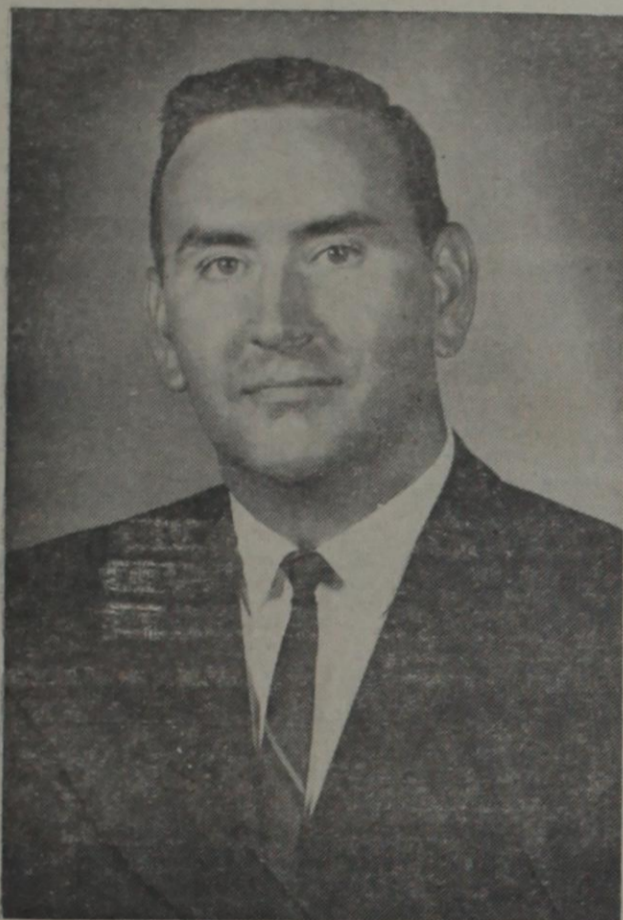

JEHOVAH'S WITNESSES IN SAN ANGELO FRIDAY

Jehovah's Witnesses of the Levelland Congregation will join 5,000 associates at the Courageous Ministers District Assembly in San Angelo Coliseum July 27 to 29, according to Alfred Ferguson, local minister.

Delegates will come from 135 congregations in Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and 7 other states for the three-day meet.

The Witnesses have undertaken a door-to-door canvass of the entire city of San Angelo to obtain accommodations to supplement the 1200 hotel and motel rooms that are available in the city.

"This method of obtaining rooms is not new for Jehovah's Witnesses," said Ferguson. "We did the same thing in Houston, Oklahoma City and in New York for some of our larger conventions."

The meetings at the local Kingdom Hall will be discontinued during the convention week as members of the Levelland Congregation will attend the convention.

Twenty ministers have been appointed by the Watchtower Society to participate in the three-day program that will be climaxed Sunday at 3:00 p.m. with the talk "Take Courage—God's Kingdom is at Hand", according to Ferguson.

Nazarenes to Hear Missionary Speak

HARLAN DALTON WINS AGAIN

The following article was handed us by Giles Dalton. It was taken from The Globe And Mail, dated Thursday, June 21, 1962:

Jack Stafford's Cesca blazed to a Canadian track record in winning the \$9,345 My Dear Stakes at Woodbine yesterday.

The Mercury-footed chestnut filly ran the five furlongs in 58 seconds flat, posting a 2 1-2 length margin over Roxie Gians Stinchnew. Ben Hatskin's Ontario Holiday was third, a length and a quarter back.

Harlan Dalton, the riding sensation of the day with five winners, hustled Cesca, which clipped a fifth of a second off the former Canadian mark held by Nearctic. Cesca also shaved two-fifths of a second off the track standard of 58 2-5, a mark shared by such outstanding horses as Victoria Park, Silver Ship and Willow Strip.

Dalton's brilliant riding performance eclipsed his previous high for the season of four winners. The 27-year old reinsman from Lubbock, Texas, rode the afternoon's first three winners, including a \$243.60 daily double. Each of his first three victories were photo finishes.

After his record breaking dash on Cesca, Dalton stormed right back with a front-running ride on Audley Farm's Emba in the night-cap, holding off Epic Accord, the favorite, by a half length.

Dalton had Cesca away fourth in the field of eight fillies contesting the My Dear Stakes as the first four horses raced heads apart into the turn. Lanson Farms' No Nonsense was on the head end followed by Ontario Holiday, Stinchnew and Cesca, racing on the outside.

