MORE RAIN

Three-tenths of an inch of rain fell in Ropes Tuesday night; Lockettville Gin re-ported a half inch, C and C Gin, 4miles west, reported 3-10ths; Herman Timmons, ab-out three miles northeast of Ropes, reported a shower, while the Ryals Grocery, four miles east of Ropes reported four-tenths, and it grew heav-ier as it moved east.

At 11:30 p. m. a small tor-nado was reported to be al-tig around between Shallo-water and Smyer, moving to the southeast. If the twister struck the ground it was in open fields as no one has re-ported damage from winds.

three miles farther west at the Tom Price place an inch of rain was reported, while east of Lockettville Sunday, three inches of rain fell.

At the J. C. Pointer place, about three miles east of Ropes, Mrs. Pointer told the Plainsman their gauge show-ed one and one-fourth in-ches, a like amount of rain fell in the Busterville community and continued on over into the Lakeview community.

A Tribute to an Outstanding Citizen

J. W. Berry has resigned as tax collector-assessor of both the City and School.

He has completed some thirty years as tax assessor-collector for the school, and has been tax assessor-collec-tor for the City since it was incorporated in 1935.

During these years he has given an unselfish, compe-tent service to the people of the Ropes community; he has ever been behind each and every move that had for its purpose the betterment of the community, being active in all civic projects, with a thorough knowledge of what was happening and what was going to happen in the com-munity.

When Mr. Berry moved to the Ropes community De-cember 24, 1924, much of the land west of Ropes was pas-ture land and the town was in its infancy. The first two years he and his family lived here he farmed east of town, later buying the farm where Myles Collins now farms, in the latter part of 1926. He lived on this place twenty years, raising a family of six boys and one girl.

Mr. Berry became tax col-lector and assessor for the Ropes Independent School District in 1931 and has con-tinued in that capacity up until his resignation.

In 1944 Mr. Berry bought the Ropes Drug Store from Jake Easter, brother of Toots Easter who passed away while operating it, and has con-ducted the business for the past seventeen years. At the time of buying the drug store he moved the tax office to that building.

In 1946 he sold his farm and bought a house from Eddie Hammack in north-east Ropes, where he and his wife now live.

We asked Mr. Berry if he plans to retire and he said, "Oh no, if I sell the drug store my wife would expect me to keep up a big flower garden."

Mr. and Mrs. Berry both were born and reared in Ben-jamin where Mr. Berry, a-mong other things, was con-nected with a drug store.

We are going to say this: Both he and his wife are wonderful people and the Ropes community is much richer for having them as citizens. And, while he may not know it, he has been an inspiration and help to the writer during the twenty-two years we have lived in Ropes.

THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN

The opening of the special session Monday was accompanied by another blast from Governor Daniel about the "power of lobbyists" in Austin.

He fears, according to his statement Sunday, that if lobbyists "have more influence for their selfish interests at the state level than in Washington, then this will lead to more national control and taxes will be centered more and more at the federal level."

Many here in Austin are wondering why the blast from the Governor at this particular time did not include more on the sales tax issue, a favorite topic of his many television and newspaper interviews in the past months.

Legislators, in comparing notes on the "lobby problem" described by the Governor, have come up with these observations:

1. Regardless of how many lobbyists "flock into Austin" it is always going to be up to

the individual legislator to manage himself and his office to keep from being interfered with by lobbyists. Most legislators agree that if lobbyists have the ability to create such confusion in any legislator's work, then that legislator is not very efficient in managing his office. Tny legislator who is rendered inefficient by lobbyists is not worth his salt anyway.

2. The governor was apparently confident when he approved the lobby registration legislation which we passed during the 56th Legislature that this legislation requiring lobbyists to register, would constitute proper regulation.

3. There may be, say Legislators, some weakness in the lobby registration laws just passed. If there are weaknesses, they need to be straightened out. But, it needs to be done in an intelligent, legislative manner, and not through scare publicity.

Gov. Daniel wants the law strengthened to require lobbyists to report all their expenditures, including living costs away from home, travel to and from Austin, office expense and other personal costs. That's all right with most legislators I know, but how is this going to change anything?

Mr. and Mrs. Joe Harris and children, Sheryl Ann and Sammy Joe, are visiting in Oklahoma and other points this week.

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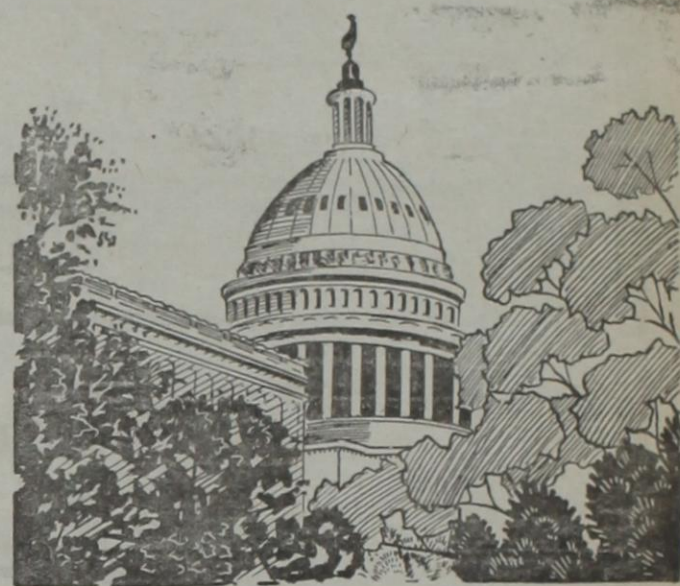
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
