Bobby Jeffcoat Wins Top Award

Robert L. (Bobby) Jeffcoat, senior accounting student in Texas Tech University's College of Business Administration, has been awarded the Haskins and Sells Foundation award for excellence in accounting.

The \$500 award was made by Claude T. Scott, managing partner of the Fort Worth office of the firm of Haskins and Sells, certified public accountants. The presentation was made Thursday night, February 4, at a joint meeting of the Texas Tech chapter of Beta Alpha Psi and the Tech Accounting Society.

Accounting Department Chairman Reginald Rushing cited Jeffcoat as having an "outstanding record of scholastic achievement." Jeffcoat was selected by a committee of faculty members in the Department of Accounting at

Tech to receive the award.

His selection was based on excellence in scholarship, personal traits and other factors which would contribute to success in public accounting, Dr. Rushing said.

Jeffcoat has a 4.0 grade average in accounting and an overall average of 3.76. He is a member of Beta Alpha Psi the national accounting fraternity.

After graduating from Ropes High School, Ropesville, in 1964 he attended South Plains College before enrolling in Texas Tech. He received his B.A. degree with a major in English in 1969, and is a candidate to receive his B.B.A. degree with a major in accounting in August, 1971.

Archie Jordan Enters Houston Stock Show

Archie Jordan, Ropes FFA Chapter member, Ropesville, has entered two barrows in the 1971 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, February 24 through March 7, to be held in the 16-acre Livestock Exposition Building, adjacent to the domed stadium.

The Houston show is the largest livestock show in the world, and this year entry figures and premium money are expected to exceed all previous years. Last year's 17,756 livestock entries set a record. Classes are provided for 9 beef breeds, 4 dairy breeds, 5 swine breeds, 11 sheep breeds, five horse breeds, 5 rabbit breeds, 22 poultry breeds and Angora goats.

Among other programs benefiting youth on a statewide basis are the scholarship and research programs. The Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo annually presents scholarships to outstanding FFA and 4-H members in the amount of \$4,000 each. More than forty students are currently attending college on scholarships provided by this non-profit civic event.

The research program was established in 1970 by the show to be conducted in nine Texas agricultural colleges. Much of the work is done by students thus providing jobs for those college students who need to work.

The knowledge shared through this \$100,000 research program directly benefits Texas agriculture.

Dates for the 1971 Houston Show are February 24 through March 7, with the first two days set aside solely for livestock judging and sales.

The rodeo will open on February 26 with Johnny Cash headlining matinee and evening performances on February

26, 27 and 28; B. J. Thomas will appear at evening performances on March 1, 2, 3 and 4 and Glen Campbell stars at the evening performance on March 5 and the matinee and evening performances March 6 and 7.

LITTLE DRIBBLERS

National Basketball Champions in Ropesville?

Probably not too many of our area citizens would give much consideration to such a question. But a realistic assessment of Ropesville's new Little Dribblers Basketball program shows that a possibility for a National Championship does exist.

The new Little Dribblers basketball league in Ropes is an active part of the nation's most rapidly expanding youth activity, Little Dribblers, Inc.

This season, Little Dribblers basketball leagues are operating in over 50 Texas communities, 12 other states, and people in 29 states are interested in organizing teams.

A few years ago, in Levelland, Texas local citizens decided they wanted to boost the city's sagging junior high basketball program. What they did is now on its way to becoming basketball's equivalent of Little League Baseball.

Helping Levelland was the original idea in creating basketball leagues for boys 9, 10, 11 and 12 years of age. The idea caught on so well that less than two years ago, Little Dribblers, Inc. received its Charter. Expansion followed and last year teams from Arizona, New Mexico and Texas participated in the First Annual National Little Dribblers Basketball Tournament.

All towns, regardless of size, has a chance to win a National Championship designation. Regional play-offs will determine the 16 teams — eight from each division — that will meet in this year's Second Annual National Tournament, scheduled for April 20-May 1.

LDB rucs call for two divisions of play. The American Division, for towns with less than 5,000 population and the National Division of cities over 5,000 population.

Ropes is one of the Texas towns that will have an active Little Dribblers league and local officials are shooting for a national title.

One of the best things about the program, supporters say, is that every team member must play at least one full quarter of each game. Every team member is a playing member. Besides teaching the fundamental basketball skills participation encourages leadership abilities, cooperation in team play and physical fitness.

