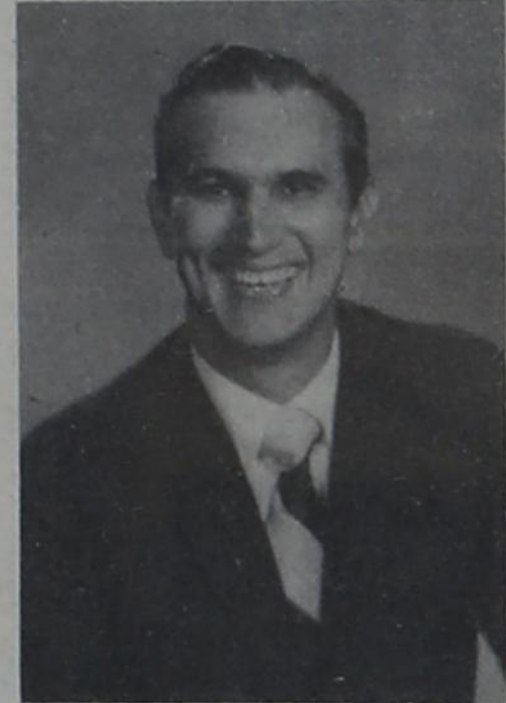

The carnival was not only successful moneywise, \$2,040.00 clear profit, but in cooperation and attitude as well. For when the last

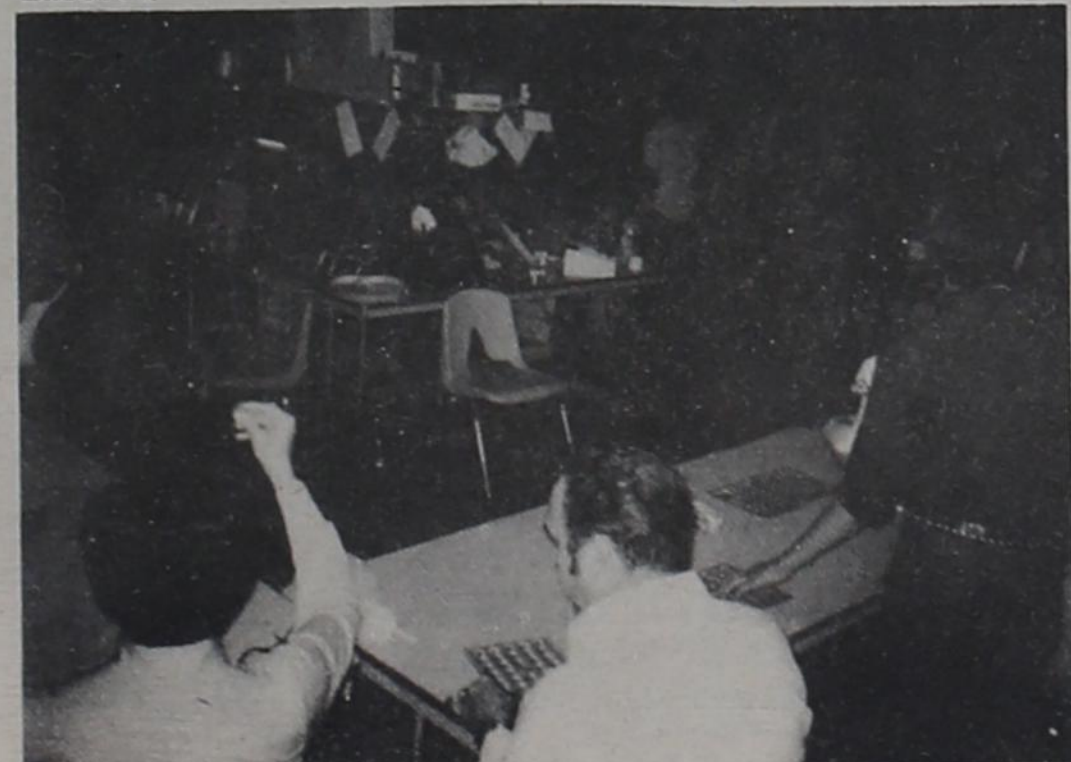

Wolfforth, Texas, calling a bond election to be held within said Town, making provision for the conduct of the election and other provisions incident and related to the purpose of this resolution and order.

