## Fire Department Called to Meadow

Sunday morning at about 9:30 the Fire Dept. was called to Meadow to help fight a fire in the Church of Christ building.

Also on the scene was a truck from Brownfield, with a load of water. It backed up to the building and used its water supply, while the Ropes truck strung its hose and tied onto a fire hydrant.

The Ropes boys were ready to fight the fire. But they didn't. When they put the wrench on the fire plug to turn on the water, the entire top of the plug came off. In some manner the bolts had been removed, and it was impossible to get water through the plug.

However, the truck from Brownfield, with its water supply, extinguished the flames which had originated in a back room.

Following the blaze, the entire congregation came to Ropes for both morning and evening services in the Ropes Church of Christ.

A widely-known Lubbock music educator, Dr. Paul Lovett, 43, was dead on arrival at Methodist Hospital at 3:40 p.m. Sunday of an apparent heart attack.

Funeral services were at 4:30 p.m. Tuesday in First Methodist Church with Dr. J. Chess Lovern, pastor, officiating. Burial was in the Resthaven Memorial Park.

Dr. Lovett collapsed while working in the yard at his home, 3703 26th Street.

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## ALL HEAT RECORDS BROKEN IN FEBRUARY

While the north is in a deep freeze, all known records have been broken in this section by the unseasonable heat. Sunday the mercury jumped to a sizzling 85—the nearest to this and unofficial was Feb. 16 last year when it was 75 degrees.

Even the wasps and yellowjackets, which survived a 4 below in Jan., which also smashed previous records, have been fooled into thinking spring is here, and are flying about. This extremely warm weather has continued for two weeks. Fruit trees are beginning to bud, which means the next freeze will

kill the fruit crop this year. However, don't fool yourself, winter is not over. Such weather in February means we will make up for the cold the latter part of February, and March, and into April. Last year, following warm weather, a sudden and unexpected blizzard swept down

on us and deposited twelve inches of snow. Easter comes on April 22, and we can look for a cold snap before that date, and we have seen cold snaps and snow after Easter.

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## R. C. Copeland For County Judge

Robert C. Copeland has filed for the office of County Judge subject to the Democratic primary. This brings the total office seekers to three Democrats and one woman Republican.

It was a proud, rugged, hard-working family which asked no quarter and bowed to nobody—not even in the poverty-stricken depths of the depression.

All of them, the mother, father, three sons and two daughters were instilled with the same uncompromising conviction—that man was created "to work and to worship".

In this background, Robert Chancey (Bob) Copeland, Jr. learned a respect for work which has served him in good stead as a Soil Conservation Service worker, seismograph crew member, minister and insurance salesman.

"There's no success in any field without work," says Copeland, a highly studious individual and an avid reader who has built and sold in 36 busy years (because of changing conditions and circumstances) two big personal libraries.

His love for books and study is something of a weakness, a passion which his wife insists reaches such an extreme that he might well buy books when he didn't know where his next meal was coming from.

He's a moody poet—who as a high school student produced a treasured eulogy to a Childress High School vocational agriculture Cagle Teague—and who occasionally yet will turn to verse to express his thoughts.

As a boy, during the depression, he once hoed cotton and milked 12 cows a day all year in exchange for a bred gilt and three acres of dryland cotton. Swine prices hit bottom and his gilt ate more feed than she was worth, while drought cut his total cotton production to 300 pounds, which sold for 10 cents a pound.

His people shunned relief and employment by WPA, although money was so scarce and needs so great that even Copeland and his older brother, Jack, later saved pennies from their paper routes to send to their sister, who was attending college at ACC at Abilene.

Later, as times improved, young Copeland, who took three years of vocational agriculture in high school, raised a registered Jersey heifer which won two blue ribbons in small county dairy shows at Childress. Copeland, secretary of the same FFA chapter that state Sen. Andy Rogers of Childress headed as president, also walked off with some first place awards in FFA public speaking contests.

As a boy in Childress, before his family moved to the farm, Copeland started selling newspapers when he was eight years old. He delivered the Wichita Daily Times for a number of years, then later got a job rolling 400 Fort Worth Star Telegrams for 35 cents a morning. He earned a dollar a night—for 12 to 14 hours of work—as a baker's helper and worked with Western Union as a messenger boy for 30 cents an hour.

