SANDRA JEFFCOAT IS B. CROCKER HOME-MAKER OF TOMORROW

(Sent in by General Mills)
Sandra C. Jeffcoat has been named 1964 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow for Ropes high school, Ropesville, Texas. She achieved the highest score here in a written homemaking examination taken by senior girls throughout the country on December 3, and now becomes eligible for one of 102 scholarships totaling \$110,000.

Her paper has been entered with those of other school winners in the state in competition for the title, State Homemaker of Tomorrow. The winner of this honor will receive a \$1,500 scholarship from General Mills, Inc., sponsor of the annual program. The second-ranking girl in the state will receive a \$500 educational grant. The school of the state winner will be awarded a complete set of the Encyclopaedia Britannica by Encyclopaedia Britannica, Inc.

Late in April, the first-place winners from each of the 50 states and the District of Columbia, together with school advisors, will gather in Colonial Williamsburg, Va., to start an expense-paid educational tour of the East. The week-long tour, also including Washington, D.C., and New York City, will culminate with the naming of the 1964 Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow. Chosen on the basis of original test score, plus personal observation and interviews during the tour, she will have her scholarship increased to \$5,000. Grantees of second-, third-, and fourth-place winners will become \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000, respectively.

All judging is done by Science Research Associates, Chicago, which also constructs and grades the written examination.

The Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow was begun in 1954 to emphasize the importance of homemaking as a career. It marked its tenth anniversary this year with a record enrollment of 484,879 senior girls in 14,059 high schools. Total enrollment since the program's start stands at 3 1/2 million girls and, with this year's grants, scholarships will exceed \$1 million.

FHA LOANS TO COUNTY FAMILIES IN 1963 TOTAL \$940,430

Hockley County Farm and other families borrowed \$940,430 from the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Farmers Home Administration in 1963 to improve farming operations, buy and enlarge farms, build houses, install water systems, and for other development purposes. Horace D. Gilmore, local supervisor of the agency, reported recently.

A total of 127 families in the county used credit from the agency during the year, either as individual borrowers or members of associations with a Farmers Home Administration direct or insured loan.

Loans are made by Farmers Home Administration only to qualified borrowers who cannot obtain credit from banks, Production Credit Associations and other conventional lenders.

Under an insured program of the agency, these lenders also provide about eighty per cent of the funds loaned by Farmers Home Administration and secured by real estate.

Hockley County families paid the Agency \$731,090.00 in interest and principal on loans outstanding during the year.

He singled out the farm operating, farm ownership, rural housing, association loan program of his agency as being of particular importance in the county last year.

Mr. Gilmore also reported that management assistance to Farmers Home Administration borrowers in the county is the most important aspect of his work.

Last year 86 farm families in the county using Farmers Home Administration credit received assistance in solving farm and home management, and financial problems.

The efficient management of farm resources, now is the crucial factor in the success of farmers here in the county and throughout the state, Mr. Gilmore said.

Following is a summary of loans made by Farmers Home Administration in Hockley County during 1963.

A total of \$797,650 went to 36 Hockley County farmers to pay for equipment, feed, seed, livestock, for other farm and home operating needs, and refinance chattel debts, carry out forestry purposes, and develop income-producing recreational enterprises.
