## Showers Help Growing Cotton

Thunderstorms, which hopped about over the South Plains Monday afternoon, dropped from 2-10ths up to an inch of rain in the Ropes

territory. The afternoon showers started with clouds forming to the west of Ropes, bringing 2-10ths of an inch to-

ward Busterville, and getting heavier as you traveled east. At the Bill Patman place nearly an inch fell, accompanied by a wind that

reached a velocity of from 50 to 70 miles an hour.

Moving south, the cloud passed over the Carter farm and the Adams place, and

those in between. Some hail fell, but as far as we can learn, there was little damage.

An estimated inch of rain fell on the Lockettville farms Monday afternoon and night, while the Wilson Campbell place reported six-tenths. Mrs. Campbell told the Plainsman, "It was just a gentle rain without any wind."

At the Foster Grocery four miles northwest of Ropes, Mr. Foster told the Plainsman, "We had about quarter of an inch, but Luther Wilson was just in here and he said he received 6-10ths. The Wilson place is north of the Foster store."

In Ropes proper there was only a trace of rain.

These showers came just at the right time to help the growing crops. Tuesday the skies were overcast, giving the moisture a better chance to benefit crops.

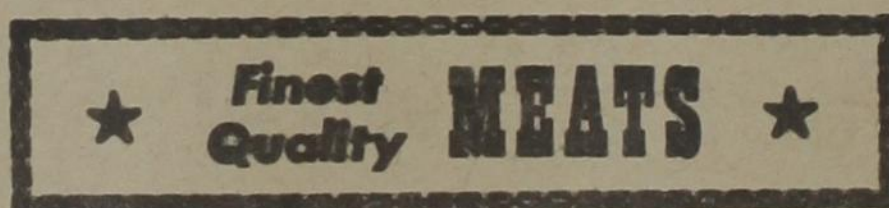

Drain liquid from cans of vegetables and arrange in bottom of the broiler pan. Place asparagus down center of pan. Place pimiento strips down the center of asparagus. Arrange 1 can of Mexican on each side of asparagus. Season vegetables with salt and pepper.

Wipe steaks with damp cloth, score fat around edges to prevent curling. Place on rack of cold broiler pan, season, and place under broiler unit of electric range so the top of the steak is four or five inches from the broiler unit.

Turn oven control to Broil. Leave oven door ajar. Cook on one side until brown (about 12 minutes). Turn and brown other side (about 10 minutes). Cut tomatoes in halves and put grated cheese on top. Arrange on broiler rack just before steaks are done.

### TEXAS LAW

#### AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENT RULES

Vacation time is here. Millions of people are driving about the country, and automobile accidents are occurring with increasing frequency. What should a person do when involved in an accident?

At such times it is hard to keep your wits about you and know just what to do. It is therefore a good idea to plan in advance just what you would do in event of a smash-up. Here are a few simple rules that every driver should commit to memory:

1. STOP! Failure to stop can result in serious criminal consequences.

2. RENDER AID. If anyone is injured: (1) Render first aid. (2) Stop bleeding. (3) Call a doctor or an ambulance or both. (4) DO NOT move an injured person in any way that could possibly add to his injury.

3. PROTECT THE SCENE from Further Damage. You may be liable for damages to approaching drivers, unless they are properly warned. If the highway is obstructed at night, have some one turn his headlights beams on the wrecked vehicles.

4. CALL AN OFFICER. Policemen, Highway Patrolmen, Sheriffs and their deputies are trained accident investigators whose testimony may be invaluable in establishing your civil claim for damages.

5. Gather Information . . . Write it Down. Don't trust your memory. Don't guess—be specific. Measure skid marks. Step off distances. Be sure to obtain names and addresses of witnesses. You are required by law to exhibit your driver's license to the other driver—and he must do the same.

