Absentee Voting on Amendments Will Open Wednesday, October 17th—End November 2nd

Absentee voting by personal appearance in the County Clerk's office, will begin Wednesday, October 17th, and continue through Friday, November 2nd for the Proposed Constitutional Amendments Election to be held in Hockley County on November 6, 1973.

Those persons who expect to be absent from the County on election day, (November 6) may vote absentee in the County Clerk's office between the hours of 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday, during the period for absentee voting.

Also those persons who are confined to their homes, hospital, custodial or nursing homes, due to illness of physical disability, may make application by mail with the County Clerk, P.O. Box 1209, Levelland, Texas, 79336, and a ballot for said election will be mailed to them. The County Clerk needs the following information from those persons requesting ballots to be voted by mail: Name, as is listed on voter registration certificate, voting precinct number, and present address, whether it be a temporary address or their home address of P.O. box number.

To be eligible to vote in the November 6, 1973, Constitutional Amendments Election, a person must be at least 18 years of age and must have been registered with the Tax Assessor-Collector of Hockley County at least thirty (30) days prior to election day. Those persons who are confined in continuous residence at a duly licensed nursing or custodial home because of sickness or physical disability, and those persons having a permanent ailment or physical disability of a continuing nature which renders him or her unable to appear at the polls and vote in person, may file a "certificate of Permanent Disability" with the Tax Assessor Collector, (Registrar), or the County Clerk at least thirty-one

There are nine (9) separate Proposed Constitutional Amendments to be voted on November 6th, 1973. The County Clerk's office is located on the second floor, main Courthouse, Levelland, Texas, Room 201.

Hockley County cotton producers will have an opportunity to hear discussions on techniques on harvesting and handling the 1973 cotton crop in a meeting to be held in the District Courtroom, Levelland, Thursday, October 11, at 7:30 p.m.

According to County Agent, Bill Taylor, the meeting will include information on cotton defoliation, field storage, and handling of seed cotton. Taylor said that the meeting would be a good opportunity for farmers to study the proper use of rick compactors and module builders for the storage of seed cotton in the field.

Agent Taylor said that there is now more cotton open in the field than we have had at this time of the season in several years. This

situation may give farmers an opportunity to consider defoliation and desiccation to enable harvest to begin earlier than would be allowed behind a normal frost date.

Stocker Cattle Meet Is Scheduled Monday, October 15th

There has been an increase in cattle production in Hockley County during the past few years according to County Agent, Bill Taylor. Taylor said as many as three to four thousand additional cattle are being run in the county than were pastured three years ago. The increased numbers have been in cow-calf as well as stocker cattle being conditioned for feedlots. According to Taylor, farmers are using permanent pastures, native range, stalk fields, sudan - sorghum - hybrids, and small grains to provide pasture for these animals. A meeting to be held in the District Courtroom, Levelland, Monday, October 15, at 7:30 p.m. will bring producers information to help them manage these operations. The program topics and speakers for the meeting are: **Economics of Grazing Permanent Pastures, Temporary Pastures and Stalks Fields**—Speaker, Marvin O. Sartin, Extension Farm Management Specialist. **Utilization of Temporary and Permanent Pastures**, Speaker, Dr. James Supak, Extension Agronomist. **Supplemental Feeding of Stocker Cattle**, Speaker, Dr. John C. Parrott, Extension Beef Cattle Specialist. **Keeping Stocker Cattle Healthy and Pasturing Alfalfa**, Speaker, Dr. Gene Cope, Extension Veterinarian.

Laird's Balloon

Presidential aide Melvin Laird recently told reporters President Nixon is considering an increase in the income tax, as a means of combatting inflation.

Since this is a move the President has publicly pledged an all-out effort to avoid, the Laird statement was considered a trial balloon by many. While the President has ordered a study of the proposal, and others recommended by Arthur Burns, chairman of the Federal Reserve Board, he said there would be no tax increase this year.

Economists tend to view the inflationary scene with a professional, mathematical eye; they therefore often propose taxing personal incomes as a means of checking inflation in a somewhat dispassionate way; the reduced income leaves the average citizen less money with which to buy fewer things.

While this works to stem inflation, obviously, it should be the last resort of governments at a time when the average citizen is also being affected by rising prices, rising interest rates and other forms of inflationary hardship.

Since Mr. Nixon based his presidential campaign last year in part on a platform to avoid further income taxes, he should certainly employ every other method available to him as chief executive, including raising corporation taxes, before adding to the average citizen's tax burden at this time of serious inflationary pressure on family budgets.

Mrs. Ida Gossett, 86, passed away September 10th after three and a half years in Roosevelt General Hospital in Portales, New Mexico.

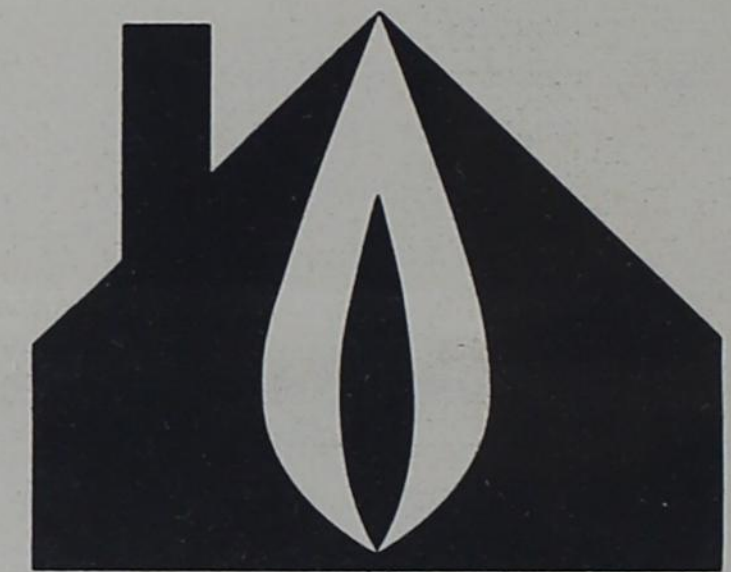
Services were held Sept. 12 at Starlight Chapel in Portales with burial in Portales Cemetery.
