Did You Know We Have No Radio In Ropesville

This past week we were shocked to learn that Ropes has no radio communication. The radio in City Marshal Dub Riney's car has been out for three months.

At the time the radio quit operating, Commissioner Myrl Brock promised another radio out of a county pickup to be installed in the Marshal's car.

When we learned this past Friday evening of the circumstances, we made a trip to Levelland and talked to Sheriff Wier Clem. We found that Weir had made all possible efforts to get the radio over here, and had had no luck to date. Myrl Brock was not available for comment.

Weir Clem finally located the unit which is supposed to be installed in Ropes. It is in a Lubbock repair shop. The radio needs a new crystal.

On Tuesday morning we again talked to Sheriff Clem, and he stated: "I talked to Judge Hulon Moreland yesterday, and he was very concerned over the fact; and I explained the situation is desperate. The Judge stated that this matter will be brought before the Commissioner's Court at Wednesday's meeting.

Citizens of Ropes have felt very safe in retiring at night because they thought the siren would warn if a bad cloud was approaching the town.

Then we find there is no radio unit in our part of the

county so that warnings may be issued when necessary.

Needless to say, if a cloud did hit Ropes, the telephones would be out of order, and we would be completely cut off.

Then there are many other important reasons for the need of radio communication. If the local officer needed help, or any emergency arose, there is no way to call for aid.

It would seem to us that in three months the radio promised should be installed.

We would like to say that we very much appreciate the cooperation of Sheriff Weir Clem on this matter, as he is devoting his time right now to the needs of our community.

MYRL BROCK CALLS

Late Tuesday morning Commissioner Myrl Brock called the Plainsman and stated:

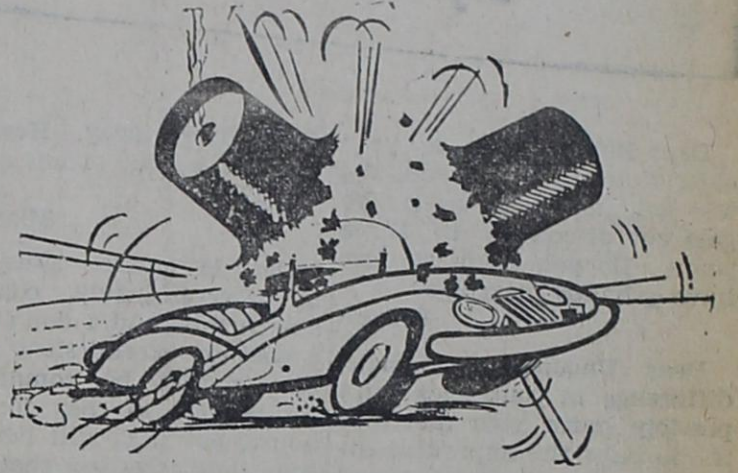
"The radio unit for Ropes is in a repair shop in Lubbock and I just called, and the man in charge was not there, so I am going to Lubbock in person to see why the unit is not ready."

We then asked him how long it had been since he checked on the radio and he said he checked last week and it was not ready then.

There seems to be a shortage of parts. He also stated that he realizes the unit is needed real bad in Ropes, and there is no other unit available in the county.

As we go to press, there is no later word.

July 4th Holiday Safety



Austin, Texas, June 29 — The Texts Safety Association today issued its annual "Accidental Death Alert" for the July 4th holiday period and called on Texans to put safety first in all activities.

"Holidays can be a time to remember, or a time of tragedy," S. Ross Carr of Houston, TSA President said. "It often depends on knowing and using your safety rules - whether you are driving on the highways, pending the weekend at the lake, or just relaxing at home."

The TSA "Accidental Death Alert" begins at 12:01 a.m. Friday and ends at 11:59 p.m. Sunday. It coincides with the Department of Public Safety's traffic accident watch - "Operation Motorcade."

The Association is coordinating its traffic safety program with the DPS and other state agencies. Subject for the TSA safety promotion is "Courtesy and Caution."

"Adding courtesy" to caution, can take you a long way in traffic. Your attitude about your driving and that of other drivers has a profound effect on the possibilities of your being involved in an accident," Carr said.

"Treat other drivers the way you want to be treated - with courtesy."

