Plains Become Ice Box As First Cold Snap Hits

The actual first cold snap of the winter hit on Tuesday night, bringing with it rain and snow and a cold wind tipped with ice.

While for several weeks it has frozen each night, with a warming trend during the day, there has been few north winds. But this present snap has plenty of "vigah"—it is just as if there never had been a summer and might not be another one.

The cotton harvest, which was in full blast with hundreds of bales being gathered each day with strippers, was brought to a grinding halt. However, if the cotton can be kept dry enough to gin the

processing will not stop as the gins of the territory are "covered up"—there are trailers of cotton parked in every available spot with two or three bales on each.

Up to this time we have had almost perfect weather for the harvest, and maybe after this "spell" passes we will have sufficient clear, dry weather to finish.

Tuesday morning the temperature dropped to about 15 above, coldest of the season, resulting in frozen water pipes, automobiles difficult to start, and those to be glad who did not have to go outdoors and work.

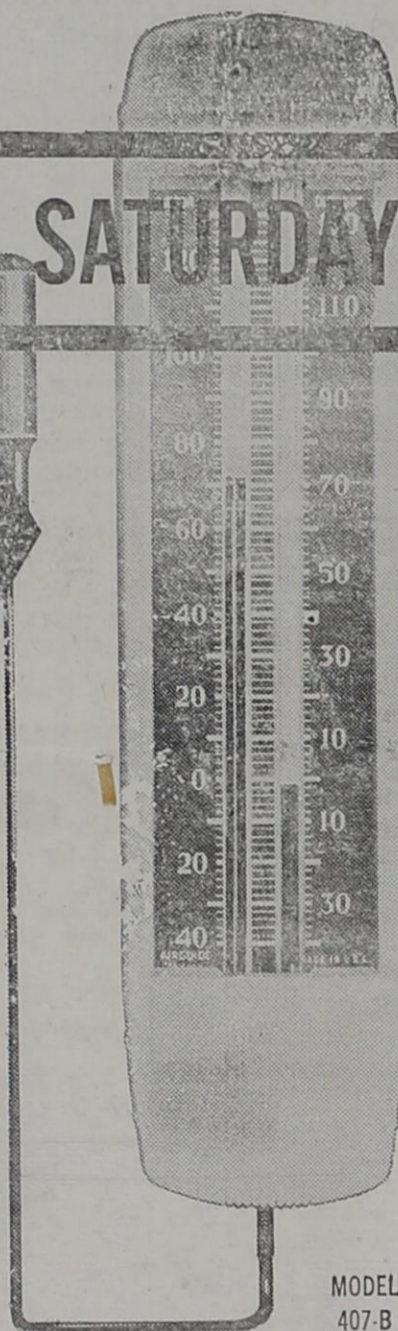

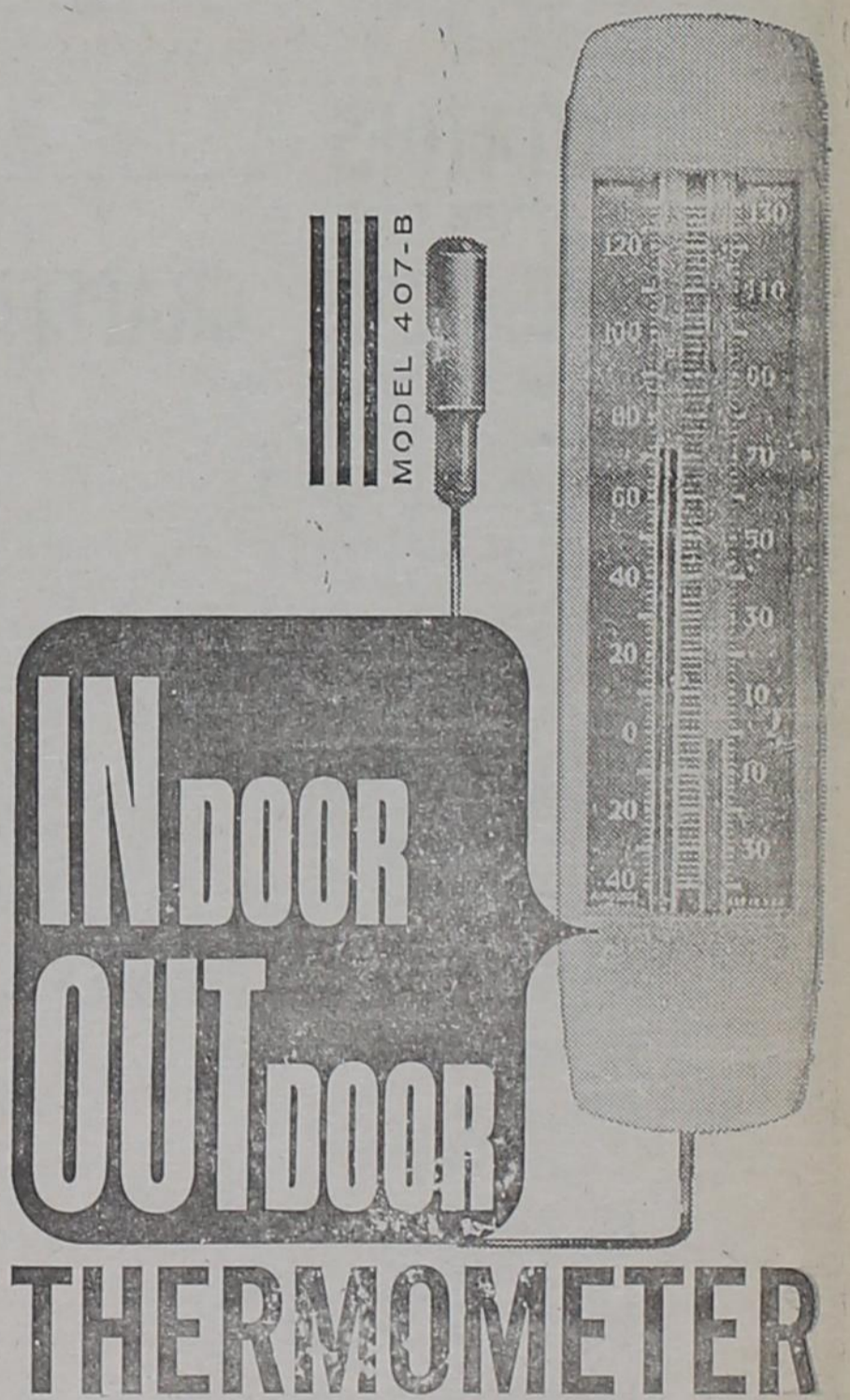
