NERVOUS NELLIES

On May 17, at a fund raising campaign for Democrats in Chicago, President Johnson called those who disagree with his Viet Nam policies "Nervous Nellies". A Nervous Nelly, so far as I can discern, is a "jittery old cow". Now I am no stockman and so I cannot know what is conjured up in a cowman's mind when he hears the phrase "jittery old cow". But I am an American citizen and I do have a feeling which rises up when I hear the word "jittery".

I get jittery when I hear our president try to discourage criticism by calling his opponents nervous nellies. This is the way little men try to handle their opponents. I don't want a little man for my president. A real man does not try to do away with opposition by trying to make fools out of his opponents. Rather, he carefully goes over their arguments against him and deals with them one by one. Is the president's use of nervous nelly another way of telling us that he does not know how to deal with the issues in Viet Nam?

Then, I get jittery when I know that day after day men are dying in Viet Nam. Nearly 4,000 American soldiers have died to date. And, the way things are going, some of the young men in my own church from the Junior department on up are liable to be going to Viet Nam in a few years. I get very nervous when I think about their being one of the dead.

Again, I get jittery when I see who are the critics of the president's policies in Viet Nam. The list includes senators, clergymen of many denominations, professors, editors of papers, retired military men and diplomats and a great many deans of our leading law schools. If the critics the president calls nervous nellies were men without any achievement, then perhaps nervous nellies would be good names for them. But many critics are respected men and women in our nation.

Finally, I get jittery over the name "Nervous Nelly" because it implies that no one should criticize the president. The moment the United States loses the freedom to criticize, then we are lost as a nation. President Johnson is my president and I will follow the democratic decisions of our nation (so long as they are Christian), but I can never relinquish my right to criticize policy even if I am classified as a Nervous Nelly.

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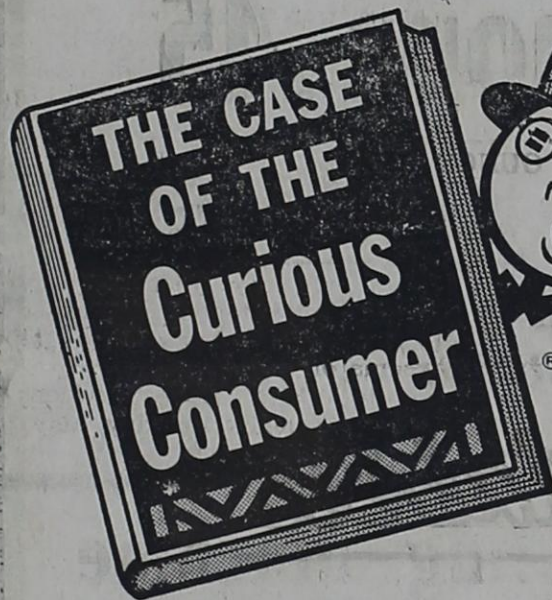