6. BE CAREFUL What you say. Even if you feel you probably are to blame, it is best to make no admission.

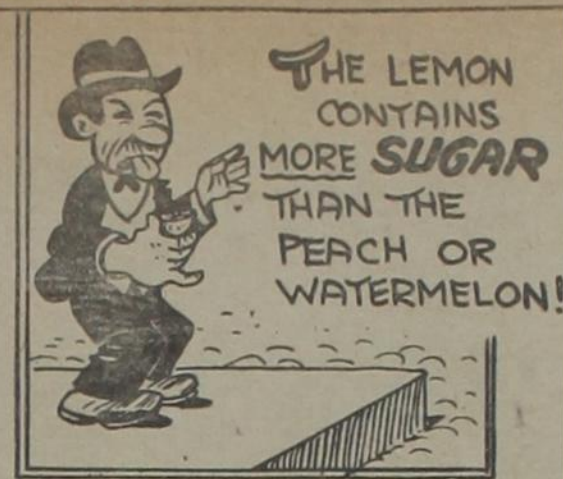

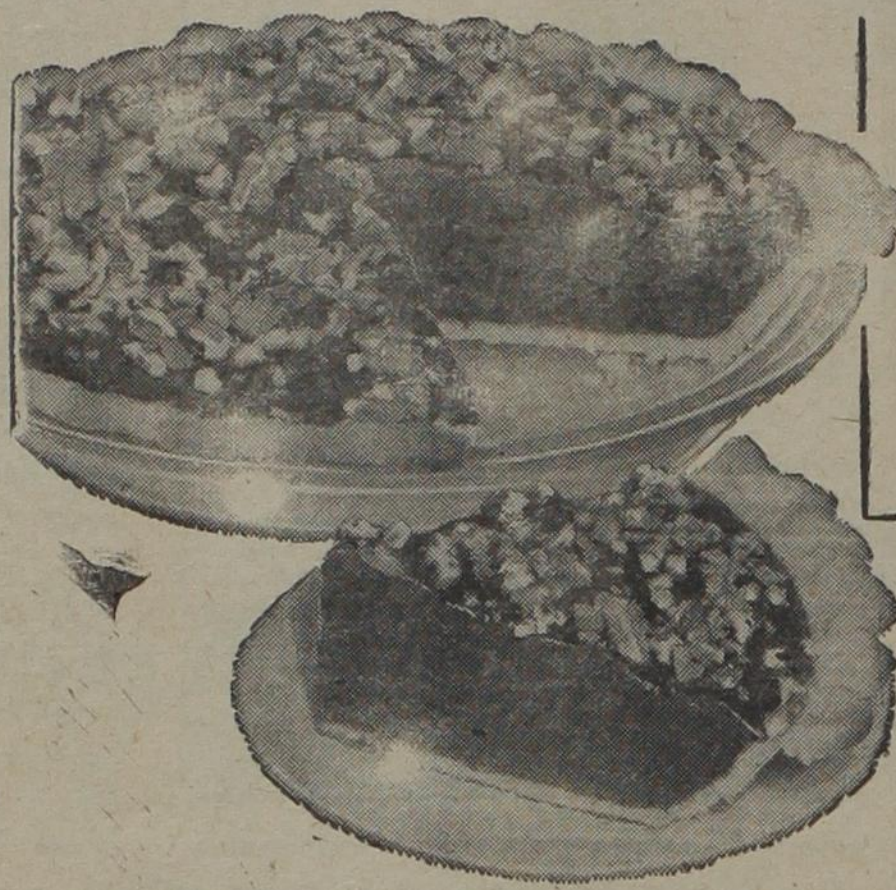

## MOCHA FLUFF PIE!

1 pkg. chocolate pudding (not the "instant" kind)  
 1/3 cup PET Instant (in dry form)  
 1 envelope unflavored gelatin  
 1 Tablespoon instant coffee  
 2 eggs, separated  
 2 1/2 cups water  
 1/2 cup PET Instant (in dry form)  
 1/2 cup finely cut unsalted nuts  
 9-inch baked pastry shell

Mix pudding, 1/3 cup PET Instant, gelatin, coffee and egg yolks in a 1 1/2-qt. saucepan. Gradually stir in 2 cups water. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to an all-over boil, about 5 minutes. Take from heat. Cover and cool. Put egg whites, the remaining 1/2 cup water and 1/2 cup PET Instant into a 1 1/2-qt. bowl. Beat with rotary beater or electric beater at high speed, until mixture stands in peaks when beater is pulled out. (It will take about 5 minutes.) Add cooled pudding gradually, beating until thoroughly blended. Put into cold pastry shell. Sprinkle nuts over top. Chill about 3 hours.