Cesca moved up to be third around the bend as Stinchnew reached the front, with No Nonsense second, and took command heading for the stretch. Cesca was in hand as she hit the wire going away from her closest rivals.

Cesca, which equalled the Canadian record for 4 1-2 furlongs at Old Woodbine only to find it broken by her stablemate, John's Champ, was purchased at the Keeneland Sales by trainer John Passero for Stafford Farms. The price was \$12,500.

In winning her third in a row Cesca was bet down to three to two by the crowd of 7,329 and returned \$5 even. She earned \$5,594, bringing her total to \$8,520.

Dalton opened the afternoon's show with a head victory on Brother Royal at \$20.60, and after an inquiry held up the official finish of the second race, was declared the winner on Montana Flight by another head over 22 to 1 shot Teacher's Pal. Montana Flight returned \$28.70.

Stand Firm, the slim Texan's third winner in a row, held off Navy Lou at the wire by a nose to pay \$14.80.

Miss Eunice M. Clegg, returned Nazarene missionary nurse to Swaziland, South Africa, is on a furlough in the United States, doing deputation work among churches of the denomination.

Since her arrival there in October, 1956, she has been working at a hospital in Bremersdrop as a general nurse, and has been studying the Zulu language.

In missionary talks, she will describe the country and its people and tell about the Nazarene work there. The Nazarene church has about 100 doctors, nurses, teachers and missionaries in south and central Africa.

She plans to show colored slides where possible.

Miss Clegg holds bachelor of arts degrees from both Bethany Nazarene College, Bethany, Okla., and Northwest Nazarene College, Nampa, Idaho. She completed nurses' training at the Samaritan Hospital in Nampa.

Prior to being assigned abroad, she was a nurse in several large hospitals including St. Luke's, Spokane, Wash., and the Samaritan Hospital in Nampa.

We think by any man's standard we can say it has rained. It didn't just rain for a few minutes, an hour or so, but it rained all night, with one thunder storm after another passing over, dropping deluges of moisture, then moving on and making room for the next one.

This continued, in the Ropes community, from 8:30 Monday night to the daylight hours. All points that we could reach reported rain.

East of Ropes the rain was not as heavy as in the western section. At the Bob Thomas place 2 1-2 inches fell, and added to the half inch of the night before made three inches. Herman Timmons, north of Ropes, reported 3 1-2 inches of rain, as did J. R. Smith. In the city of Ropes 3 1-10th inches flooded the streets.

Moving west of Ropes, M. M. Collins said the water was so high that he could not get to his rain gauge but that he had an idea he had 5 or 6 inches. Farther west 11 miles, Tom Price reported a full five inches.

At the Ray Martin place, 5 miles west, five inches was reported; at Foster General Store Bill Foster said, "My 5-inch gauge ran over, so I do not know how much above 5 inches we had. G. H. Dalton, just east of Foster's Store, reported 5 1-2 inches. J. M. Marcy, in the same vicinity, told us, "My 5-inch gauge ran over, but there was a straight-sided can in the yard and it was full and running over after filling with 6 1-4 inches of water.

At the E. J. Abney place more than 6 inches of rain fell. Roland Evans reported better than 5 inches at Meadow, and there was, also, a heavy rain east of Meadow.

The rain was ushered in by a vicious appearing cloud coming from the northwest. At first the Highway Patrol issued warnings of high wind and hail, and at one time what appeared to be a small tornado formed but broke up before it hit the ground. The initial puff of wind was fifty or sixty miles an hour, then it settled down to rain, and it rained with very little wind. However, there was plenty of thunder and lightning. It rumbled and crashed all night long. The noise of it kept many people awake, but at no time was there a threat of more than a thunder storm. As far as we can learn there was no damage whatever to growing crops.

This breaks a drought that has hung on here since the first of the year, and gives us promise of one of the best crops we have harvested in several years. It also had the effect of cooling off the air and dropping the temperature, which has been in the high bracket for several days.