In addition to issuing traffic warnings, the Association has urged care in recreational activities, especially those

associated with water. "Boating enthusiasts should take all safety precautions when putting their crafts into crowded waters. Carry a life preserver for everyone on board. Don't overload your craft with too many passengers, and watch for swimmers, water skiers and other boats" Carr advised.

He reminded homeowners to be on the alert for the backyard - variety accidents and advised parents to be on guard for fireworks accidents.

"If your celebration calls for a backyard barbecue, be sure to use caution in handling starter fluids. Treat all fires with respect. Keep a water hose handy to put out any fire that gets out of control," he said.

"Parents should take charge of any fireworks displays. Keep small children at a safe distance and supervise the handling of fireworks by older children.

"Even those harmless looking little sparklers can be dangerous. They burn at a temperature of 1,650 degrees, which is nearly hot enough to melt copper."

In concluding, Carr stated that each year many lives are lost during holidays simply because people put away the safety rules for the occasion.

"But, the fact is," he said, "there just aren't any holidays on accidents!"

Tornados, Hail And High Winds Lash Area

Thunderstorms, hail, high winds and tornados were prominent over the South Plains area Friday evening with one tornado touching ground and doing quite a bit of damage west of Ropes.

On the Ben Stephens farm outbuildings were damaged and irrigation pipe hurled over a wide area and power lines were ripped out.

A tractor shed at Lockettville was demolished and a number of cotton trailers overturned.

Heavy hail fell causing crop losses on the farms of M. M. Collins, Frank Sylvester, J. C. Armstrong, Bud Arnwine, R. N. Sullivan, Bud Rucker and Jess Gregg, Bill Odom, and others we do not have listed.

On the Sylvester place, a

barn was picked up, set cut in the field and then the pieces were scattered a mile or more over the farm of Jerry Jephcott, and on north east through the fields. We ask Jerry if he saw the tornado, and he replied, "No, one minute it was clear, and the next it was a solid wall of rain." He lost the roof off an outbuilding.

E. N. Exum also lost two roofs from barns, and his crops from hail.

Twenty-eight windows in the Hollis Borland home were sucked out by a tornado.

At Smyer it was reported there were no windows or glasses in cars and houses left that were facing south. The hail was said to be the size of baseballs.

The clouds were fast moving, lasting only from three to five minutes, but doing heavy damage in this short length of time.

Our report is not nearly complete, as on Tuesday we had no luck finding any one at home to talk to.

JUDGEMENT
...Ted Dotts
Perhaps one of the greatest stumbling blocks for us all is found in Matthew 7:1, "Judge not, that you be not judged." Each of us finds this a difficult command for day after day we find ourselves sliding into judgment. And, nothing so jolts us as to have a neighbor of ours say to us, "You are judging me!" We all shirk this kind of accusation.

So our question becomes: What is judgement? What does Jesus mean when He says, "Judge not."

First let us consider what Jesus is not saying. He is not saying that we close our eyes to what people do. He is not saying that we must withhold our thoughts about what we consider to be wrong. He is not saying that we must back down when someone accuses us of judgment.

It is a false concept to think that Jesus asks us to shun the heavy task of withholding our best reasoning, our best judgment.

Secondly, what is Jesus saying?

In order to discover what He is saying, let us understand the word "judgment". This word used for judgment in the New Testament is a Greek word (remember the New Testament was written in Greek) crises. Crises has two meanings: (1) to set aside, to cut, and (2) to distinguish right from wrong.

Jesus's admonition in Matthew 7:1 is the command not to cut ourselves off from one another. Our judgment should not separate us from our neighbor. No act of curs should break the ties that bind us to one another. This we could read Jesus's command in Matthew 7:1 thusly, "Cut yourself not off from your neighbor."

Jesus is not saying to us not to judge in the second sense of the word. Indeed, judgment is intelligence. If we did not use our judgment when would we plant cotton or harvest it? or eat? or shop for bargains?

You and I are to judge, that is, we are to distinguish right from wrong. BUT we are not to issue forth our judgment in such a manner so as to separate us from one another. Any judging you do that separates you from your neighbor comes under Jesus's command, "Judge not!"

But, you may judge, indeed you must judge, when judgment is seen in terms of distinguishing right from wrong. Judgment has to do with the use of our intelligence.

In arguments or discussions there is a good practice to follow which also helps us to understand the two meanings of the word judgment.