He was fourteen when the family started a three-year stint on the farm.

Copeland was born in Wichita Falls on July 23, 1923—a 12 pound, 3 ounce ball of fat and fretting, the biggest child born into the Copeland family.

His father was a contractor in Wichita Falls on a job at that time, returning to Childress—where his great-grandfather Copeland had homesteaded back in 1893.

Copeland was graduated

## County Democrats Have Full Ticket in Races

The time for filing for county offices has passed and the Democrats have come out with a full slate—in one race, that of county judge, there are three aspirants.

Following is the ticket, as filed with Lavern McCann, Democratic county chairman:

For State Senator — Doc Blanchard, Lubbock; Don Hancock, of Plains.

For State Representative — Olen Petty, Levelland.

For U. S. State Representative — George Mahon, of Lubbock.

For District Clerk — Ruby Beebe.

For County Judge — Louis Owens, Levelland; R. C. (Bob) Copeland, Levelland; Bryan Hulse, Whitharral.

For County Clerk — Raymond Dennis.

For County Attorney — Warren Tabor.

Board of Education — W. M. Evans, of Lubbock.

For County School Superintendent — Davis Pounds, of Levelland.

For Justice of the Peace, Precinct 1 — M. L. Roberts.

However, all countywide candidates, except Warren Tabor and Ruby Beebe, have Republican opponents.

From what we can understand, the Republicans are making enough noise in Levelland to cause the Democrats a little worry, even

though at no time in the history of the county has the Republicans ever polled more than a token vote.

George Mahon also has a Republican opponent from Crosbyton.

Also in the race for the State Senate is Jack Christie, from Brownfield, who is running on the Republican ticket.

And to show the trend of the times, this is the first instance in 32 years that Republicans have put out more than one candidate for Governor. That was in 1930 when Republican candidates received a total vote of 9,700 votes in the GOP primary. It was also the year that Ma Ferguson whipped the socks off Ross Sterling by polling 857,000 votes.

That the Republicans are hopeful goes without saying—they are bringing out candidates all over the state—it is a time when you can say you are Republican and folks won't call you a traitor to the South.

It is going to be a lively time in politics from now until the general election in November.

from Childress High School in 1942, in a class of 126 seniors. He went to work for the soil conservation service as an engineering aide after quitting a job with the Fort Worth and Denver Railroad because the company wanted him to work on Sundays.

From about 1943 through 1945, Copeland worked for the SCS in Childress, Lubbock, Muleshoe and Turkey, where he was to meet his wife.

Then he spent six months with seismograph crews for three different companies in Florida, Mississippi and Utah. This was not a happy per-

iod for Copeland because he was trying to attend church regularly, while the crews generally were engaged in rowdiness, drinking and gambling.

Copeland quit his seismograph work and joined the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation in Colorado.

While he was on the western Slope of the Continental Divide in Colorado, Copeland met Fred Harmon, the man who turns out the Red Ryder comic strip—an experience he remembers with pleasure.

He was later transferred to the big \$169 million Valley Gravity project at McAllen, where the government

was building several dams along the Rio Grande.

Copeland was surveying mesquite country near Edinburg with a mapping crew in this work.

Ordained to preach in 1943 Copeland had started preaching on a part-time basis wherever the opportunity offered itself.

He resigned his Bureau of Reclamation work to enter Harding College at Searcy, Ark., to prepare for the full-time ministry. There he took a specialized course in speech, English and Bible, returning to Turkey to marry Miss Ima Joe Gafford, daughter of a Turkey livestock trader, who is now deceased. She was the youngest child and the only girl in a family with five boys.

The Copelands, who live at 103 Cedar in Levelland, were the second family to move into the new Colonial Hts subdivision. Copeland maintains his office in his new FHA home, which is located in the northern portion of the subdivision.

The Copeland home is within a stone's throw of both the Cactus Drive Church of Christ and Cactus Elementary School.

Copeland and his wife have two daughters, Vickie 14, and Candy 9.
