## Schedule is Set Up for 1958-59 School Term

The tentative high school schedule for Ropes schools has been worked out and was handed to the Plainsman by High School Principal M. G. Hannaford. The schedule is as follows:

Period 1 — Driver Education, Chemistry, Bookkeeping, Health, World History, Plane Geometry, Homemaking II, Band.  
Period 2—Algebra I, Typing II, American History, Algebra II, English IV, Vocational Agriculture I, Homemaking I.

Period 3—Girls P. E., General Science, Typing I, English, Speech, Vocational Agriculture I.

Period 4—Biology, Typing I, Civics, English I, English III, Vocational Agriculture I, Homemaking I.

Period 5—Algebra I, Biology, English I, Publications, Vocational Agriculture II, Chorus.

Period 6—Boys P. E., Junior Business Training, Stenography, English II, Speech, Homemaking III.

Mr. Hannaford announced this week that he will be in his office in the high school building from 8:30 to 10:30 on July 7, 8, 9, and July 14, 15 and 16, and will appreciate it if high school pupils who have not done so, will come by and make final approval of their schedule.

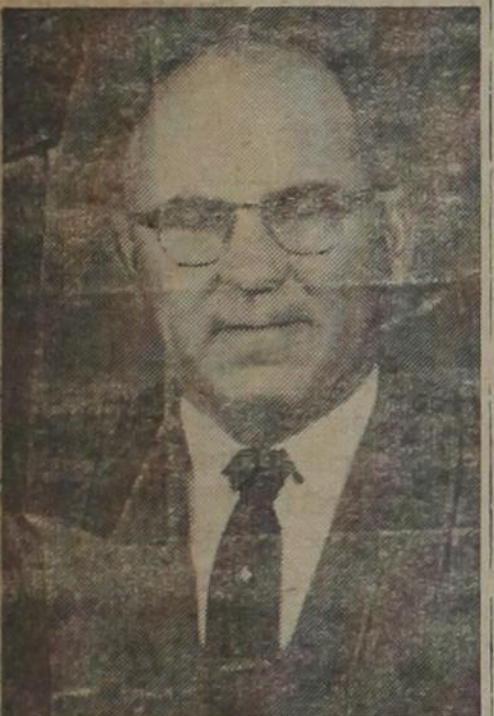
