While it was not as much as we needed Tuesday night's rain is invaluable to growing crops, but from some reports there still has not been rain enough to make planting feasible on dry land.

In Ropes, according to W. M. Thompson's rain gauge, 8/10ths was registered.

West of Ropes the heaviest amount registered, at Tom Price's place about 10 miles, was 8/10th inch. Tuesday afternoon 3/10th of this was received.

Coming east the rain slackened up with Foster's Store, 4 miles west, reporting a half inch; Corky Price, 6 miles northwest, reporting same.

Ennis Moore, southeast of Ropes, reports a half inch; Alvin Ryals, about 7 miles east, 8/10th inch; Crate Snider, 5 miles east, a half inch; Lony Sims, north of Ropes, 8/10ths of an inch; Herman Timmons reported 3/4ths of an inch, with J. R. Smith, in the same vicinity, reported 6/10ths of an inch.
