



#### GOOD SHOWS FOUND IN HOCKLEY CORE

Sixteen feet of San Andres dolomite containing good oil shows have been pulled by Honolulu Oil Corp. in south-central Hockley County.

Operator's No. 1 Clyde Grissom, a proposed 10,500foot Pennsylvanian test, was cored from 5,180-200 feet after developing slight show on a previous drillstem test. One gallon of free oil and 120 feet of oil and gas-cut mud were recovered from between 5,136-80 feet.

At last report, a drillstem test was underway with hole bottomed at 5,200 feet and packed at 5,176 feet.

Drillsite is one and threequarter miles from the small McCulloch-Clear Fork pool and one mile north of a San Andres failure. Exact location is 494 feet from south and 660 feet from west lines of Labor 14, League 24, Mc-Cullough CSL survey.

Oho Oil Co. No. 1 H. L. Moreland, et al, proposed 10,500-foot wildcat five miles southeast of Levelland, was still location Friday.