Never say to the person you are in discussion with, "You bother me because you have such strange ideas." This kind of statement separates you from your neighbor. You indicate there is something wrong with him.

Rather, say to him, "Your ideas, they bother me." In this way you do not cut your self off from your neighbor. The two of you may discuss in the realm of ideas which is safer than discussing in terms of personalities.

Judge not! Do not cut yourself off from one another.

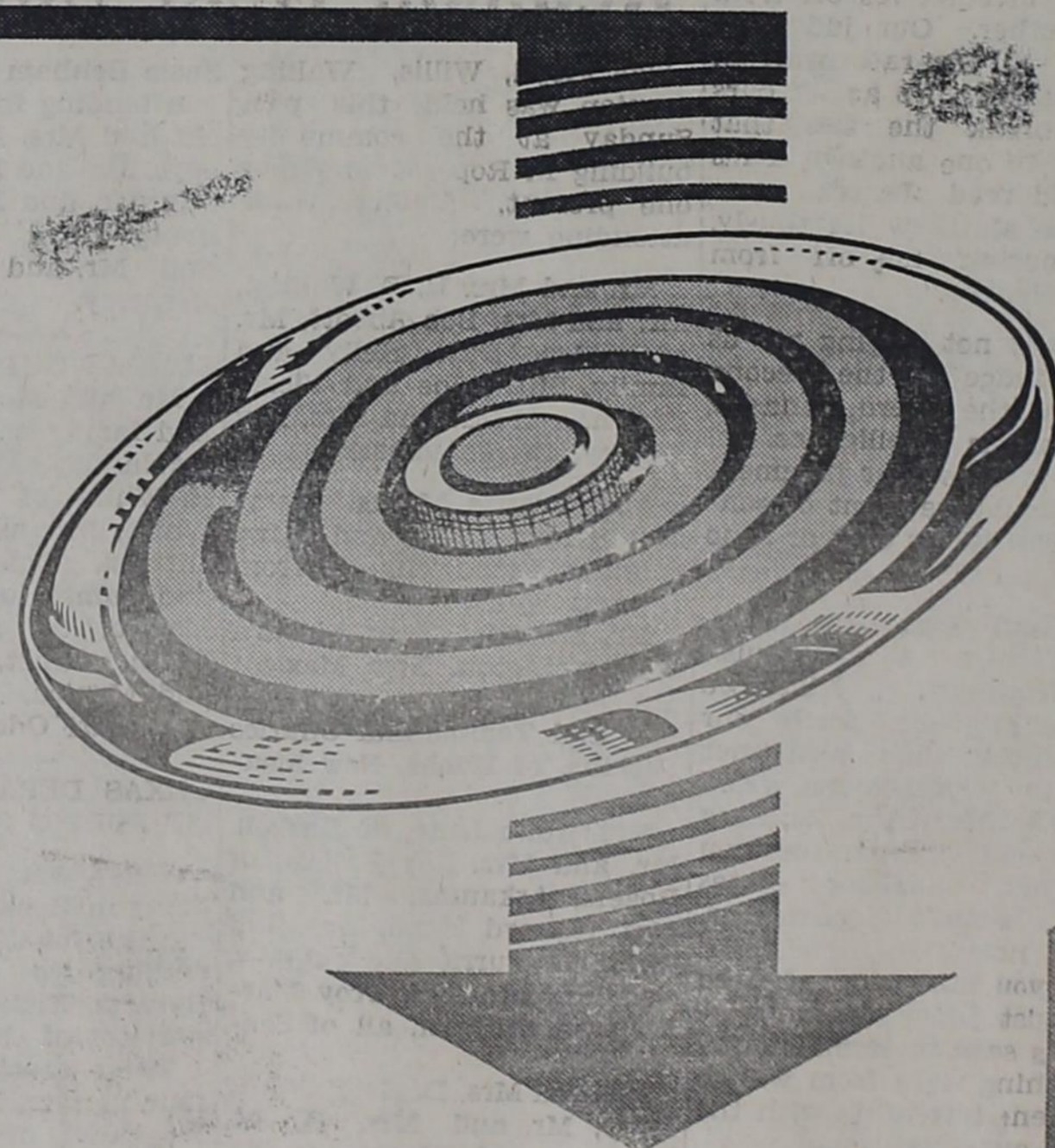