Whereas, the Town Council of Wolfforth, Texas, had determined that an election should be called to ascertain whether said governing body shall be authorized to issue bonds of said Town in the amounts and for the purposes hereinafter mentioned; now, therefore.

Be it resolved and ordered by the Town Council of the Town of Wolfforth, Texas:

Section 1: That an election be held on the 15th day of November, 1975, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption hereof, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

"SHALL the Town Council of the Town of Wolfforth, Texas, be authorized to issue **Forty-One Thousand Dollars (\$41,000)** general obligation bonds of said Town for the purpose of the construction of a public building, to wit: a building to house fire fighting equipment and an emergency ambulance; said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed FORTY (40) years from their date, to be issued and sold at any price or prices and to bear interest at any rate or rates as shall be determined within the discretion of the Town Council at the time of issuance; and to provide for the payment of principal of and interest on said bonds by levying a tax sufficient

Wonderful Thought Dept.: Did you ever stop to think that Texas Tech might win its last five games!

There. That balances last week's Horrible Thought Dept.

It was so quiet in the SMU dressingroom that you could hear a sock drop. It was almost that quiet at Steve Sloan's post-game press conference, too.

The silence didn't last long. The Raider coach launched right into things by allowing as to how it felt wonderful to win a game, that it had been so long he had almost forgotten. He paid tribute to the defense for checking the Mustangs the last half and allowing the offense to get a safe lead.

Queried about SMU's fourth down gamble at midfield, Sloan opined that the way the Ponies were swallowing up yardage, three yards wasn't really too much of a gamble. Reminded that the score was pretty close, he said: "If I had known that, I would have been nervous."

Told that Tech only had a one-point lead, Sloan cracked that: "If I had known that, I sure enough would have passed out!"

He was much more relaxed. The victory obviously pleased him and he was more at ease.

"You know, we usually have the squad look at the game films Sunday afternoon, but I turned them loose this week. I think a lot of them wanted to go hunting, doves, I think."

As for Rice coming up Saturday, Sloan said that he really didn't know much about the Owls. "I've only looked at one film," he declared. "They're a lot like us."

In the losing dressingroom, a composed, but somber, Dave Smith paid tribute to his team for fighting back and to Tech for having an outstanding football team.

"They've played four great teams in a row," he declared. "Tech is a lot better than the record shows. I thought that the turning point in the game was when they threw the long ball and got behind (Harold) Perry."

Perry, a freshman, was beaten by Ricky Bates, who got a couple of steps behind his down the middle and went all the way on a 56-yard pass play that put Tech in front, 21-13.

"SMU's a lot like us," Sloan stated. "They have a good offense and an inexperienced defense. They have the type of offense that probably will score on anyone. They have a big line, too. Do they lose any of them after this year?"

A Dallas writer said that they lost all of the offensive line. Sloan shook his head in relief, then asked about David Bostick, the hard-running fullback.

He has another year, a writer said. Sloan whistled silently and remarked: "I sure wish he'd graduate. I hate to think of facing him again. He runs right at you and he runs hard."

"Our defense did a pretty good job of shutting them down the last half," Sloan said. "For a while I didn't know. It looked like it was going to be a high scoring game and close."

So, Tech has its third win of the season and is back in the race to finish in the top four despite a 1-2 record. Arkansas is hanging on with two wins and a loss, while Rice is 1-1 and in danger each week of dropping by the wayside.

Tech, Baylor and SMU all have two losses and are out of championship contention, while TCU is 0-3. The Bears should climb into the runnerup race against TCU, while Texas ought to handle SMU, which makes the Tech-Rice game the top one of the day.

I was proud to read that the Texas Sports Writers Assn. will honor the top pros from Texas, but more especially because E.J. Holub made the team.

Holub played in the days when material at Tech was scarcer than dandruff on a baldheaded man. It helped to make him stand out, although he'd have stood out on a national championship team. There have been few better linebacker-centers anywhere than E.J., everybody's friend and a friend to everybody.

Just an observation on the World Series. The Cincinnati Reds won because they probably are the best all around team in baseball and still one of the best in history.

But the Boston Red Sox battled every step of the way and there was little to choose between the two teams. The Sox surprised the Reds, who didn't hold the Sox in high regard. And the difference between the two teams, in the final analysis, was Burleson striking out with the bases loaded and Morgan getting a bloop single. Otherwise, it was a standoff.

