Donations to the 'New March of Dimes' Will Help Prevent Crippling Diseases

Millions of families throughout the United States this month have received March of Dimes "mailers."

If the millions on the receiving end of this gigantic mail operation coast-to-coast and in Hawaii and Alaska have not already done so, now is the time to return the familiar envelope with a donation to the county March of Dimes chapter. The world's largest voluntary health organization is seeking to prevent crippling diseases, with its sights set at birth defects and arthritis and at continued work in polio.

These mailers, which reproduce the campaign theme, "Prevent Crippling Diseases—Please Say Yes to the New March of Dimes," were addressed in great part by selfless volunteers who, by combing through telephone and other directories, were able to "spot" just about every family in their county. Addresses of new homes, not included in telephone books, were obtained by these volunteers from real estate boards, tax lists, from other official records, and from chambers of commerce.

Hopefully, each of the 44 million families in the United States will have an opportunity to help prevent crippling diseases by contributing to the March of Dimes between now and Jan. 31.

The blue mailer contains an envelope with a pocket for a March of Dimes contribution by check or cash and with space for the donor's name and address. A brief message addressed to "Dear Neighbor" explains the expanded program of The National Foundation, and elsewhere on the mailer a few health figures are given—for example, that birth defects cripple one out of every 16 babies in the United States; that arthritis and rheumatism afflict 11 million Americans; and that polio can still strike down any one of more than 85 million unvaccinated persons in the country.

that they "hope our mailer are desperately needed to finance National Foundation programs of aid to patients, of orders and checks because research and in the training of health workers."

Jack Ogle this past week resigned as constable of Precinct 1, Hockley County, the resignation taking effect on the first day of January, 1961. Jack has served as constable of this precinct for the past four years.

Jack stated: "I resigned to take charge of civil defense in this community. I want to thank the people of Ropes and surrounding territory for the cooperation given me while I served as a peace officer. I did my best to live up to my oath of office and the things accomplished were due to your help."

This leaves the office of constable vacant. County Attorney Weldon Johnson told the Plainsman over the telephone: "It will be up to the commissioners court to fill the office. An election cannot now be called for that purpose. The appointment will run for two years, or until the next general election in 1962."

The commissioners court will meet on Monday of next week, but it has not been stated whether or not they will take this matter up.

It has also been pointed out that instead of appointing a constable the commissioners can turn the matter over to Wier Clem and let him appoint a deputy sheriff to serve in the Ropes community. If this is done the man appointed would move to Ropes.

Wier Clem told the Plainsman: "It is up to the people. If they want a deputy sheriff I will be glad to furnish one."

The desires of the majority of the people, at this time are not known to the Plainsman, but we do know we need an officer whether he be constable or deputy sheriff—and he will need to live in the community.




Soil Testing Is Important Tool!

Farming is a business. And like any successful business many factors of management are involved. In farming a very important one of this is soil management. Good soil management is simply using each acre of land within its capabilities and treating the land in accordance with its needs to keep it permanently productive so as to yield the greatest continuous profit.

How To Take A Soil Sample



1. Divide farm for sampling purposes into areas of similar soil types.



2. Use a spade, trowel, soil tube or other suitable instrument to take sample.



3. Take a thin, vertical slice or core of soil to plow depth from at least 12 different places within the field.



4. Break up cores or slices and mix well in bucket. Take a sample from bucket and place in a soil sample bag.



5. Fill out information sheet. Give past cropping and fertilization practices and crops to be grown on fields sampled.



6. Take samples to County Agent's office. Samples will be analyzed and recommendations returned to you.

Why Should You Have a Soil Test?

A soil test will not answer all fertility problems. It does give information about the soil that will help in planning and maintaining a good soil management program. The results of a soil test will aid in determining whether there is a deficiency of one or more plant nutrients, and give the information needed to help you plan and carry out a balanced fertility program. Together, all this information will help to make sound fertilizer recommendations and to point out problems where they exist.

To get correct soil samples, follow the recommendations of the illustration shown here. See your County Agent for additional information about soil testing. Take your soil samples to your County Agent and he will send them off for you.

Freedom in Truth

"Ye shall know the truth, and the truth shall make you free"

Jno. 8:32

Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev said, "I am in agreement with Christ on many things." To the Bible student: the student who fears God and loves the Truth, the above statement is absurd. Mr. Khrushchev is saying, in part, "Christ is right on some things and wrong on others." Those who have studied the life of the Son of God as revealed in the New Testament know that Christ was right on ALL things. Jesus was right in life: "tempted in all
