, 2,669; Borders, 1,755.

## Money-Making Rain Swamps the Ropes Community Sunday Night

What might be termed a million dollar rain drenched the South Plains on Sunday night of this week. Reports from all portions of the South Plains, Panhandle, and below the Caprock report life-giving, crop-saving rains.

At almost every point on

the South Plains irrigation wells were being run, but Monday morning they were silent because moisture from the sky had given the crops the drink they needed.

While we have had a long dry spell and seemingly the Ropes community was in the very-center of a dry spot,

this rain came at just the right time to assure the continued growth and maturing of the crops.

J. M. Marcy told us, "It was just what we needed. We will not need more moisture until the middle of August."

At the Marcy place two

and a half inches of rain fell and John told us, "there was no wind and no hail. When it first started to rain hard I heard the water hitting the garage door and at first I thought it was hail and jumped out of bed to see."

The rain to the northwest seemed to be heavier than to the south, as at the Raymond Dennis place, in the Arnett community, more than two and a quarter inches of moisture fell. Raymond and family were in

Ropes Tuesday and thinks we're set up for a real crop. At the Tom Peterson place north of Ropes, an inch and eight-tenths fell, while to the east at the Bill Patman place a like amount was registered.

At the M. M. Collins place, the C. D. Bond place, as well as other places west of Ropes, an inch and eight-tenths was registered. To the north west, on the Buchanan place the same amount was registered.

Sheriff Weir Clem was in Ropes from Levelland Monday and he stated that it rained better than two inches in that community, and that between Sundown and Levelland there was heavy hail which did much damage to crops.

The cloud started out as a thunder shower to the northwest of Ropes and moved to the south and in the Meadow community, according to Roland Evans, more than two inches of rain were recorded.

The rain fell without wind but there was a display of lightning, which at first, in the distance, gave the appearance of field guns flashing in a continuous bombardment, and when it came closer streaked lightning cut lurid paths across the heavens and thunder caused loose windows to rattle. At one time the lights were momentarily out as the liquid fire struck and raced down the wires overhead.

The report that there had been six tornadoes in the Panhandle in the afternoon caused a lot of folks to watch the cloud with some apprehension, but after a time it became apparent that it had set in for an all night rain and most everyone went to bed, and to the tune of pattering rain on the roof, went into dreamless sleep which even thunder did not disturb.

## Democratic Convention Was Held Saturday

The Democratic Precinct Convention was held in Ropes at 10:00 o'clock last Saturday morning with Everett Wallace as Chairman. At the convention the following resolutions were adopted:

**RESOLUTION NO. 1**  
WHEREAS, Art. 13.57 of the TEXAS ELECTION CODE states "no new political party shall assume the name of any pre-existing party. . ."; and

WHEREAS, the flagrant and unauthorized use of the name "Democrats of Texas" by the DOT splinter group has caused confusion, distrust, and disorganization within the Party and is contrary to law;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: That this Convention condemns the attempted usurpation of the name of the "Democratic Party of Texas" by the DOT and demands that the use of such name be discontinued.

**RESOLUTION NO. II**

WHEREAS, this Convention favors majority rule in the Democratic Party of Texas and approves the Majority Rule Code of Conduct adopted by the State Democratic Executive Committee to insure:

1. Honesty, integrity and strict adherence to Texas

Election Laws applicable to Party Conventions

2. Preservation of peace and order at Party Conventions

3. Strengthening of election laws so that members of one Party shall not participate in the primaries and conventions of another Party,

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: That this Convention adopts the above Majority Rule Code of Conduct and directs that all delegates from this precinct to the County Convention shall be bound to vote under the unit rule.

## CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HJR #17—Number Six on the Ballot.

### PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 17** proposing an amendment to Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 66, to provide that the Legislature shall have authority to provide a system of retirement and disability pensions to certain retiring Texas Rangers and their widows; stating the maximum of such pension; and providing a fund from which such pensions may be paid.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, shall be amended by adding thereto a new Section 66, to read as follows:  
"Section 66. The Legislature shall have authority to provide for a system of retirement and disability pensions for retiring Texas Rangers who have not been eligible at any time for membership in the Employees Retirement System of Texas as that retirement system was established by Chapter 352, Acts of the Fiftyeth Legislature, Regular Session, 1947, and who have had as much as two (2) years service as a Texas Ranger, and to their widows; providing that no pension shall exceed Eighty Dollars (\$80) per month to any

such Texas Ranger or his widow, provided that such widow was legally married prior to January 1, 1957, to a Texas Ranger qualifying for such pension.

"These pensions may be paid only from the special fund created by Section 17, Article VII for a payment of pensions for services in the Confederate army and navy, frontier organizations, and the militia of the State of Texas, and for widows of such soldiers serving in said armies, navies, organizations or militia."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to the vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for pension to retired Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and their widows."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for pension to retired Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and their widows."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

## CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HJR #30—Number Three on the Ballot.

### PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 30** proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas, to require that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. Section 28 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 28. Vacancies In Offices Of Superior Courts To Be Filled By The Governor.

"Vacancies in the office of Justices of the Supreme Court, the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Court of Civil Appeals and the District Courts shall be filled by the Governor until the next succeeding General Election; and vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court until the next succeeding General Election."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the vote is in favor of said amendment, same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election herein provided for and shall cause this proposed amendment to be published in the manner required by law and shall cause said election to be held as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

## CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

SJR #4—Number Seven on the Ballot.

### PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4** proposing an Amendment to Section 56 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing that the Legislature be authorized to appropriate money and establish the procedure necessary to expend such money for the purpose of developing information about the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, marketing, recreational and living resources of Texas, and for the purpose of informing persons and corporations of other states through advertising in periodicals having national circulation and the dissemination of factual information about the advantages and economic resources offered by the State of Texas; providing that neither the name nor the picture of any living state official shall ever be used in any of said advertising, and providing that the Legislature may require that any sum of money appropriated hereunder shall be matched by an equal sum paid into the State Treasury from private sources before any of said money may be expended.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Section 56 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 56. The Legislature of the State of Texas shall have the power to appropriate money and establish the procedure necessary to expend such money for the purpose of developing information about the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educa-

tional, marketing, recreational and living resources of Texas, and for the purpose of informing persons and corporations of other states through advertising in periodicals having national circulation, and the dissemination of factual information about the advantages and economic resources offered by the State of Texas; providing, however, that neither the name nor the picture of any living state official shall ever be used in any of said advertising, and providing that the Legislature may require that any sum of money appropriated hereunder shall be matched by an equal sum paid into the State Treasury from private sources before any of said money may be expended."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to make appropriations and establish procedure for advertising the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, recreational and other resources of Texas."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing the Legislature to make appropriations and establish procedure for advertising the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, recreational and other resources of Texas."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

## CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HJR #48—Number Five on the Ballot.

### PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 48** proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a home rule city may provide by Charter Provision and a general law city operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, both elective and appointive, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby; providing for an election, a term of office and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**  
Section 1. That Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section II of Article XI and to read as follows:

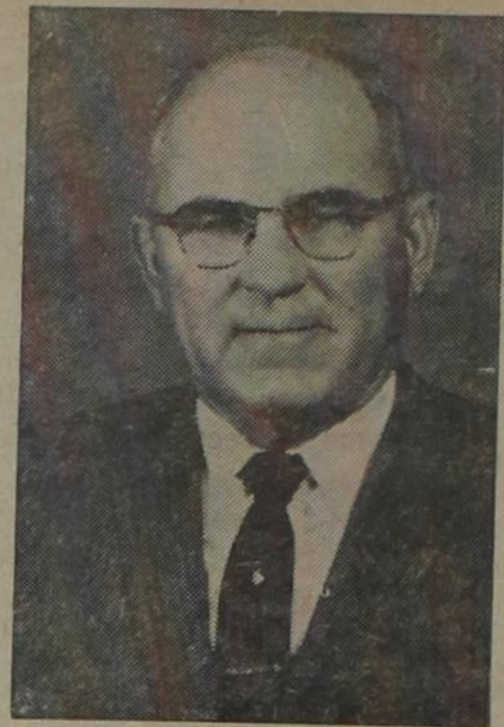
"Section II. A Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the General Election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1958, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that a Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing that a Home Rule City may provide by charter or charter amendment, and a city, town or village operating under the general laws may provide by majority vote of the qualified voters voting at an election called for that purpose, for a longer term of office than two (2) years for its officers, either elective or appointive, or both, but not to exceed four (4) years; provided, however, that tenure under Civil Service shall not be affected hereby."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

#### FIRST STEPS TAKEN TO PROVIDE HOSPITAL IN TERRY COUNTY

BROWNFIELD — Initial steps were taken this week toward providing Terry County with a fully accredited and efficiently operated hospital, according to Charles Davis, newly elected administrator.

Dr. A. H. Daniel was appointed president of the Terry County Hospital medical staff in a meeting held

this week, said Davis. Other officers are Dr. Cecil Knox, vice president; Dr. Wayne Hill, secretary and Dr. Jerry Bailes, director of laboratory services and medical records.

"The staff was organized to prepare for the assumption of operation by the county on September 1," said Davis.

"By-laws and regulations accepted at the meeting are in accordance with standards set up by the American Medical Association so that the hospital may be accredited as soon as possible," noted Davis.

The facility, which was purchased from Dr. T. L. Treadway and Dr. Daniell on July 1, has been designated as an "open staff" hospital. "The present staff has made provisions for adding qualified new doctors to the organization as they come to Brownfield," said the administrator.

Directors of the hospital, under whom the administrator and staff will work are Bruce C. Zorns, C. A. Winn, Dennis Q. Lilly, Lee Bartlett, C. K. Kendrick and Val Garner.

FOR \$40 MILLION

The much publicized wrangle with the major oil companies in the county over valuation for taxation has been settled — and at the county's figures.

By sticking by their guns, the County Judge and the Commissioners' Court got a very favorable settlement, not the announced low of \$38 million, but the figure of \$40 million asked in the first place by the county.

### GOOD SHOWS FOUND IN HOCKLEY CORE

Sixteen feet of San Andres dolomite containing good oil shows have been pulled by Honolulu Oil Corp. in south-central Hockley County.

Operator's No. 1 Clyde Grissom, a proposed 10,500-foot Pennsylvanian test, was cored from 5,180-200 feet after developing slight show on a previous drillstem test. One gallon of free oil and 120 feet of oil and gas-cut mud were recovered from between 5,136-80 feet.

At last report, a drillstem test was underway with hole bottomed at 5,200 feet and packed at 5,176 feet.

Drillsite is one and three-quarter miles from the small McCulloch-Clear Fork pool and one mile north of a San Andres failure. Exact location is 494 feet from south and 660 feet from west lines of Labor 14, League 24, McCullough CSL survey.

Oho Oil Co. No. 1 H. L. Moreland, et al, proposed 10,500-foot wildcat five miles southeast of Levelland, was still location Friday.