Years ago J.T. King said that, when he was an assistant coach at Texas, they used to figure whether Texas was going to win a football game by comparing positions.

"We'd go down the starting teams and decide which player we'd rather have at each position, our player or theirs. If we had six to their five, we figured we should win."

Sparky Anderson said much the same thing. And, when he went down the Reds' lineup and compared each position the only tossup was Yaztremski of Boston.

On the basis of that comparison, it should have been over in four games. Obviously, there are intangibles that enter into the picture, such as guts and determination. The Sox proved that they had their share of both. It was, in short, a great World Series and the sixth game was a classic.

Basketball is picking up at Tech, but the smile on George Davidson's face Friday night didn't exactly mean that the coaches are all that excited.

Kansas State, against whom Tech officially opens the season, is touted as a team likely to be in the NCAA finals. "And we must have been crazy to schedule Notre Dame in South Bend!" George exclaimed.

Right now the Raiders are still working on fundamentals and haven't really engaged in scrimmages as such. And nagging injuries have cropped up, with four players slowed to a walk.

Still, the coaches appear pleased with the work of several players, like Steve Dunn, Grady Newton, Rudy Liggins, Keith Kitchens and of course Rick Bullock. Liggins, by the way, is having no shoulder problems and is playing with more confidence.

Mike Dooley, former Lubbock Hubber catcher and one of the mainstays of the 1947 season team here that might have been one of the best in minor league history, has moved to town.

He and Jackie Sullivan are operating a Mobil station on University Avenue. Drop by and welcome him "home" and shake hands with Jackie,

who is running for sheriff. He announced over a year ago and we're glad to read that it finally has been discovered locally.



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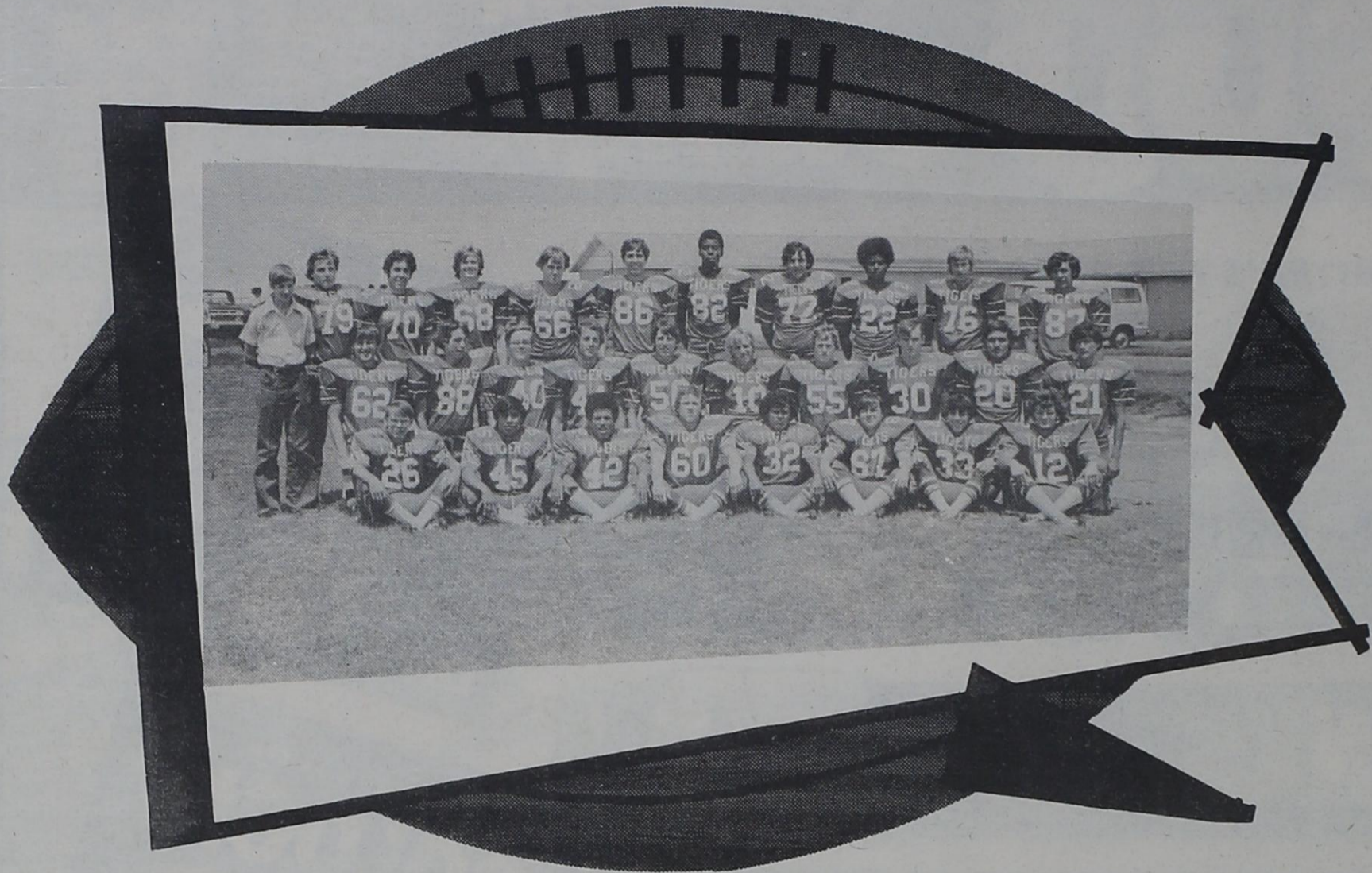

