FIRST STORMS

HIT PLAINS

The first tornado warnings and the first tornadoes hit the South Plains March 28th.

Charles Shannon, head of the Ground Observers Corp. was alerted just after noon on Friday of last week to be on the watch for possible tornadoes.

Immediately afterward the clouds built up in the southwest, but instead of sweeping directly over Ropes they split, going to the north and Both clouds consouth. tained tornadoes. The first report of a twister came over KLLL Radio Station in Lubbock announcing twister was sighted ten miles northeast of Brownfield. little later Constable Jack Ogle was informed by the Highway Patrol they were following the cloud.

This twister damaged few buildings near Brownfield, Lakeview and New, Home. Soon another torna-Smyer and Roundup, did no damage.

This latter cloud was visible from Ropes, boiling in Ropes community a heavy downpour of rain resulted, Nazarene Church.






