POST OFFICE MOVES TO NEW QUARTERS IN WOLFFORTH

Clyde D. Gamble announces that a contract has been awarded to Mr. J. R. Morris, P. O. Box 96, Wolfforth, Texas, to lease new quarters to the Post Office Department at Wolfforth on the south side of Main Street between Steck Avenue and Cedar Avenue, to improve postal operations in Wolfforth, Texas, Postmaster General J. Edward Day announced recently.

"We are continuing to build new post offices where they are needed," Mr. Day said, "but we are constantly reassessing our lease construction program to determine whether present buildings can be remodeled, or whether our postal needs can better be served by moving to an existing building at a new location.

"We now have about 45,000 post office locations throughout the country, handling a volume of 65 billion pieces of mail a year. By 1970 it is expected to rise to 90 billion. It is clear, therefore, that we must redouble our efforts, not only in expanding our capacity but also in devising new postal techniques to meet the demands of our growing population."

Under the Department's lease construction program Mr. Morris will improve the building according to departmental specifications and lease it to the Department for five years with one 5-year renewal option.

The Department's capital investment is limited substantially to postal equipment, while the building remains under private ownership, with the owner paying local real estate taxes. Mr. Day said, "This formula utilizes the resources and investment funds of private enterprise for needed postal buildings."

The new quarters at Wolfforth will contain 770 square feet of floor space and are scheduled for occupancy by September 1, or soon thereafter.

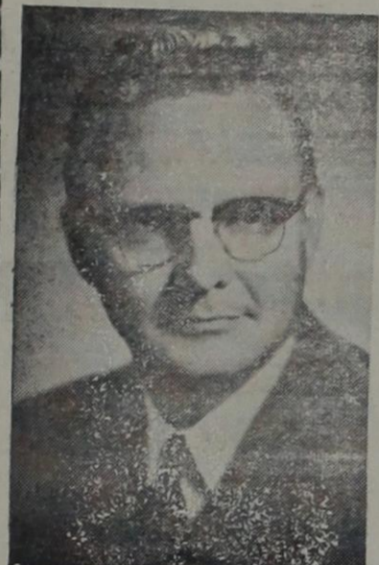

JNO. 8:32

"Whoso keepeth his mouth and his tongue keepeth his soul from troubles." Prov. 21:23. James wrote, "If any stumbeeth not in word, the same is a perfect man, able to bridle the whole body also." Jas. 3:2. Again James wrote, "If any man thinketh himself to be religious, while he bridleth not his tongue but deceiveth his heart, this man's religion is vain." Jas. 1:26.

Our tongues are the hardest members of our bodies to control. The lack of tongue control has and will cause untold grief. Jesus taught the importance of the proper use of our tongues in these words: "But I say unto you, That every idle word that men shall speak, they shall give account thereof in the day of judgment. For by thy words thou shalt be justified, and by thy words thou shalt be condemned." Matt. 12:36-37. Study with us some of the sins of the tongue:

1. Profanity: "Out of the same mouth proceedeth blessing and cursing. My brethren, these things ought not so to be." Jas. 3:10.

2. Coarse and obscene language: "Let no corrupt com-

munication (speech) come out of your mouth, but that which is good to the use of edifying, that it may minister grace unto the hearers." Eph. 4:29. "Neither filthiness, nor foolish talking, nor jesting, which are not convenient; but rather giving of thanks." Eph. 5:4.

3. Lying: "Lie not one to another, seeing that ye have put off the old man with his deeds." Col. 3:9. "Wherefore putting away lying, speak every man truth with his neighbor: for we are members one of another."

4. Harsh words uttered in anger: "A soft answer turneth away wrath: but grievous words stir strife." Prov. 15:1.

5. Evil speaking of others: "Let all bitterness, and wrath, and anger, and evil speaking, be put away from you, with all malice." Eph. 4:31.