The Lubbock County and others of 100,000 county population, have been opening at 7 a.m. for several years.

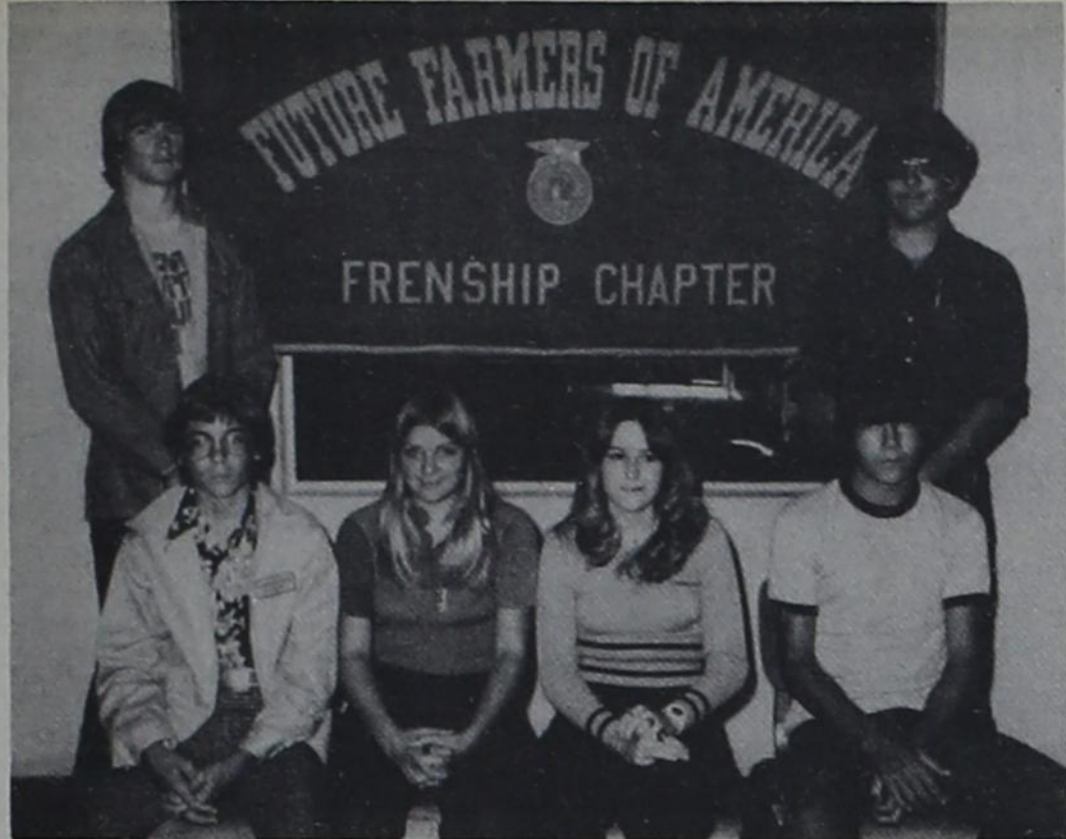

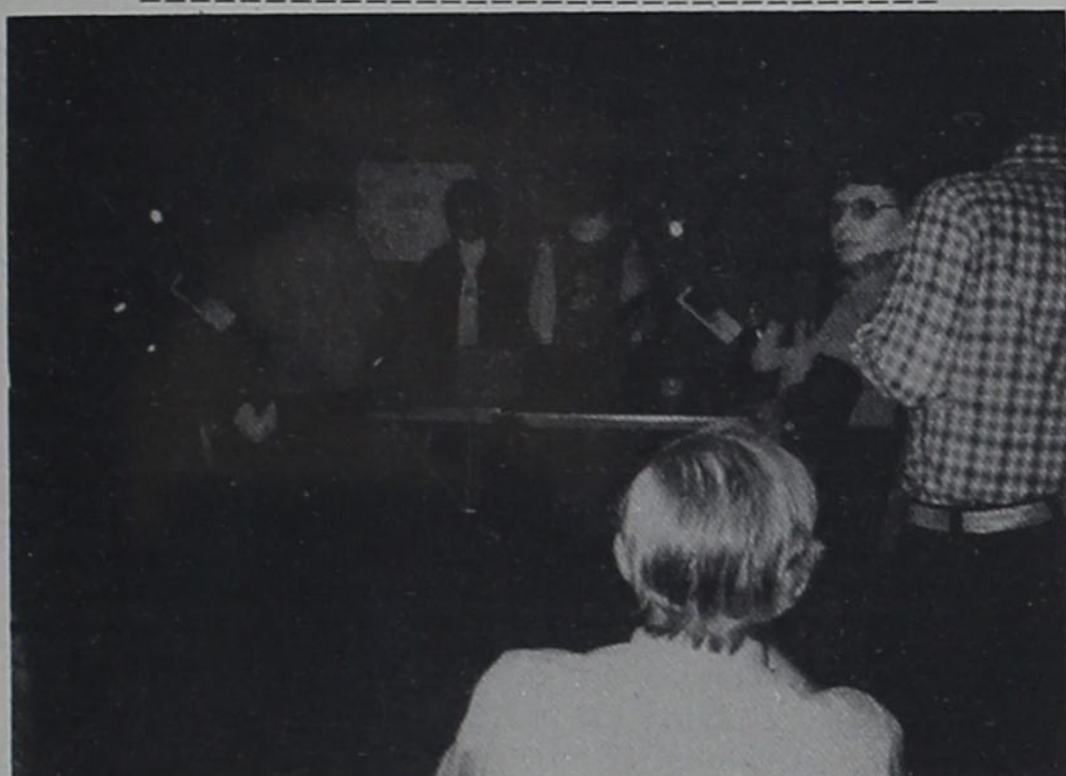

to pay the annual interest and to create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem said bonds as they become due?"

Section 2: That paper ballots shall be used for said election, which ballots shall be prepared in accordance with V.A.T.S. Election Code so as to permit the electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid proposition which shall be set forth in substantially the following form:

"The issuance of \$41,000 general obligation bonds for the construction of a public building"

The word "FOR" and beneath it the word "AGAINST" shall be made to appear on the left of the proposition. A square shall be printed on the left of each of the words "FOR" and "AGAINST", and each elector shall place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way he wishes to vote.

Section 3: That for purposes of this election, the entire Town of Wolforth, Texas, shall constitute one election precinct and the Town Hall in said Town is hereby designated as the polling place for

said election.

On election day, the polls shall be open from 7:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

Section 4: That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election: **Joe Fletcher, Presiding Judge. A.C. McWhorter, Alternate Presiding Judge.**

The Presiding Judge shall appoint two qualified clerks to serve and assist in holding said election; provided that if the Presiding Judge herein appointed actually serves, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall be one of the clerks.

Absentee voting shall be conducted at the Town Secretary's office in the Town Hall, in accordance with the provisions of V.A.T.S. Election Code, Chapter 5.

Section 5: All resident qualified electors of the Town shall be permitted to vote at said election. In addition, the election materials enumerated in Senate Bill No. 165, Acts of the 64th Legislature, Regular Session, 1975, shall be printed in both English and Spanish for use at each polling place and for absentee voting.

Section 6: That a substantial

copy of this resolution and order shall serve as proper notice of said election. Said notice shall be posted in the election precinct and at the Town Hall not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in said Town, the first of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for said election.
