PATRIOTISM

History has often played curious tricks with words and their meanings. For example, the word "pious" once meant sincerely reverent and devoutly religious when used to describe a person's holiness. In our usage today, a "pious" person is thought of as one who is holier-than-thou and somewhat less than sincere. According to the original meaning of the word, being pious was a virtue, whereas quite the opposite is the case in modern usage. No doubt the meaning of "pious" changed because of the lives of pious people. When those claiming to be pious were found out to be hypocrites, then the word took on an unfavorable connotation.

Unfortunately, we are now witnessing the same kind of phenomena concerning the word "patriotism." In the language of every nation and certainly in the history of America, "patriotism" has been a grand word calling forth visions of courage, devotion and loyalty to home and to country both in times of war and peace. Early in our history, patriotism was a commonly accepted and commonly understood virtue. A good American was a patriot and an unpatriotic citizen was not always thought of as a good American.

Now we have entered a period of our history when many issues are neither simple nor clear cut. On matters of foreign policy, especially regarding Southeast Asia and the Viet Nam question, the spectrum of differing opinions is extremely wide. We have become accustomed to use of political labels such as "liberal," "conservative," "leftist," "rightist," and so on. Demonstrations for peace may take the form of protest against the war in Viet Nam, or they may include strong support for present policy as the best means of obtaining peace. In short, we find ourselves divided over issues which concern our ideas of patriotism.

One voice which we often hear above the din tells us that to be a patriot is to favor a stronger military policy. Another voice cries for all patriots to support withdrawal. Another identifies patriotism with unquestioning acceptance of all government policy. And yet another links patriotism with the freedom to protest. The meaning of the word "patriotism" is in danger of becoming obscure.

Although I do not fully understand all the issues surrounding the present dilemma I am not worried about the debate which is now going on in our country. Debate is always a healthy sign of a free people. However, I would like to speak for all such disagreement being carried on in the light of patriotic concern rather than in the shadow of unpatriotic rebellion. To disagree with government policy to protest, to demonstrate is a cherished right of every freedom loving American. But to burn the flag which represents much more than just our present foreign policy or to march in our streets under the banner of another nation strikes me as irresponsible use of freedom and as unpatriotic! The secret of our strength as a democratic nation has always been our patriotic unity even in the midst of serious disagreement. We always have at least two opinions, two parties, two candidates, two policies. So I want to reserve the right to differ and to protest if neces-

Two Teams To 4-H Roundup June 6

Texas has long been famous for its roundups and its 4-H Roundup is no exception. This annual event to be held on the campus of Texas A & M University, June 6-7, is one of the nation's oldest statewide annual 4-H events. Originally, it was a part of the Farmers Short Course.

The number of 4-H members in attendance this year will be down since only the first place winning teams from the 12 Extension districts are eligible to attend. Winners in the State 4-H Food Show will be determined on June 6 and those in 31 other judging and demonstration contests on June 7.

From our own county two teams qualified for the state contest. They are Becky Carpenter and Pam Ream with their safety demonstration and Marcia Ream and Paula McCormick with their elect-

The state 4-H leaders say approximately 85 boys and girls from every section of Texas will participate in the contests. They will be accompanied by some 350 local adult leaders and county Extension agents who have coached and supervised the district winners.

In addition, the state 4-H leaders are expecting some 500 friends of 4-H to attend all or part of the two day program. Included are sponsors of judging and demonstration contests, and members of the Texas 4-H Youth Development Foundation.

The Foundation sponsors many of the Roundup activities and its trustees, all prominent leaders in agriculture, industry and public service, will meet on June 6, according to Chairman Jerry D. Wheat of Dallas. He added that future plans will be developed to provide greater opportunities for Texas 4-H Club members and their adult leaders.

Tornado Safety

AUSTIN — Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today urged Texans to review tornado safety precautions.

"While tornadoes can occur any time of the year," Garrison said, "April, May, and June are the peak months."

U.S. Weather Bureau records indicate that Texas leads the nation in total number of tornadoes per year. The annual average of 30.7

is based on a record of 121 confirmed tornadoes from 1951 thru 1965.

"It is especially important for every school, church, hospital, hotel, business house, and industry to establish an emergency plan," Garrison said. "To know what to do when a tornado is approaching may mean the difference between life and death."

