Mix pudding, 1/2 cup PET Instant, gelatin, coffee and egg yolks in a 1/2qt. saucepan. Gradually stir in 2 cups water. Cook and stir over medium heat until mixture comes to an all-over boil, about 5 minutes. Take from heat. Cover and cool. 