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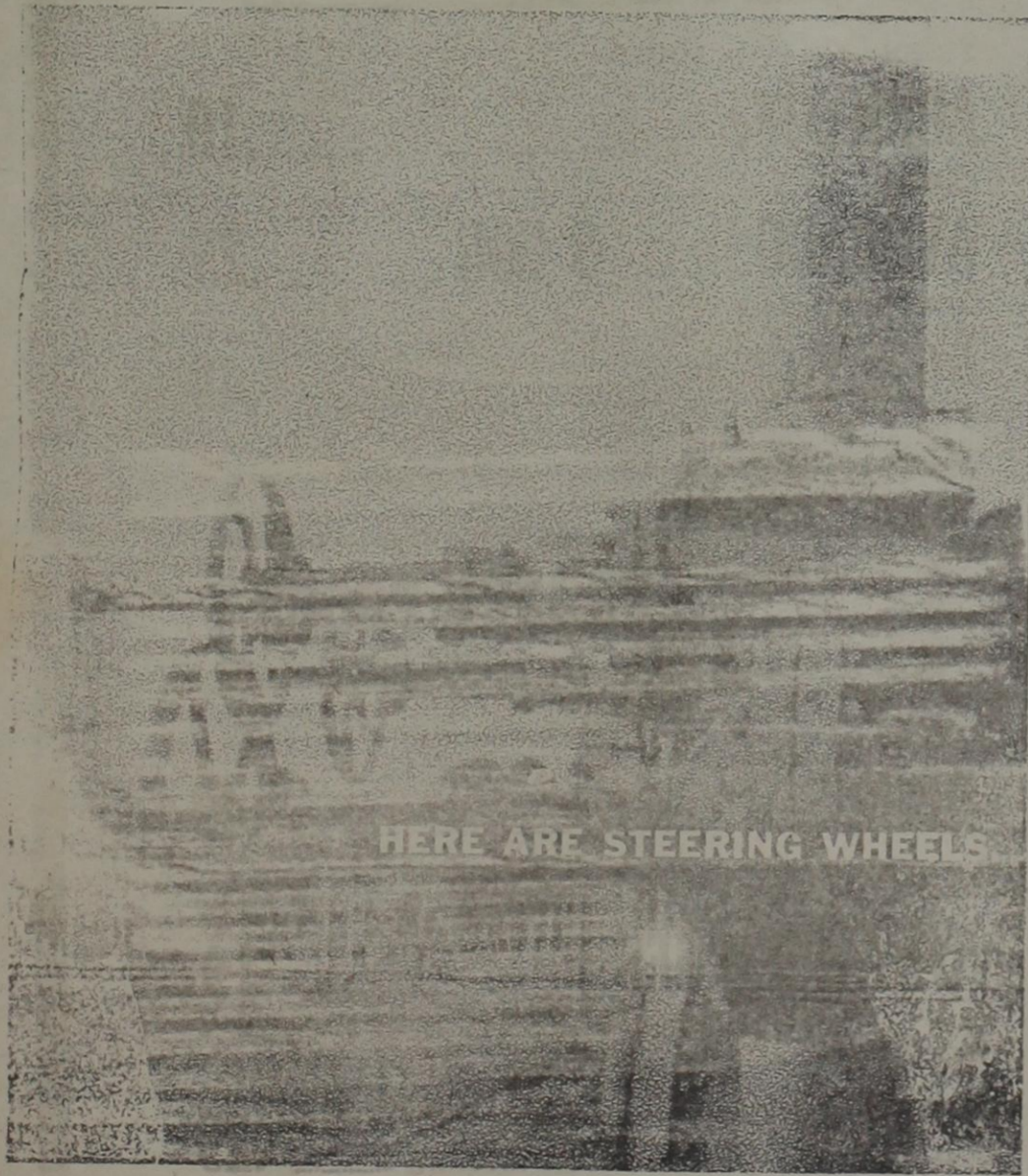

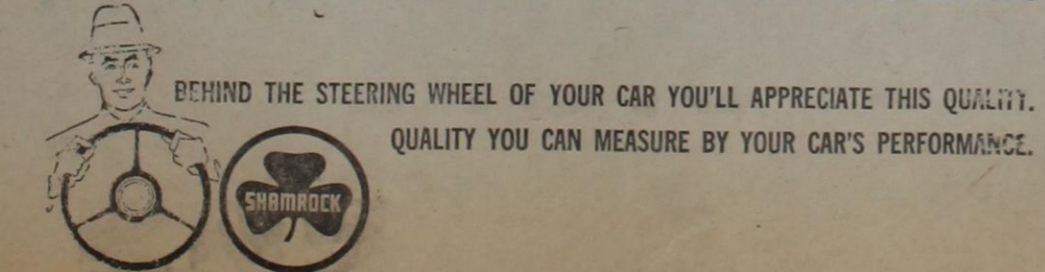