Pre-School Kindergarten At Ropes Next Year

Plans are being made to begin a pre-school kindergarten program under the Title I project for economically deprived children of the Ropes community.

The program replaces the Remedial Reading Program now in effect in Ropes Elementary School.

Mrs. Donald Blackmon will be the teacher for this Kindergarten Program which is slated to start at the beginning of the 1967-68 school year.

This program will include all 5 year olds who are eligible and can qualify. In order to qualify, a family's income must be less than \$3,000. per year.

The purpose of the program is to help break down language barriers, and give the children a good orientation and prepare them for first grade school work.

Hockley County Farm Bureau Queen Contest

The Hockley County Farm Bureau Queen Contest will be held July 13 at South Plains College in Levelland. Rehearsals will be July 11.

All entry blanks must be in by July 1, and may be obtained from Mrs. John Ream, or at the Farm Bureau Office.

Following are the rules and awards:

1. The purpose of this contest is to give recognition to the Farm and Ranch girls of Texas. The basic principles of the contest are as follows:

a. This is an honest-to-goodness Queen Contest. The girls are to be judged on grace, poise, charm, vivaciousness, and all the other qualities that go to make up winsome Texas future homemakers. There are three main points on which they will be judged: namely, (1) appearance, (2) poise, (3) personality.

b. This contest is to give our beautiful farm and ranch girls recognition.

c. There is nothing personal in the project. It is anticipated that through the institution of this contest that more farm and ranch girls and other young people may become better acquainted with the principles of the Farm Bureau organization.

d. Question outline will be prepared to be used by the masters of ceremonies in the county and district contests. The same questions will also be used in the state contest.

e. Each contestant will be required to speak approximately one minute on, "Why Are You Glad Your Family Belongs to Farm Bureau?"

f. This project offers a contest that is glamorous, attractive, gains attention, and is worthy of sponsorship by

County Farm Bureaus.

2. Eligibility

a. Daughter or sister of a Farm Bureau member actively engaged in agricultural production. Membership should be in county of participation.

b. Single. (Defined as an unmarried girl or a girl who has never been married.)

c. Age 16-22 (sixteen by September 1, 1966 and not over 22, September 1, 1966.)

d. County must have 25 Farm Bureau members.

e. To enter district elimination, county must have a queen contest with at least two participants.

Exceptions — all employees and previous state winners, are not eligible to enter this contest.

