The water rates in Ropes have been held at the same level as when the system was installed. Now Ropes has the cheapest water rates of any city on the South Plains. However, from the present outlook the water rates are going have to be raised. The minumum rate is \$2 for the first three thousand gallons-to meet the rising cost there is a likelihood that this minimum will have to be raised to

In addition to the other expense the City allows each fireman, who attends meetings regularly, his minimum water bill, which is \$2 per month. The city takes none of the donations made to the fire department. Unlike other cities Ropes allows all money, including \$25 for each fire out of the city limits paid by the county, to go to the firemen to do with as they please. 





Dan and Don Day, identical twins, farm four sections of irrigated land—as well as overseeing nine sections of ranch land, 25 miles northwest of Brownfield. 
Don and Dan said: "Last year we used Liquid Fertilizer, and at the end of the year the savings amazed us. This year we are applying (pre-planting) 40-lbs. of Nitrogen, 40-lbs. of Phosphate and 20-lbs. of Potash. This will only be the starter—we will side-dress at least once and possibly twice. We are of the opinion that it is better to apply plant nutrients as the plants need or can use them, than it is to try and feed the plants all at one time," the twins added.
