Community Progress Reports From FHA

"Rural community progress in Texas has been spurred by the development of 436 modern water systems, sewer systems, and recreation centers through the Farmers Home Administration," Horace D. Gilmore, County Supervisor of Hockley County said today.

Gilmore reported on benefits brought to the state under Rural Community Facilities programs that have been enlarged under President Johnson's efforts to improve living conditions in rural areas.

Water supply problems have been solved for more than 180,000 people in rural Texas through 418 water systems made possible by FHA loans and grants totaling more than \$54 million. The new systems serve both rural towns and countryside where the people have had to exist on uncertain and sometimes, unsafe water supplies.

Gilmore reported that three communities in the state also have new or improved waste disposal systems through FHA loans and grants approved the past two years. At present, there are 48 waste disposal projects underway in Texas from application stage to those under construction.

"We are beginning to make real progress toward the President's goal of clear, constant water for all of rural America," Gilmore said. "Towns benefited by the program are able to improve living standards and accommodate new business and industry when they can offer the same kind of water service as found in the city."

"A typical effect," Gilmore said, "is seen at Whitharral, Texas, where a water supply system was completed in 1965. Through insurance of private loan financing, the Agency also has made possible the construction of 15 outdoor recreation centers developed by community associations and serving an estimated 13,500 people in rural Texas.

The centers give rural families the same opportunity as city and suburban dwellers to enjoy modern swimming pools, playing fields, golf, boating and other forms of outdoor recreation.

Gilmore said the agency also has made grants to 60 counties of the state for comprehensive planning of the future development of water and waste disposal services in rural areas.

Smith won by a large margin in Hockley County. In the commissioner's race, E. O. Schoenrock had an unofficial total of 722 votes while Myrl Brock, incumbent, received 464 votes to place him in the runoff.

Ben Barnes walked away with the Lt. Governor's race all over Texas.

In the sheriff's race, Weir Clem polled 3,076 unofficial votes while Ed Hofacket received 1,547.

R. B. McAlister won the race for State Representative, although John Kendrick polled more votes in our County.

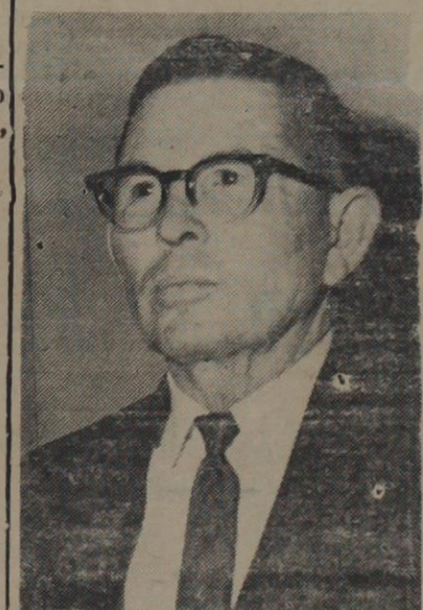

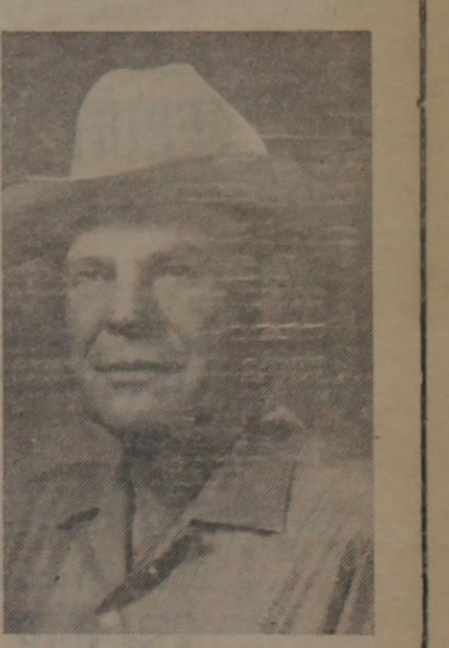