3. Awards — appropriate awards will be made in the queen contest.

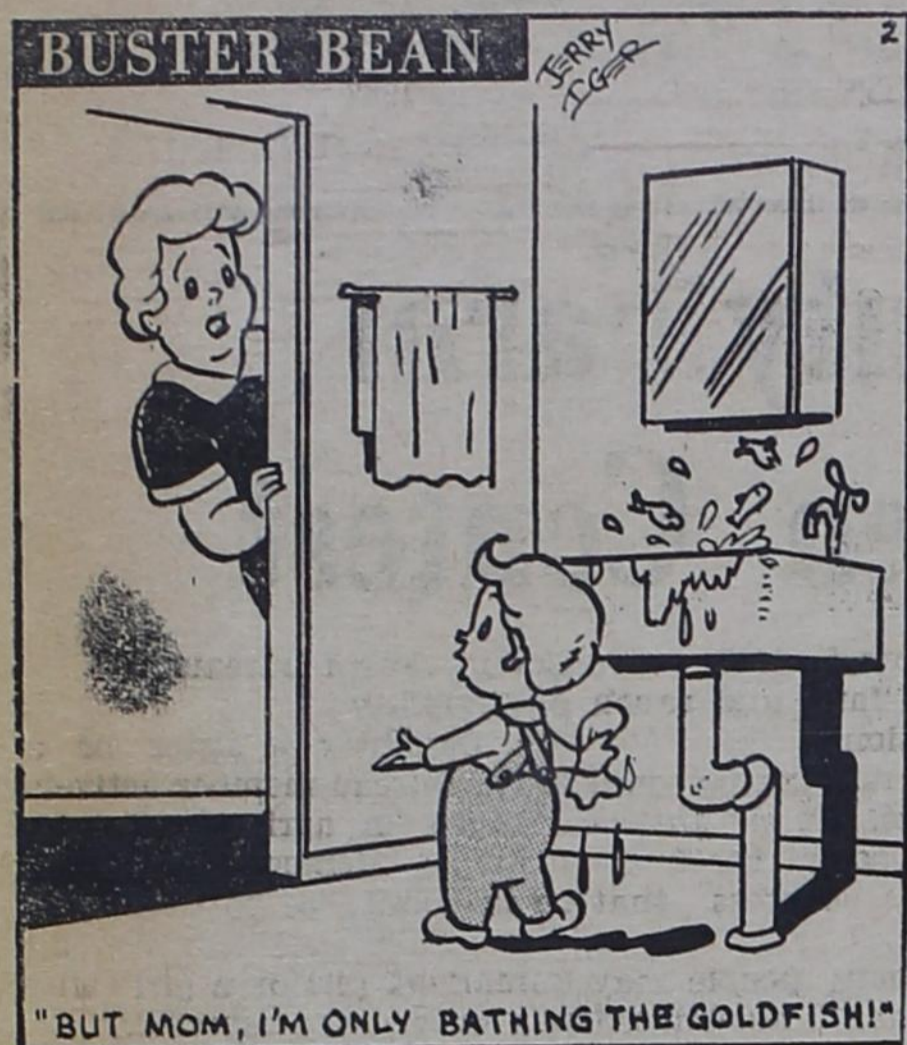

OPEN MEETINGS MANDATORY BY GOVERNMENTAL BODIES

Gov. John Connally, on May 22, signed into law an "Open Meetings" bill which he proclaimed as "a great step forward for the people of Texas."

He was referring to Senate Bill 94 sponsored by Sen. Chet Brooks of Pasadena. Similar legislation was introduced in the House by Rep. Bill Rapp of Raymondville.

Passage of the "Open Meetings" legislation at the 1967 session culminated a drive that began some 20 years ago. It was engineered by legislators and the press to insure a better flow of information to the public.

At the bill signing ceremony, Governor Connally made this statement regarding the importance of the legislation: "Senate Bill 94, commonly known as the open meeting bill, provides basically that meetings of boards, agencies and commissions shall be open meetings, open to the press. This is something that the working press in the capitol and the press throughout the state have been interested in for a long, long time. I think it's an historic and significant bill and a significant day."

"Certainly there's never been any desire, as far as I know, on the part of anyone who serves on a board or an agency or commission to transact its business under the cloak of

secrecy. But, nevertheless, the meetings have, from time to time, been closed."

Connally added: "This bill will now end that and provide that all the meetings shall be open to the press. It's a great step forward in trying to provide a means where the public can be more informed with respect to governmental affairs and public affairs."

"Beyond any question, one of the weaknesses of a democratic society is that it's always difficult to try to articulate and to inform the public of the problems that surround the administration of government. I personally feel that if the public is informed, if it has the knowledge, people themselves will always make the right decisions. And this is going to be a step providing the means where people can be better informed on the workings of their government."

Governor Connally further stated: "This is particularly important because the affairs of this state are run by the various agencies, boards and commissions. People generally do not quite understand the significance of these various boards, agencies and commissions and the work that they do and the decisions they make. It is really the heart and the essence of government in Texas."

"So I want to applaud the efforts of the press itself to bring into the light and to the awareness of the Legislature the need for this type of legislation. I want to commend the members of the Legislature who supported it and congratulate the people of Texas that they now can be better informed on their own affairs."

Excepted in the bill, so far as open meetings are concerned, are grand juries and certain executive sessions supported by or expending public funds. The law also excepts meetings called to consider the appointment, employment or dismissal of a public officer or employee or to hear complaints or charges brought against such persons, unless the individual concerned requests a public hearing.

Similar legislation was introduced by the Texas Press Association some 20 years ago. This year it had the backing not only of TPA but also the Texas Daily Newspaper Association and the Sigma Delta Chi journalistic fraternity, plus the support of radio and television media.

Co-sponsors of the new law, in addition to Senator Brooks, were the following Senators: Joe Christie of El Paso; Barbara Jordan of Houston; Criss Cole of Houston; Henry C. Grover of Houston; A. L. Schwartz of Galveston; and Dorsey B. Hardeman of San Antonio.

Joining Representative Rapp in escorting the bill through the House were Representatives Russell Cummings and Paul Floyd, both of Houston.