Kenneth Means was one of the first Ropes citizens to express an interest in establishing the Little Dribblers program here. The local league will begin play the middle of February and continue through April.

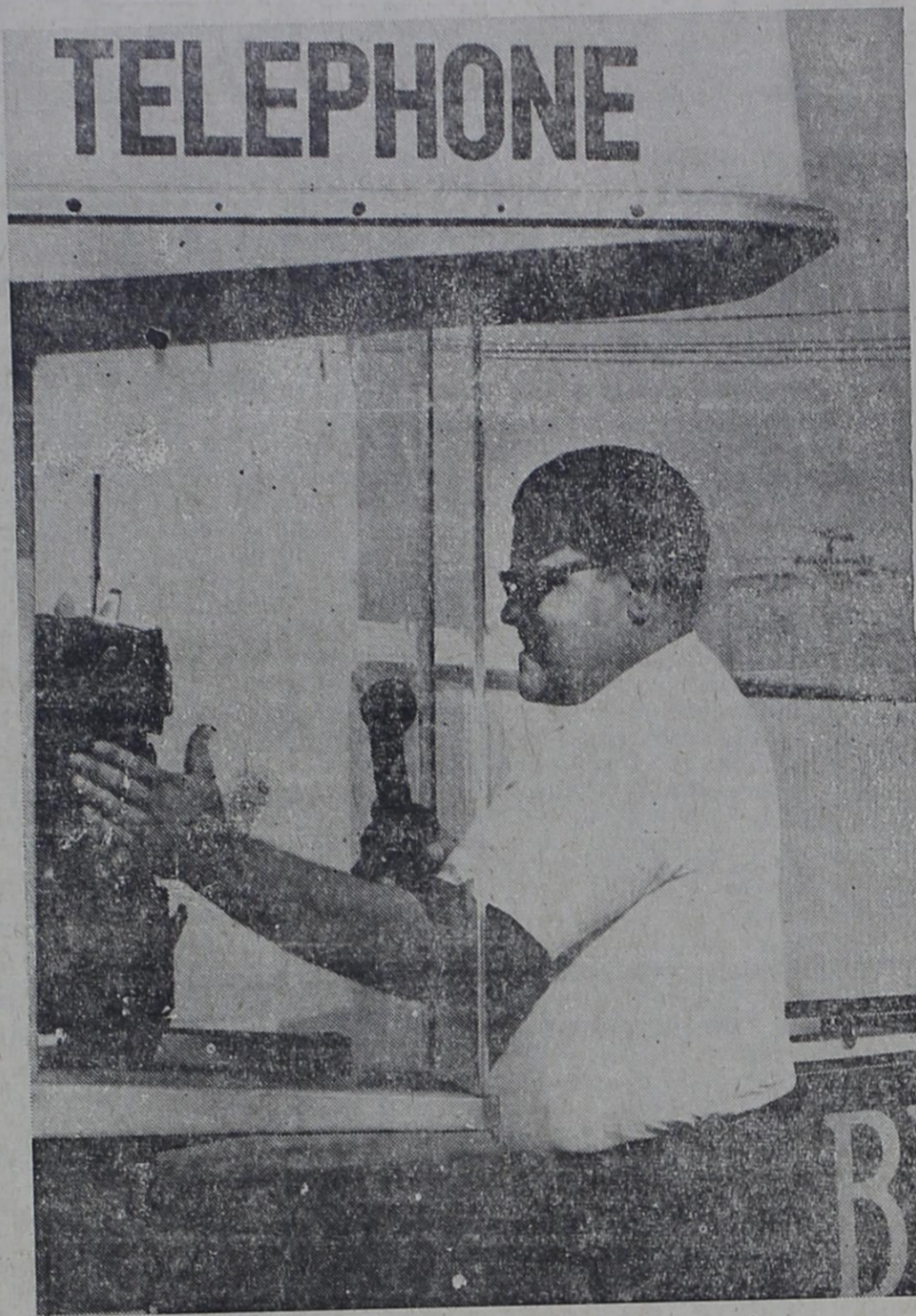

USEFULNESS OF DRUGS MAY BE LIMITED

For many years, the various strains of bacteria that cause a dangerous disease called meningitis were successfully treated with sulfa drugs. But the usefulness of these drugs may now become somewhat limited. Dr. S. J. Lerro, medical consultant with the Texas State Department of Health reports that more and more strains of meningitis are becoming drug resistant.

Meningitis is an acute bacterial disease. It causes inflammation of the three membranes which envelop the brain and spinal cord. The disease may occur as a brief illness and with recovery; or, it may pursue a sudden, severe course with delirium, stupor, coma and death within a matter of hours. Discharges from the nose and throat of carriers of the bacteria which cause the disease are the source of most infections.

In a study of meningitis infections in Texas from 1964 through 1968, Dr. Lerro found that two types — which doc-

tors call Groups B and C — were responsible for most of the cases. In the last several years, there has been a definite increase in the percentage of Group C organisms resistant to sulfadiazine. In 1966, only 15 per cent of the specimens from Group C were resistant to administration of the drug, compared to 77 per cent in 1968.

Administration of small doses of sulfa drugs to large populations over a long period of time may have resulted in favoring the survival of a drug-resistant strain.

But the outlook is not completely bleak. Much progress has been made in research against the disease. An experimental vaccine has been developed that provides 90 per cent protection against one of the three major types of meningitis for up to a year. Of course, this means there is no vaccine for the other two types. But, Dr. Lerro reports researchers are working diligently on a three-way vaccine which will be effective against all three forms.

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ASKED NOT TO SUSPEND DDT

WACO — (Spl) — The head of the state's largest farm organization has asked the federal government not to suspend registration of the pesticide DDT and the herbicide 2, 4, 5-T.

J. T. (RED) Woodson of Fannin County, president of the 121,158 - member Texas Farm Bureau, made the request in a letter to William D. Ruckelshaus, administrator of the Environmental Protection

Agency. He asked that his statement be made a part of the hearing record.

"After careful study of much of the research which supposedly proves the great inherent dangers of the agricultural chemicals in question, we believe that this research was fragmented, incomplete and misinterpreted," Woodson said.

"We oppose the suspension of registration... on the grounds of habeas corpus — where are the bodies of the dead and deformed!" the farm leader

declared.

"After more than 20 years of actual field experience with these chemicals, we have observed no fatalities or deformities to members of our families, to our livestock, to our pets or to wildlife resulting from our use of 2, 4, 5-T," Woodson stated. "We have observed no fatalities or deformities from our use of DDT except those fatalities to insect pests we are trying to kill, and minor fatalities to certain small animals, birds

and fish as a result of direct field application."

Woodson said such losses of small animals, birds and fish due to field applications of DDT and other chlorinated hydrocarbon insecticides "have been inconsequential compared to the gain to American consumers in terms of adequate quantities of high quality food and fiber." He added that the types of small animals birds and fish killed by field applications of such insecticides are thriving and multiplying in the same areas where insecticides have been used extensively.

"Let's put the issue in perspective!" Woodson declared. He explained that statistical reports show that exposure to direct sunlight "is ten times more harmful than DDT or 2, 4, 5-T" and that habitual use of tobacco "is 10,000 times more dangerous" than a build up of DDT in fatty tissues of the body.

DUTIES OF PARENT OR GUARDIAN

City Marshal O'Neal Fox asked us to print the following excerpt from the Texas School Law. There seems to be some problem of youth in the area not attending school as they should.

Art. 299 (P.C.) Duties of parent or guardian — If any parent or person standing in parental relation to a child within the compulsory school attendance ages who is not properly excused from attendance upon school for some exemption provided by law fails to require such child to attend school regularly for such period as is required by law, it shall be the duty of the attendance officer who has jurisdiction in the territory where said parent or person standing in parental relation resides, to warn such parents or person standing in parental relation that this law must be immediately complied with, and upon failure of said parent or person standing in parental relation to immediately comply with this law after such warning has been given, the official discharging the duties of the attendance officer shall forthwith file complaint against such parent or person standing in parental relation to said child, which complaint shall be filed in the County Court, or in the Justice Court in the precinct where such parent or guardian resides. Any parent or other person standing in parental relation upon conviction for failure to comply with the provisions of this law shall be fined for the first offense five dollars, and for the second offense ten dollars, and for each subsequent offense twenty-five dollars. And each day that said child remains out of said school after said warning has been given or after said child has been ordered in school by the Juvenile Court, may constitute a separate offense.
